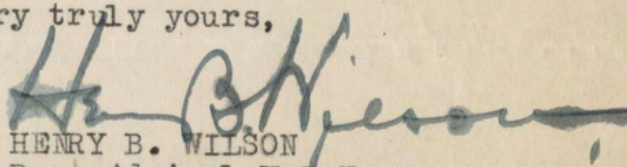
Dear Sir:

Just as the President was leaving for his transatlantic trip, he asked me to send you the following letter which he dictated:

"After careful consideration of the whole situation including the stipends that are paid to other young physicians in similar situations in the city, I feel obliged to say that I do not think the University ought to pay over \$600. a quarter for such service as was proposed in my letter of July 10th. Because I was reluctant to sever the relations which have existed between the University and you, I was willing to make the stipend \$700. a quarter; but I do not see my way to increase that sum to \$900. I fear, therefore, that I cannot modify the terms of my letter of July 10th."

The President would be glad to have you indicate to Vice-President Tufts your attitude toward this proposition.

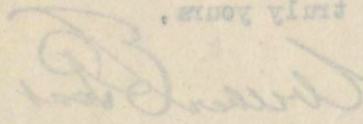
