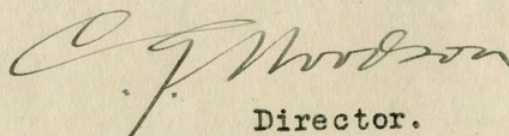
My dear Pres. Judson:

I write this to secure from you an opinion as to the value of the work which the Association has accomplished, especially in publishing the Journal of Negro History. I am now making an effort to bring our needs before a number of philanthropists and boards with a view to securing additional financial support that the work may be more thoroughly prosecuted. That they may give my appeal serious consideration, I desire to have it supported by the opinions of the leading scholars of the country.

You may not know that for the first three years the Journal of Negro History was supported almost exclusively by my own funds, although my income has never been more than \$2500 a year. Last year we were successful in securing from various sources sufficient contributions to cover the cost of publication. Owing to the recent increase in the cost of labor and supplies, however, I find that we shall have a deficit unless help is obtained from another quarter. I am not making an appeal to you for funds, but for such an endorsement as will convince philanthropists subsidizing scientific enterprises that this work is worth while.
