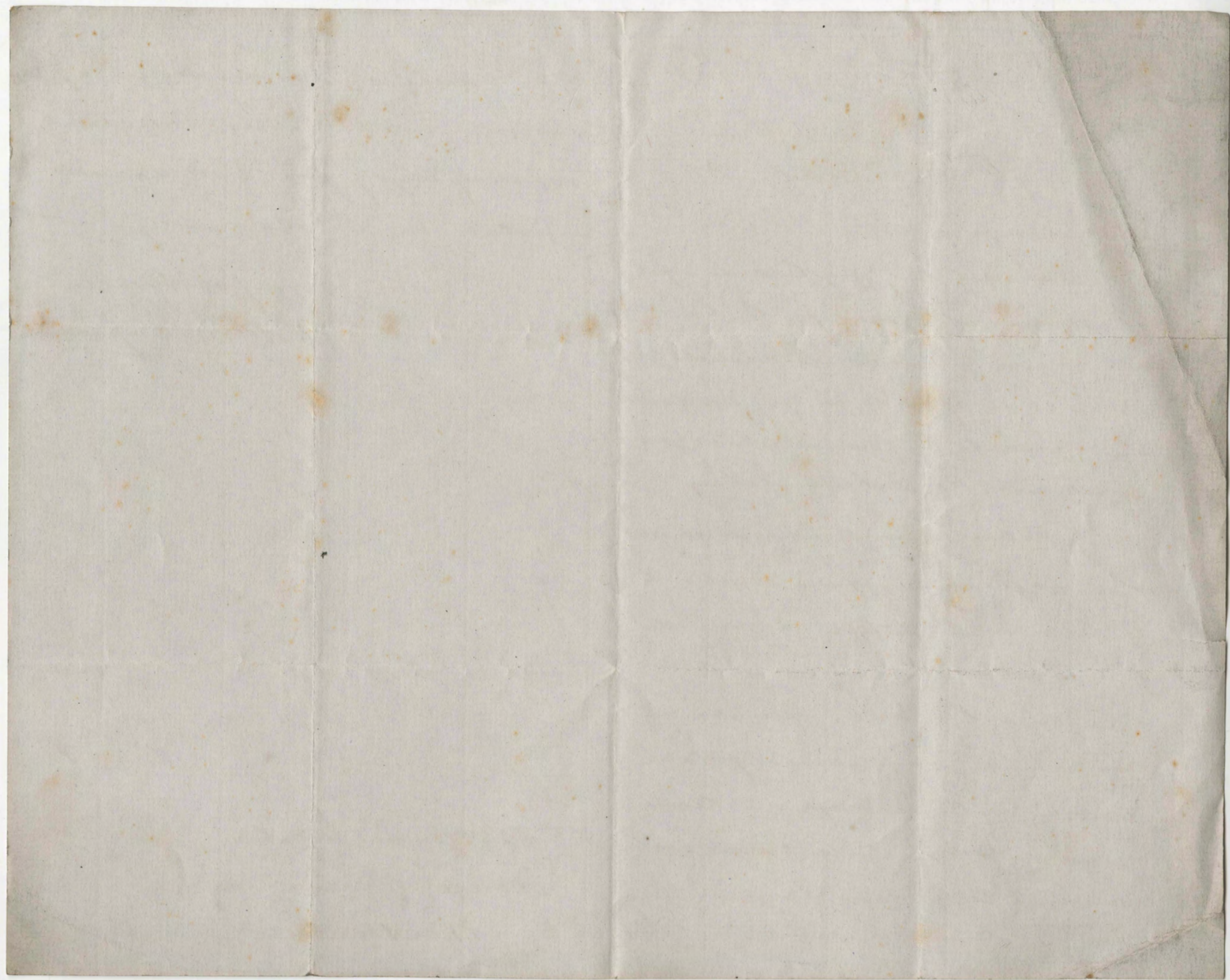

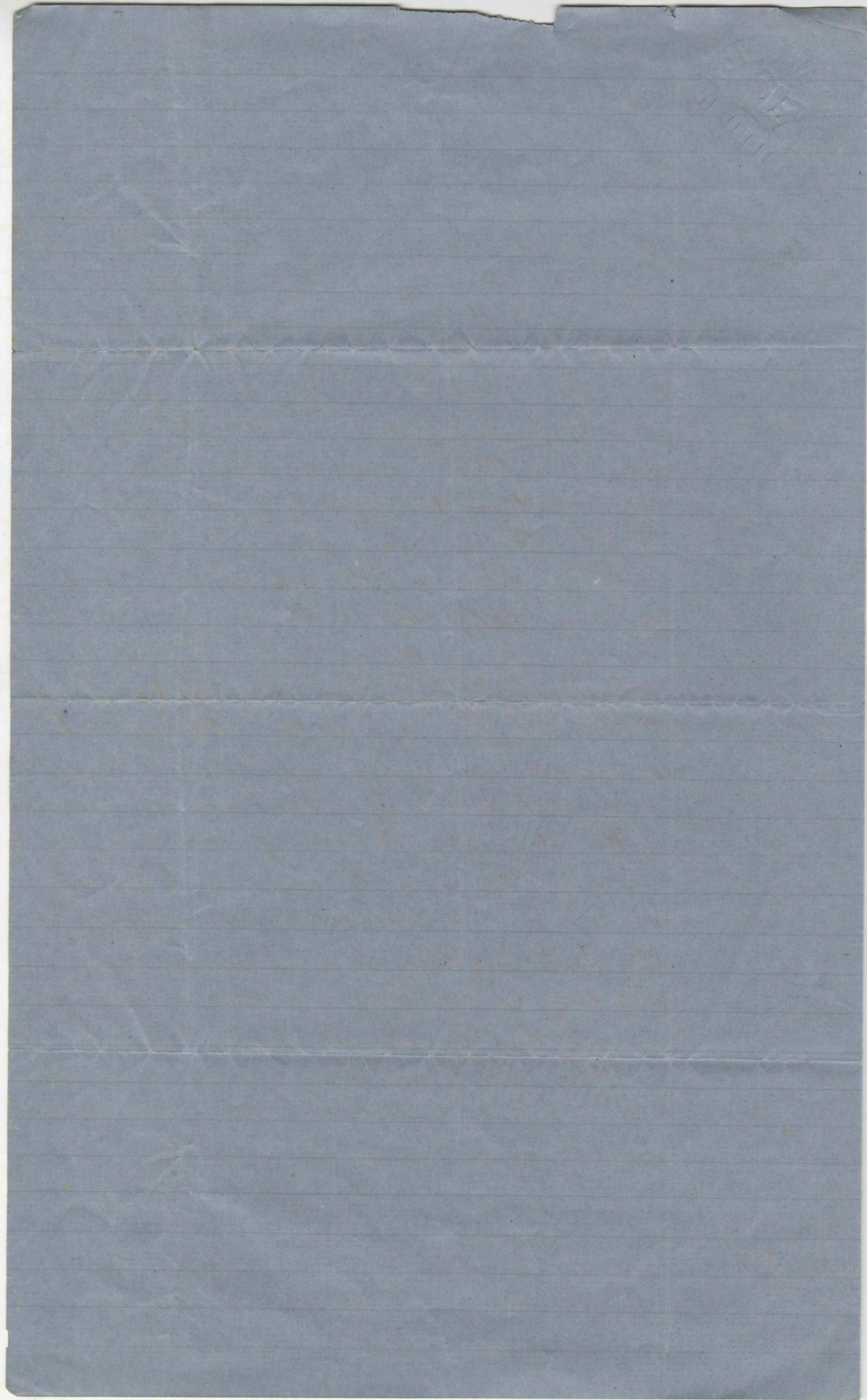

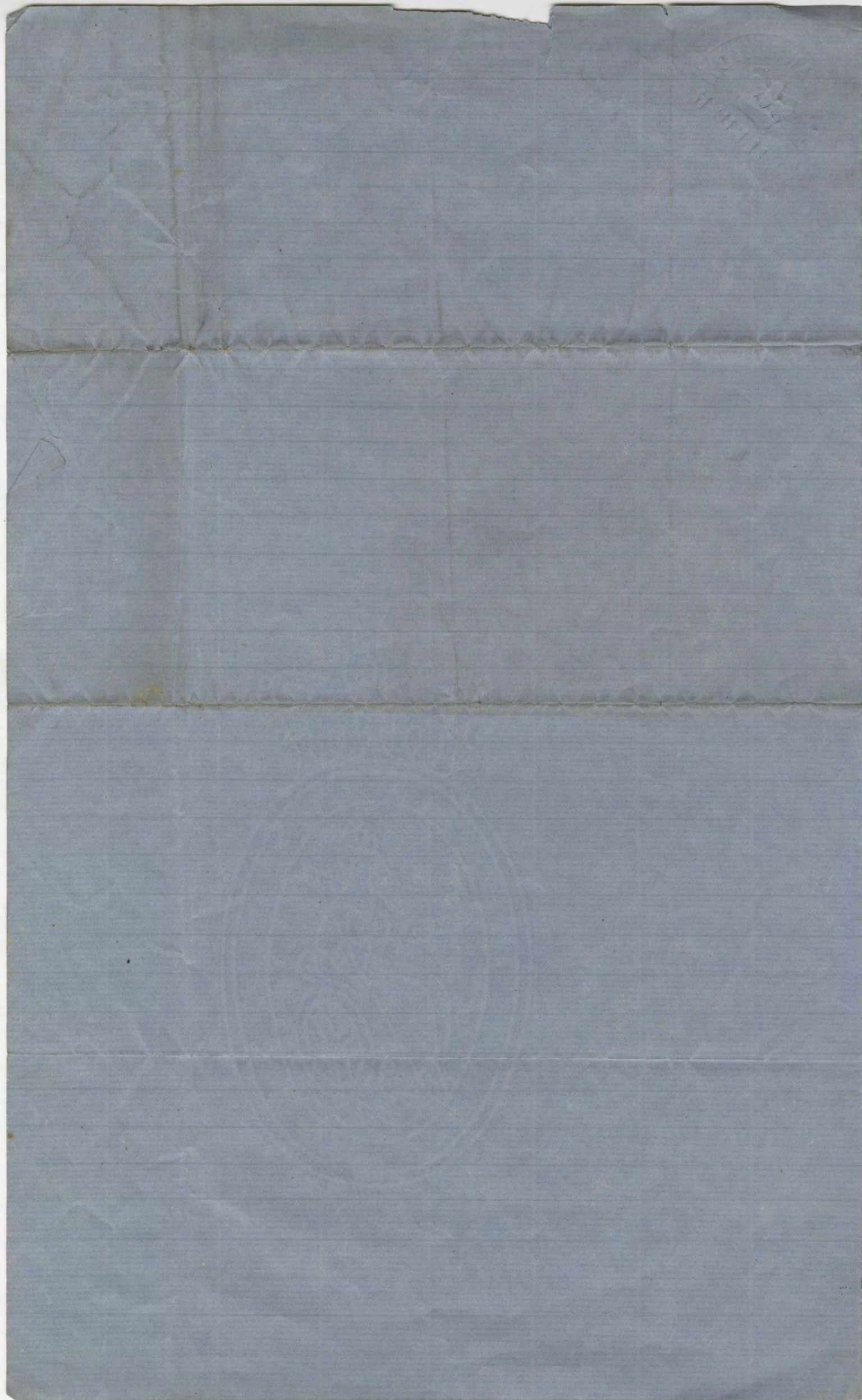

since I saw you, upon which
occasions, you kindly gave me
half a sovereign, but remarked
that all the loans when I was
in Paris had not been paid
up, I have all the documents
and I make up our account
as follows. When I left Paris
in 1854, you made out a

Short account in the presence
of Garet O'Moore which you
put on paper stating that
I owed you £10- which amount
you told me to pay when
I was in funds, In 1861—
the year you came back
from America I heard
from old Deacon that you
were in London, I immediately
called at the Junior United
Service Club and left a letter
for you inviting you to
dine with me in Suffolk
Street Pall Mall on the following
day, when you came I asked
you to come into the bedroom

And there I immediately gave
you £10- and tore up the bit
of paper you gave me.

After that in 1863, I gave you
£5- and a box of Cigars
and also my acceptance
for £25- which I paid
which makes £30- in my favor
That transaction took place
in Gernyn Street, afterwards
when I went to Paris in 1864
you gave me 100- and 10 francs
that amount added to the
10 shillings you kindly gave
me lately in the House
of Commons makes me well
say in round numbers
£5- but when I was in
Paris in 1864- we came to

