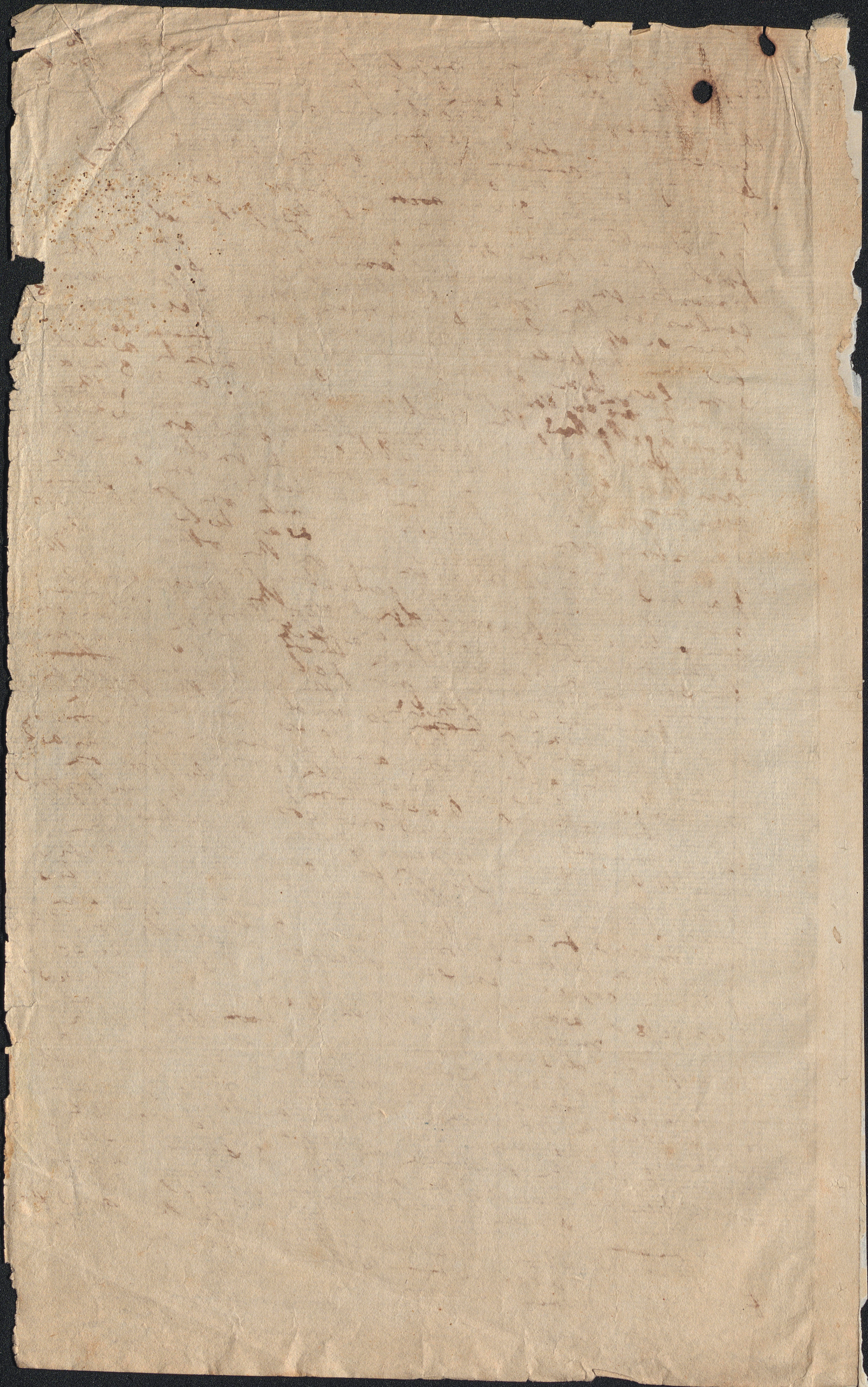


B. 3. I beg my reply to your answer to

 vertising of newspapers, which those concerned in the ad-
 ministration suppose, I want to have a tendency to make
 the people approve of their measures, and that many
 writings of that kind have been distributed at all
 the expense. But I have not been informed so as to
 give credit to it, that any of the secret service money
 has been applied to the payment of the writers; altho
 I think, if the fact is, that public money is paid for the
 printing, and the distribution of those writings that it is also
 paid for the writing. But as to this you may be
 I am in better informed than I am as you are
 not only a writer on that subject but also high in
 office yourself, and prominent in the confidence of those
 who are still higher in office. So I do not think
 so many means are now made use of by law, and by
 improper practices, to prevent the people from getting
 full information that I can expect. But one other
 more that can be added to them, and that was attempt-
 ed last year in Congress - the building of those inde-
