I do not well know how to commence
an account of the proceedings which have
taken place this day - indeed so curious
as business has never yet occurred - Chat.
and I left New Park this morning for
Newmarket to meet Lord Hughes and
on arriving there at 11:00 found that
he was still at Harrogate receiving
all the gentry of the County and hearing
their views of the state of it - I accor-
dingly determined on going into the
enclosed camp and accordingly gal-
loped off there and sent in my
card - an officer immediately an-
nounced that Lord h. would see me
with pleasure and accordingly
I was introduced - there I found all
the Set - Obriens - Fitz Gerald's, the Darts-
Crombys, Mahons &c. &c. - and found them
at high discussion - my ~~re~~ turn came
on and I spoke in reply to Sir Edw. O'Brien
who stated that he was not aware of any
grievance under which the Country
laboured - I went through a detail

of the grievances under which the
country laboured and concluded by
referring Sir E. O'Brien to his own town of
Glane where on the commons of Clare
there are the most wretched people on
the face of the earth - this he did not
deny - but ~~Conor~~ O'Brien of Birch-
field stood up and made a most
ill tempered attack on me, but
not by name - he talked of a
person coming there to make
an attack on Sir Edward O'Brien
for Electioneering purposes -
this again called me up and I was
about dealing pretty harshly with
O'Brien when he stood up evidently
to at the solicitation of the friends
around him - and said that in
the observations he made he did
not mean me and did not intend
me any offence whatsoever - this
was a damned Lye - but that is
no affair of mine - thus ended this
part of the affair - and Lord Anglesey

gave them all to understand that they
had ~~no~~ no assistance to expect from
him unless the Landlords of the Coun-
-try determined on alleviating
