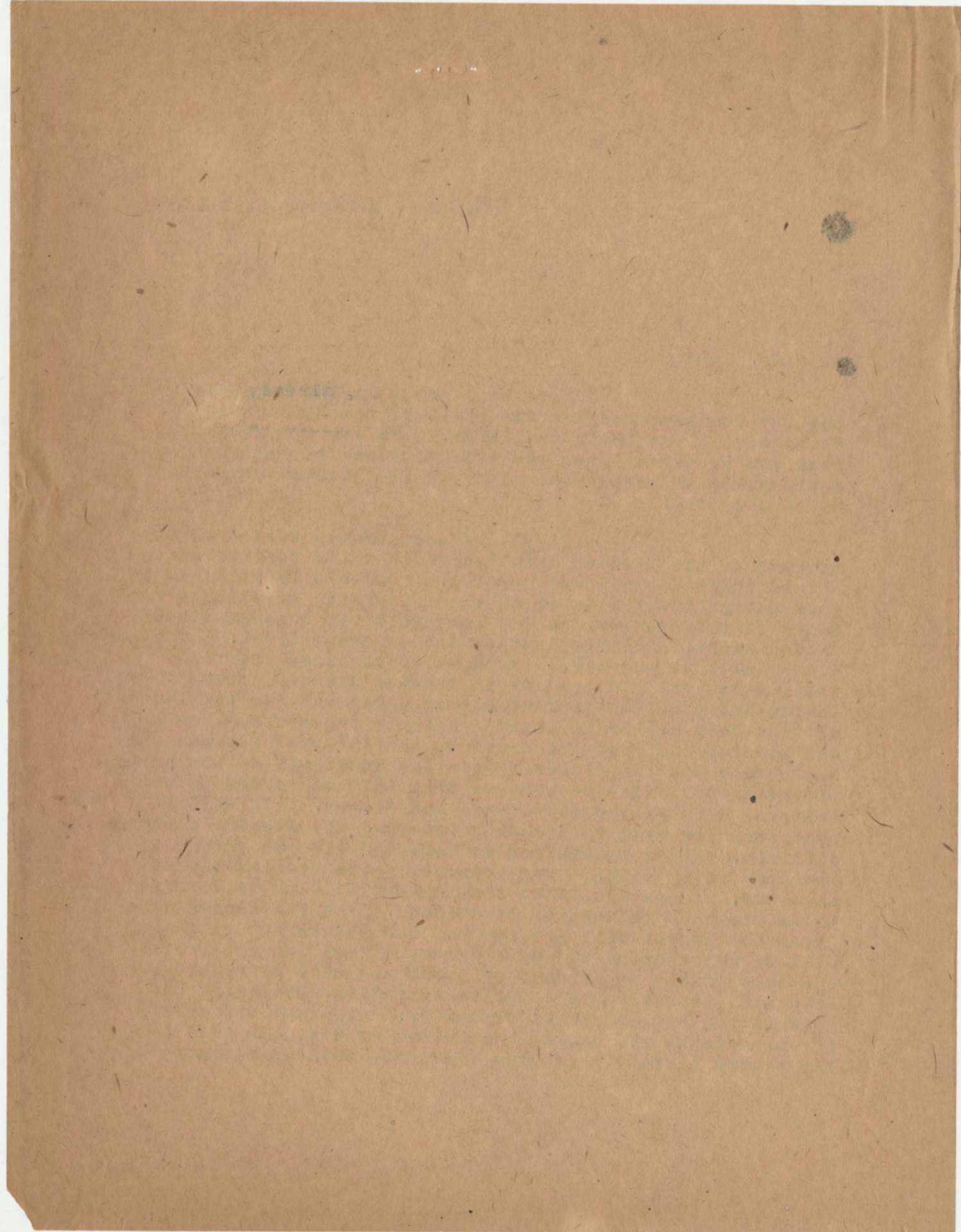


Chicago, November 6, 1918.

