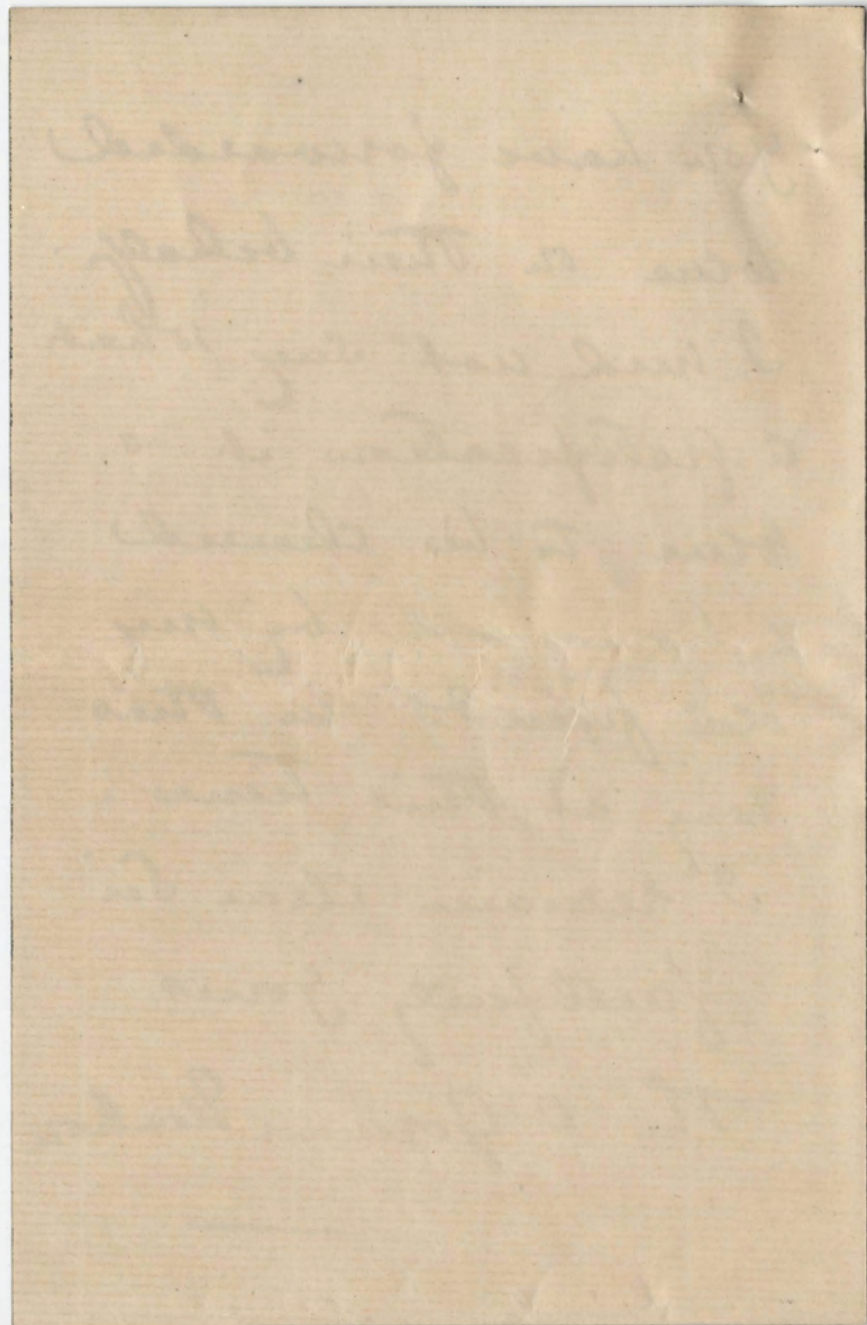

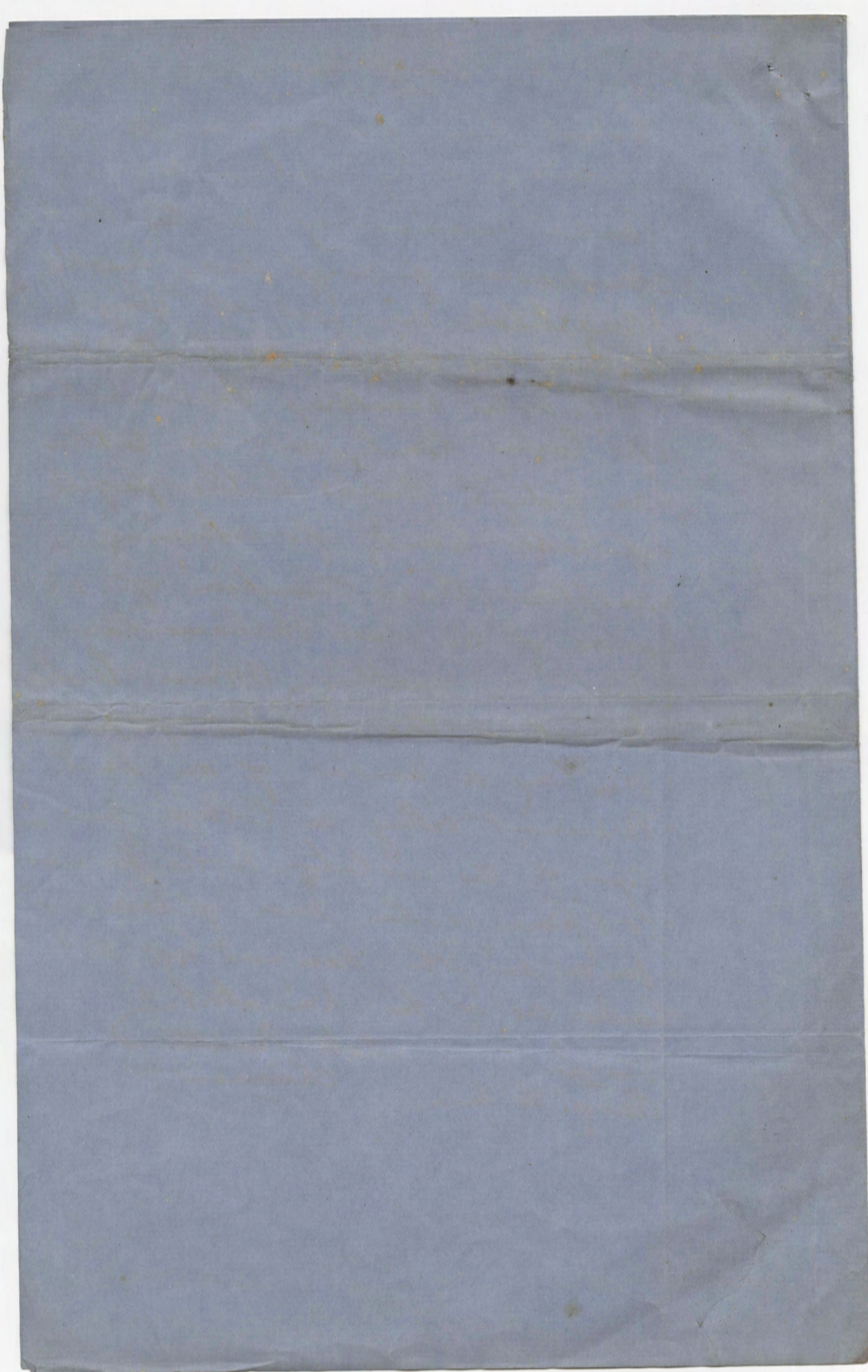

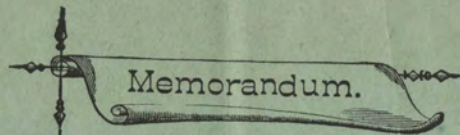

to organize penny concerts
on Saturday evenings to pay
the current expenses, and
to send a delegate to the

selected today.

during the year, but none

Dear Colonel

I hope you reached Naples all right and was none the worse for your journey. I went home feeling somewhat lonely and scarcely knowing what to think of the situation - for I had counted on your remaining here to see me through my difficult undertaking - however I saw you had set your mind on a change - I have not yet had a note from the Maestro de Camera relative to the sitting - Gai came in about 4.30 and was quite astonished to find you had really flown away alone - I hope you will get on all right there, and above all get rid of your nasty attack - your carelessness of yourself here brought on.

I have to turn out of these lodgings tomorrow Sunday and have taken just one room which is quite enough for me while I remain, for this room I pay about 7 francs and a half per week - this is

me a line to Port Antonio Bona to
say how you are progressing on your
journey - I went to the Vatican this
morning to enquire about the ticket
for St Peter's tomorrow morning at 8-30
the Holy Father officiating - but the
entrance was so thronged with the
multitude trying to gain an entrance
I presume for an order for the ceremony
tomorrow, I gave up the idea of getting

admission and returned home again - as soon as I hear
from you as to your movements I will write again - I
expect however to learn that you have taken your birth or
one of the steamers bound for London or Liverpool

I cannot possibly say anything about my plans
until I hear from the Vatican -
Take care of yourself dear old boy and don't let those
heavily taxed chest you and take all your elixirs away as
the boys they are sure to do cause more