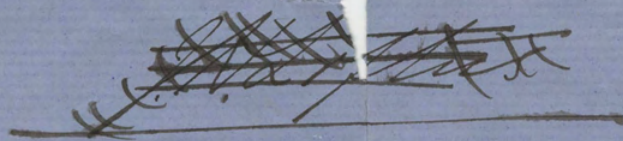

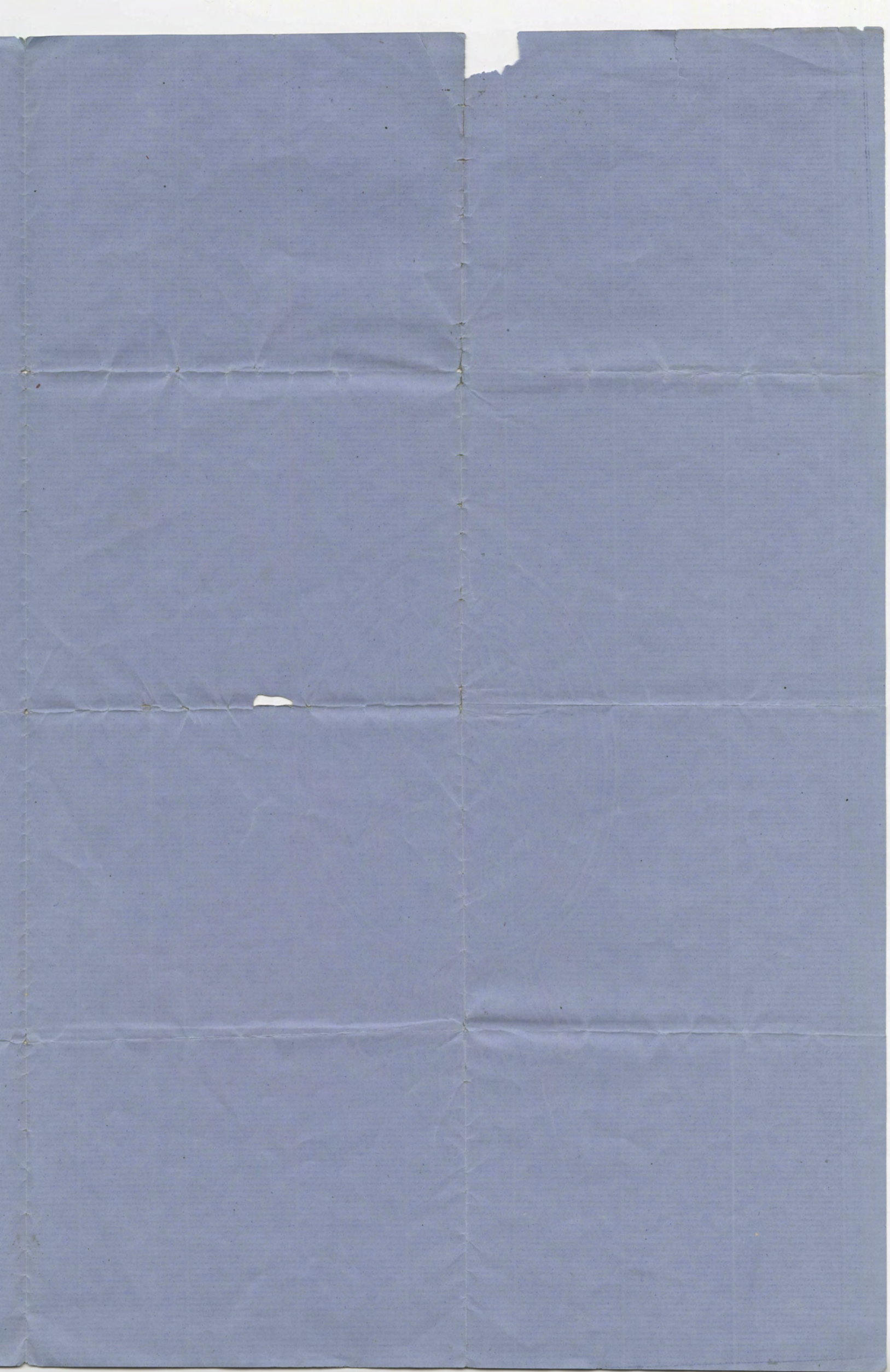

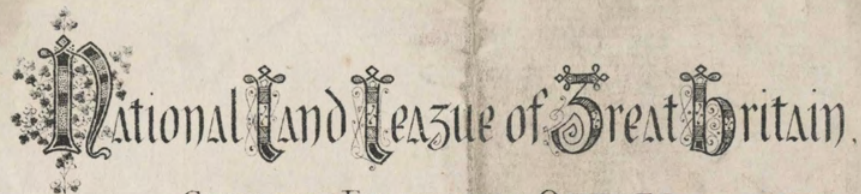