Dear Mr. Aydelotte:

I hope that you have already received the outline prepared for the visit of the Mission to Chicago. I enclose a duplicate. To certain items I wish now to direct your own attention and to request your cooperation in making the visit of the Mission comfortable and successful.

Will you be good enough to consult the members of the Mission with regard to their desires on the points which I shall now mention. Especially will you be good enough to wire to me at the University of Chicago the names of the speakers at our University of Chicago dinner, Friday night. Of that matter let me speak first. The dinner will be at 7:30. Members of the faculties and their wives will be present in evening dress. Dean Talbot has provided comfortable arrangements for the ladies so that they may bring their evening clothes with them in the morning and rest and dress in the interval between the conference and the dinner. For the gentlemen of the party provision will also be made so that they may dress in the interval between the conference and dinner. It will be necessary for each to remember to bring his evening clothes with him, unless he desires to take the time to return to the University Club. The members of the Mission may not be aware, as you are, that the University Club is several miles from the University of Chicago. At the dinner Vice-President Angell will preside and the University of Chicago will be represented by two speakers - Paul Shorey, Professor and Head of the Department of Greek who will represent the Arts and Literature, and Julius Stieglitz, Professor and Head of the Department of Chemistry. You may assure any of our friends who may be suspicious of his name that he has proved himself a genuine American, both as a member of



the University and as President of the American Chemical Society. The record of our Chemistry Department under Professor Stieglitz's supervision is a very proud one. Of the British Mission, we shall be glad to hear from each member. If such a programme proves to be too long, as of course it may be, we hope to hear at least from Dr. Shipley, Sir Henry Jones and one of the ladies. We are leaving this matter in your hands because you can tactfully arrange the programme as the members of the Mission will desire. Will you wire me the names so that I can print a programme.

I emphasize again the desirability of having the bags brought out to the University in the morning so that the men may dress in the homes of the faculties in the interval between the conference and dinner.

We understand that the members of the Mission would very much like to see some of the classes at work. Because of the arrangement of our schedule, it will be difficult to find classes at the hours convenient for the Mission. The Student Army Training Corps drills from 11:00 to 12:00 and mess takes the time immediately after that. Consequently we have very few classes at the time of day most convenient for our guests. We call attention, however, to three classes at that hour. In the History class, Miss Sidgwick may be interested. In the Literature class perhaps Miss Spurgeon will find something interesting, and in Professor Lillie's course perhaps Dr. Shipley can find something. I am very sorry that we have absolutely nothing in Geography or Geology at that time. Perhaps Miss Spurgeon and Miss Sidgwick will be interested in English 3, our course in Sophomore Composition at 10:10. There are two sections - one conducted by James Weber Linn and the other by Edith Foster Flint. The typical American course in Composition might be here studied. It will be necessary, of course, to come to the University immediately if the ladies desire to visit the 10:10 classes.

I direct your attention to the subjects proposed for the business conference in the afternoon. Mr. Angell has, doubtless, written to you on this subject. Will you be good enough to call the attention of the members of the Mission to some of these topics so that we may really join issues in some of our discussions. By the way, cap and gown will not be worn at the conference of the members of the faculties. The meeting will not be general public one. I have arranged for a stenographic record to be made.

The University of Chicago has provided for motors from the time of your arrival until you leave on Saturday morning. We have thought it best to leave in your personal charge the provision of motors to take care of the party on the return from Champaign because the hour of the return from the University of Illinois is uncertain.

In the case of motors for Sunday, will you communicate with Mr. Angell or myself. We shall be glad to get notice as far in advance as possible.

At the University Club I have made arrangements for the members of the Mission and yourself. I understand that President Cowling and Dr. Ryan are with or will join the party. Having no direct information I have made no provision for them.

