I am sending to you, under separate cover, a copy of the pamphlet which we have prepared regarding The Chicago Community Trust, a fund for local charity established by resolution of the Board of Directors of the Harris Trust and Savings Bank May 12, 1915. Mr. Albert W. Harris, President of this Bank, has contributed the sum of \$100,000 to this Trust and the late Mr. N. W. Harris the sum of \$75,000, and Mrs. N. W. Harris the sum of \$25,000, and I may say in confidence that it is quite likely that about half a million dollars more will be turned into this fund very soon by the Harris family. You see, therefore, that the Trust has already made quite a respectable beginning.

It has been our thought that it would be advantageous to employ a secretary on full time to further the interests of this Foundation. The thought is that we should have a man of broad experience, of ability, and of pleasing personality, who would be able to interest others in giving or leaving funds to this Trust, and who would be able to develop the work along the lines indicated

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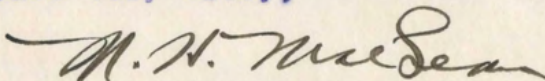

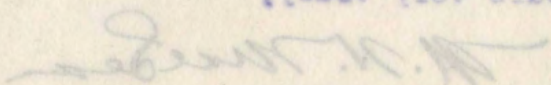