I am bringing these matters to your attention and have sent the outline of the trip to the members of the Mission together with a little Guide Book, which I prepared some time since, so that en route from Ann Arbor to Chicago the members of the Mission may be able to formulate somewhat their desires as to their visit to the University of Chicago. I know that you understand from our previous conversation that we wish to accommodate ourselves as much as possible to the comfort of the visitors and to provide all possible facilities for making their visit a fruitful one.

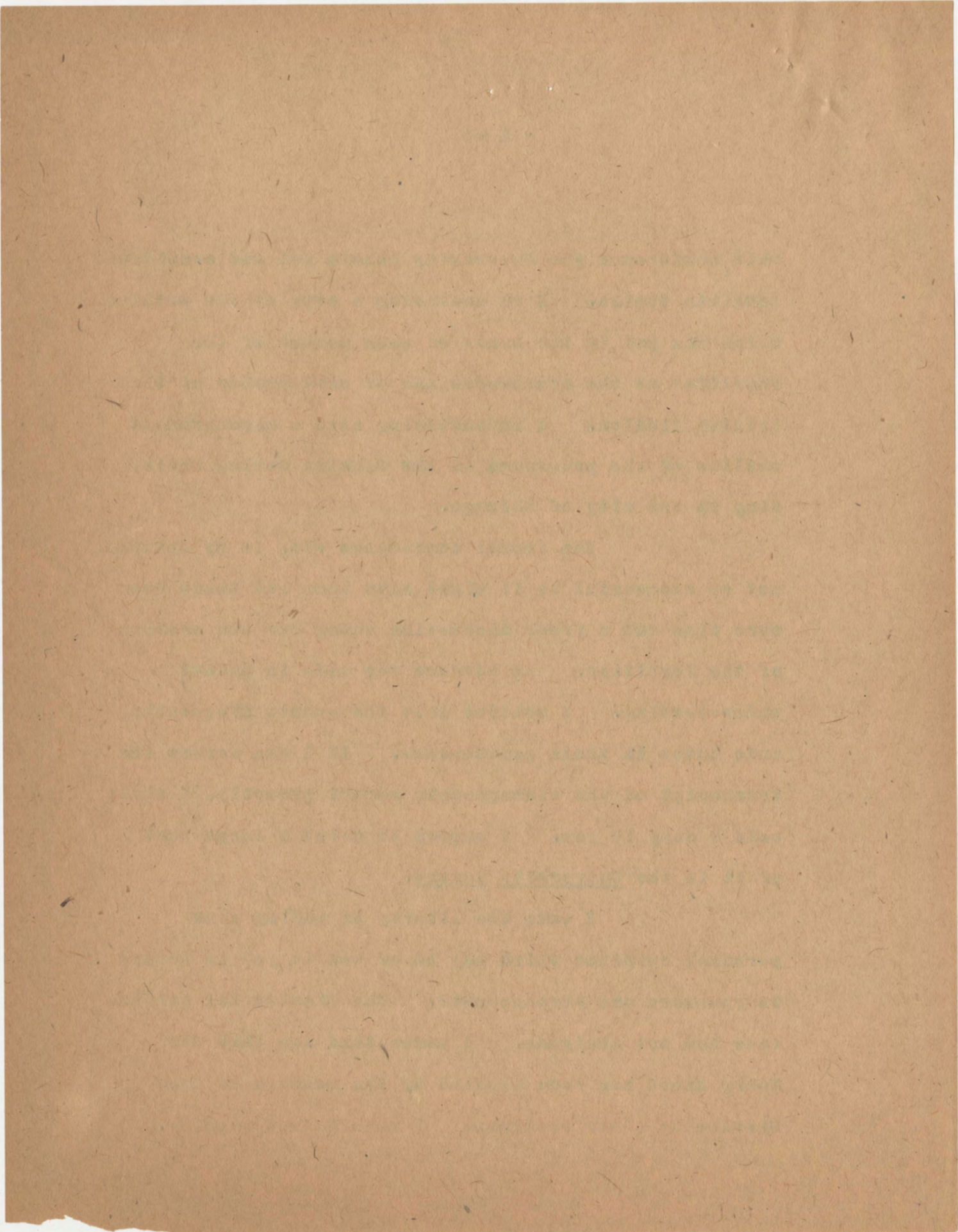
Dear President Alderman:

In the absence of President Judson I acknowledge your letter of November 8 regarding the entertainment of the British Mission at the University of Chicago. In making our arrangements we had the advantage of more or less direct communication with Dr. Shipley regarding the wishes of the Mission. We learned that all of the members of the party felt very strongly that the very hospitable but public entertainments given to them in the East had been trying physically and not gainful so far as the purpose of the Mission was concerned. The members of the Mission say quite frankly that they are able to learn more in conference and in informal conversations than they are at receptions and at public banquets. On this account we decided that, at the University of Chicago, our principal meeting should be a conference. In preparation for

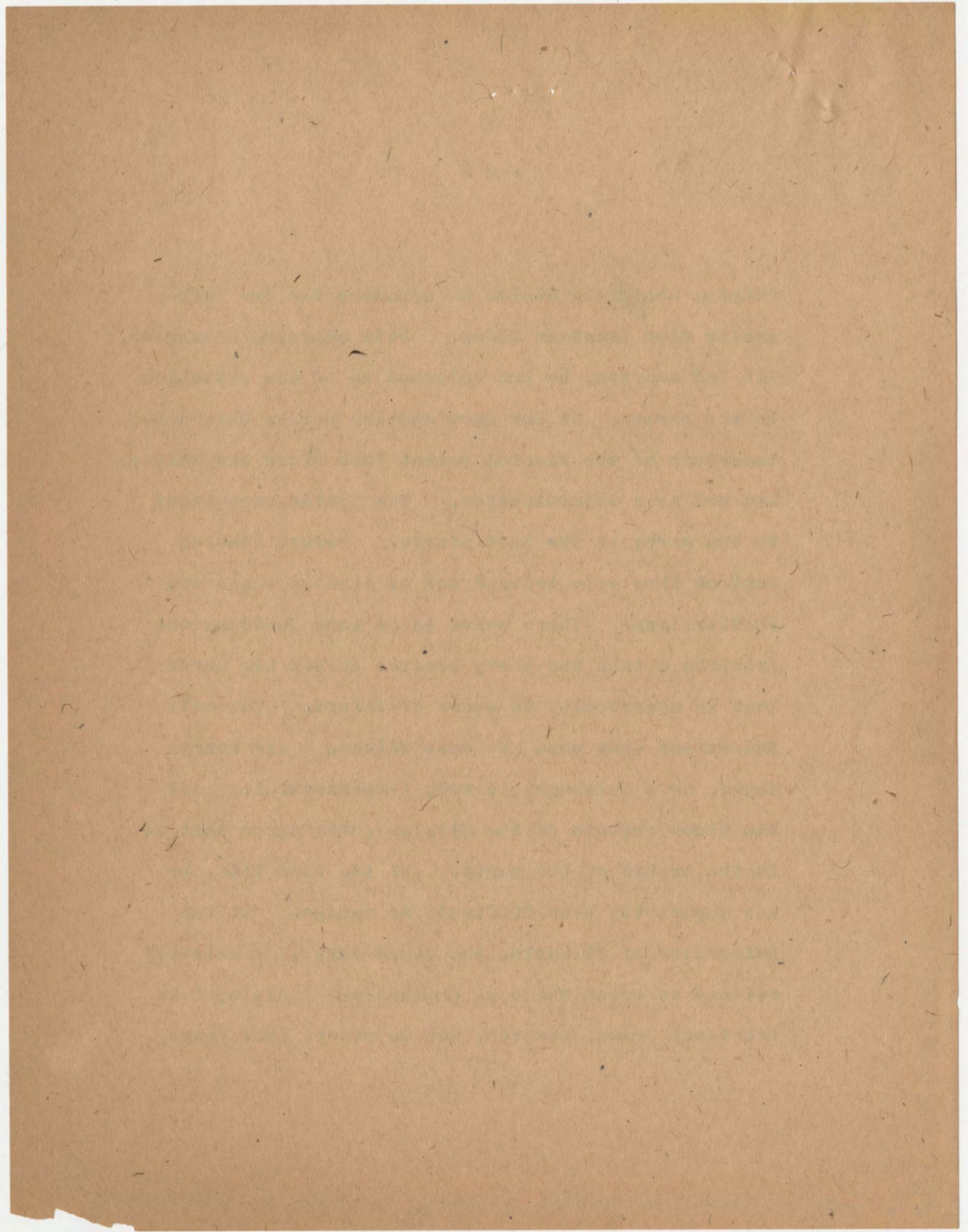
this conference the University Senate met and considered possible topics. I am enclosing a copy of the outline which was put in the hands of each member of the faculties at the conference and of each member of the British Mission. I am enclosing also a mimeographed outline of the programme of the mission during their stay in the city of Chicago.

The formal conference was, in my opinion, not so successful as it might have been had there been more time and a freer discussion among our own members of the faculties. An advance was made in mutual understanding. I noticed that the guests frequently made notes in their pocketbooks. If I can secure the transcript of the stenographic report promptly, I shall send a copy to you. I expect to print a large part of it in the University Record.

I take the liberty of adding some personal opinions which may be of use to you in regard to speakers and arrangements. The Mission has heretofore had no chairman. I understand now that Sir Henry Miers has been elected by the members of the Mission as their chairman. I have talked with Dr.



Shipley about the choice of speakers for our University Club luncheon today. With charming frankness, wit and courtesy he has informed me of the situation in the party. No one knew another person before the departure of the Mission except that Eilers and Shipley had had some communication. The ladies were added to the party at the last minute. Before leaving England they were ordered not to discuss their own institutions. There seems to be some jealousy and friction within the party because Walker has never lost an opportunity to speak of Oxford. You will understand that when you meet Walker. Sir Henry Jones, as a Welshman, is very temperamental. All the other members of the Mission quite agree that he is the orator of the party. At the same time, he has apparently been difficult to manage. At the University of Illinois, the other day, he resolutely refused to speak while at Champaign. Shipley told President James, however, not to worry, that Jones



in the presence of 3,000 students to be assembled, undoubtedly, would "feel moved to speak." Sure enough the mild peevishness of the old man left him in the presence of a great audience and he spoke like a prophet. At the University of Chicago, we made the mistake of putting him last on our programme at dinner. He arose and, after graceful compliment to the ladies, announced himself as their only possible rival in having the last word: "Good-night." Of course the programme was long and it was late, but I suspect that back of his graceful and brief utterance was something which showed in his remark that he was the tail of the Mission. Our idea in putting him last was to secure a climax. Apparently, however, he desires to be called on first. I cannot guarantee that this will be the situation when he reaches Charlottesville. Dr. Joly is very earnest and can be witty. Sir Henry Miers has an immense fund of common sense. He and Shipley have had experience in administration. They both show that experience. The others show just as clearly their professorial

experience. Miers speaks very acceptably. Shipley is the wit of the party. In Chicago he has not given utterance to much serious thought. He has kept his audience in a good humour, however. I took him for a drive on Sunday afternoon. During the entire time he was bubbling with witty stories, pointed limericks and poems. He is, undoubtedly, the cosmopolite of the party. I think you will find that, while he leaves to others the public utterances of the Mission, he has been especially busy in accumulating important information. He is keen on analysis and quick to extract just the important items he most needs. He is, moreover, seriously independent, though punctilious in regard to the programme. Today for instance, although he will attend the meeting of the Association of State Universities as scheduled, he and Sir Henry Miers will make a special point to attend a meeting of our Board of Trustees which is in regular session. Shipley said that thus far the American committees had been very hospitable, but he had not yet come in contact with two important members of the

American universities - the students and the Board of Trustees. He very quickly seized the opportunity to attend a session of our Board. I have mentioned his interest in students. An incident will show how genuine is this interest. Being interested in Peter House, I asked him about Sir Adolphus Ward. He told me how Ward as Master of Peter House had somewhat changed his habits and isolated himself from students. Shipley told his students after his election as Master and Vice-Chancellor that he had placed upon his outer door an especially easy handle, and he desired them to turn it and walk in as they always had done. The result is naturally that students do turn Shipley's door handle and walk in to see him. When they have to ring a bell, be admitted by a butler and announced in the presence of the master of another college, they do not go. Walker has an infinite passion for information. He is like Finsbury in "The Wrong Box." He has the passion to excess. For instance on Saturday, he desired "particularly to know the exact stipend of the Vice-Chancellor of each university as yet visited, and whether the stipend included housing and washing."

The two ladies are very charming. Miss Spurgeon is very competent in the field of which I know most - English Literature. She is an excellent speaker and a very sensible and witty person. She made one of the best speeches at the University of Chicago. Miss Sidgwick also made a good speech. She is a sister of Ethel Sidgwick. The two women slyly digged at Walker and the attitude of Oxford towards women - in that women are permitted to study but are not allowed to get degrees. There is a possibility that the two women may leave the party after the visit to Madison, Wisconsin.

I hope that this frank discussion of the personalities involved will not seem to you indiscreet. I am writing with the freedom with which I know President Judson would write to you. I hope also that the remarks may be of some use in determining how to use the members of the Mission as speakers. If all speak, your programme is likely to be long. If you want only one, choose Sir Henry Jones.

I should warn you that travelling with the party is Lieutenant Nichols who is secretary to Dr.

The first thing I noticed when I stepped out of the car was the cold. It was a sharp contrast to the warm blanket I had been sitting under. I looked around and saw a few other people walking towards the building. The air was thick with the smell of old books and the sound of footsteps on the cobblestone path. I took a deep breath and felt a sense of anticipation. This was my first time here, and I was excited to see what I would find. The building was a large, old structure with many windows. I walked up the steps and entered the main hall. The room was filled with bookshelves and tables. I saw a few people sitting at the tables, reading or writing. I approached a man who was standing near the entrance. He looked at me and smiled. He told me that I was in the right place and that I should go to the second floor. I followed him and found a room with a desk and a chair. I sat down and looked at the papers on the desk. They were old and yellowed, but I could see that they were important. I picked up one of the papers and read it. It was a letter from a man who had written to me. I felt a sense of connection to the man who had written to me. I continued to read the papers and found many more letters. Some were from friends and some were from strangers. I felt a sense of wonder and curiosity. I had found a treasure trove of information. I looked at my watch and saw that it was late. I decided to stop for now and go home. I walked back to the car and got in. I looked at the papers one more time and then closed the door. I felt a sense of accomplishment and satisfaction. I had found what I was looking for.

Shipley and Dr. Ryan of the American Council of Education. Mr. Aydelotte travelled as far as Chicago. I understand he is now going to return to his work in connection with the Student Army Training Corps War Aims Course. There may, however, be additional representatives when the Mission reaches you. We had no knowledge whatever of the presence of these persons in the party and had to make luncheon adjustments at the last minute.

My dear Mr. Angell:

I enclose a brief statement about the proposed visit of the British Commission to the Hyde Park High School. Will you be good enough to give instructions to the people who take the members of the Commission to their hotels to report to me late this evening whether any of these people are to go to the high school? You will note that the hour set down on the general calendar for them to leave their hotels will have to be modified somewhat if they see anything of the high school. I have put it down in this statement that they will be called for at 8:30. They could be called for at 9:00. In that case they would have one hour at the high school. 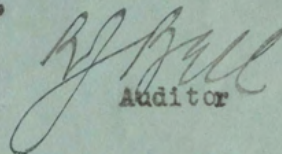

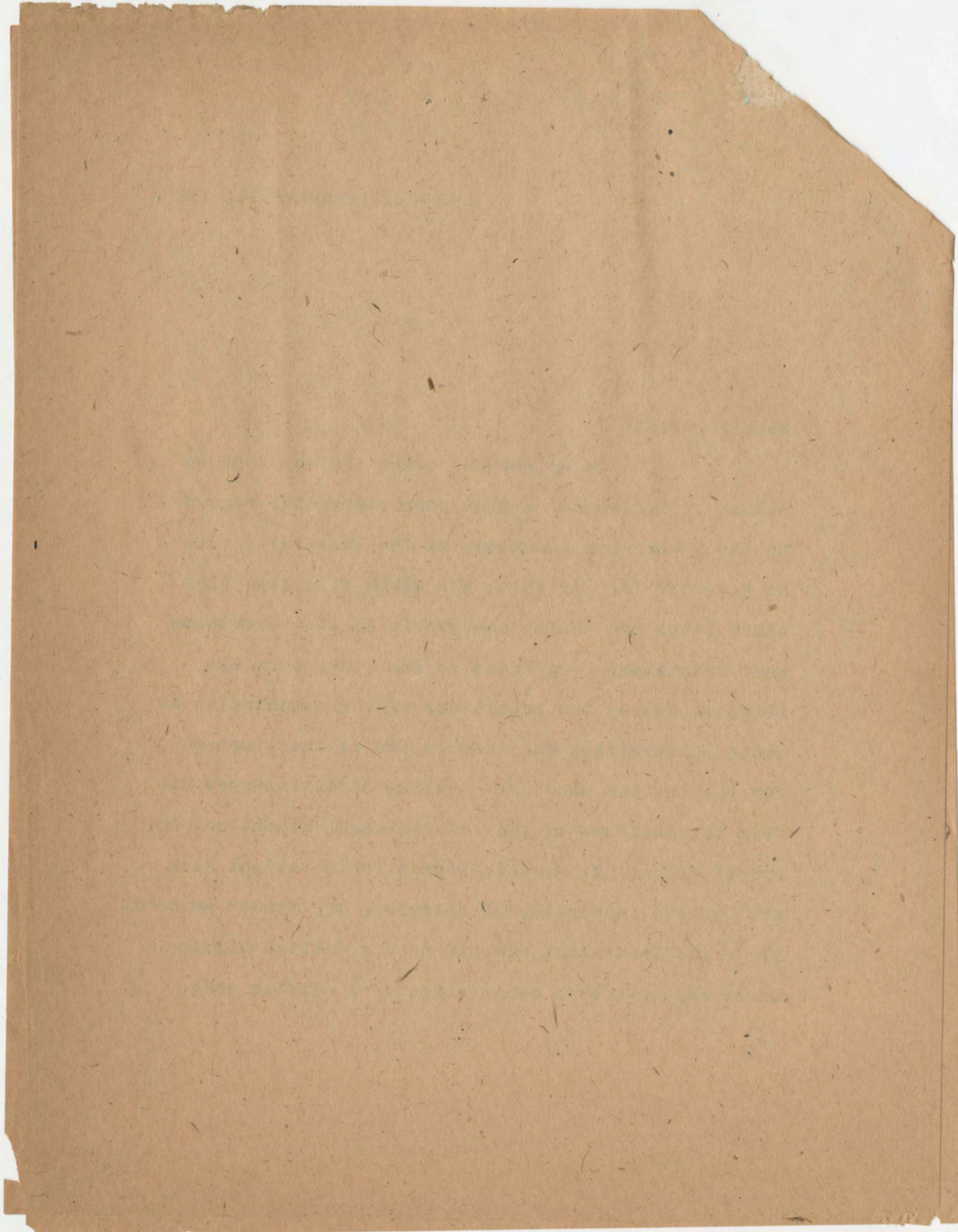

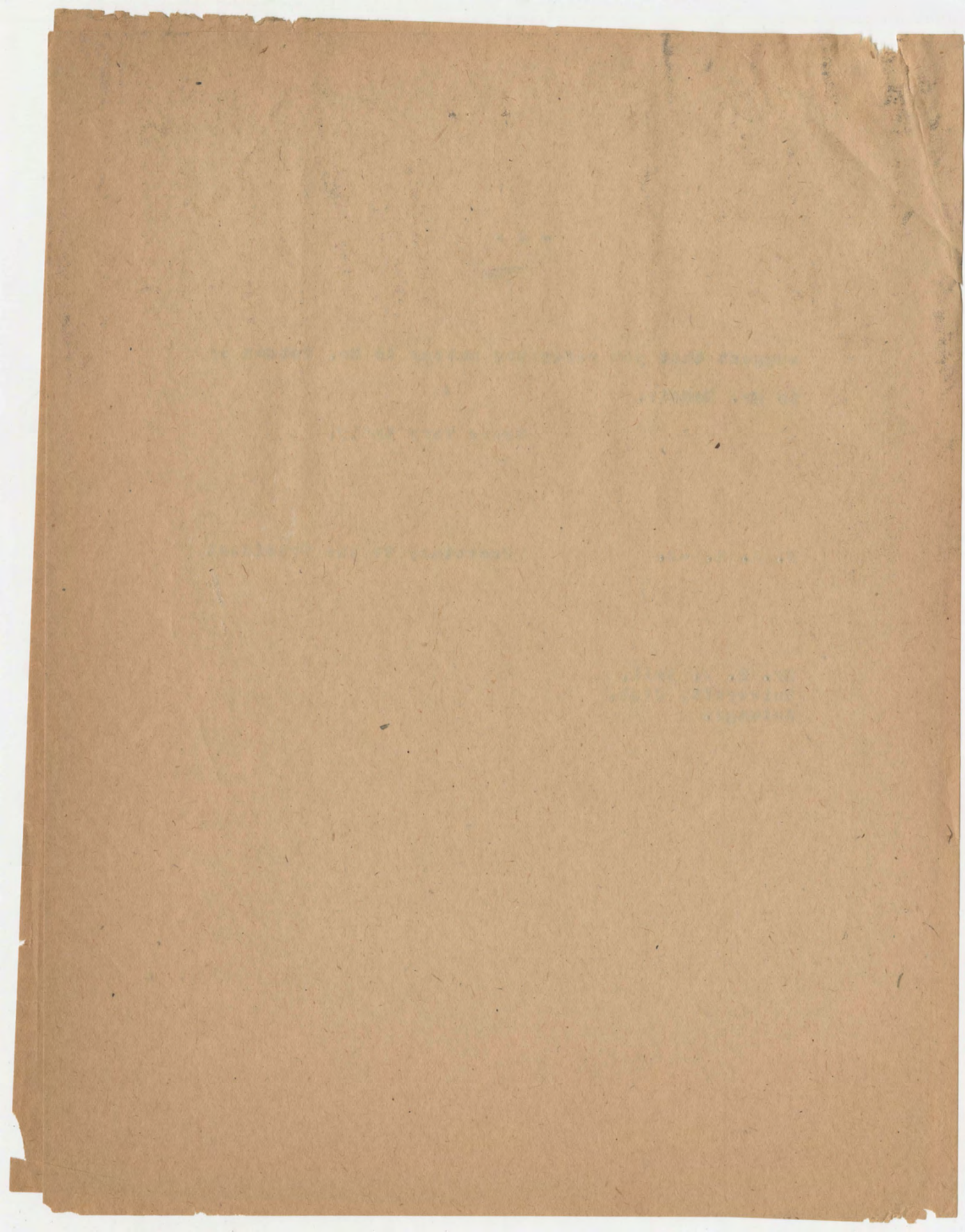
