Article I. -- Name.

The name of this organization shall be the MORGAN PARK CLUB OF THE UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO.

Article II. -- Membership.

- Sec. 1. Any person who has come to the University directly from Morgan Park Academy, and who has matriculated in one of the colleges of the University, shall become a member of this organization upon making application to the secretary, and paying the initiation fee.
- Sec. 2. Any person who has attended the Morgan Park Academy for three months, received an honorable dismissal from the same, and matriculated in the University of Chicago, may, upon application to the secretary, be elected to membership by a majority vote of those members in residence at the University. This vote shall be by ballot.

Article III. -- Officers.

- Sec. 1. The officers of this Club shall be, President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. These officers shall constitute the Executive Committee.
- Sec. 2. The Executive Committee shall make all arrangements for the meetings of the Club, except as specified in Article IV. They shall have

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constitute the Executive Committee.

power to fill any vacancies that may occur in their number.

Sec.3. At the meeting in the spring quarter, the President shall appoint a nominating committee. This committee shall receive all nominations, and shall report the same at the meeting in the autumn quarter. They shall, themselves, nominate at least one candidate for each office. At least one week before the meeting in the autumn quarter they shall send each member a list of the nominations made by themselves and those already received from others.

The officers shall be elected at the meeting in the autumn quarter, and shall serve for one year or until their successors are elected.

Article IV. -- Meetings.

The Executive Committee shall arrange for three regular meetings each year, as follows: in the early part of the autumn quarter, there shall be a banquet for the Club, to welcome in new members; in the winter quarter, there shall be a reception at the University for the Club and the Senior Class of Morgan Park Academy, on which occasion the President of the University may meet the members of this Class; in the spring quarter, there shall be a reception at Morgan Park for the Club and the Senior Class of the Academy.

Article V. -- Fees.

There shall be an initiation fee of twenty-five cents (\$.25). Each member shall pay a fee of fifty cents (\$.50) per year during residence at

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the University.

Article IV. -- Amendment.

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular meeting.

Article VIII. Amendments. to this constitution may be proposed at any of the meetings of the Club, and carried by a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote.

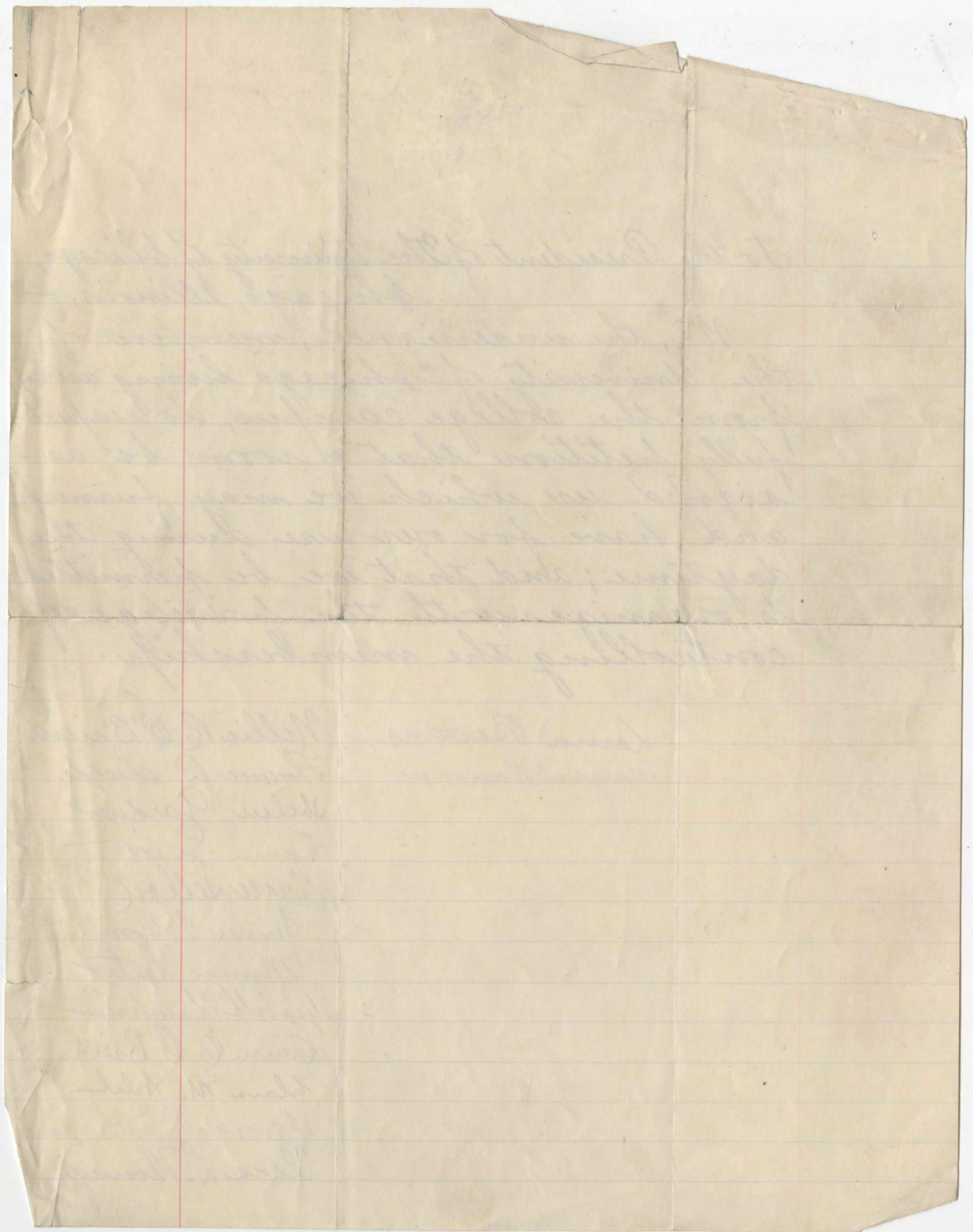

Any member of the University who is acting, or has

been acting, while in residence here, as a regular correspondent for a newspaper or other periodical, or as editor of a student publication, issued monthly or oftener, is eligible for active membership.

When a name is proposed for membership in this Club, it shall be the duty of the member proposing it, to deliver such name in writing to the Secretary, who shall forthwith post notice of such an application on the bulletin board of the Club, where it shall remain for two weeks.

Article I - Name.

This organization shall be known as the University College Association of the University of Chicago.

Article II - Objects.

Article III - Membership.

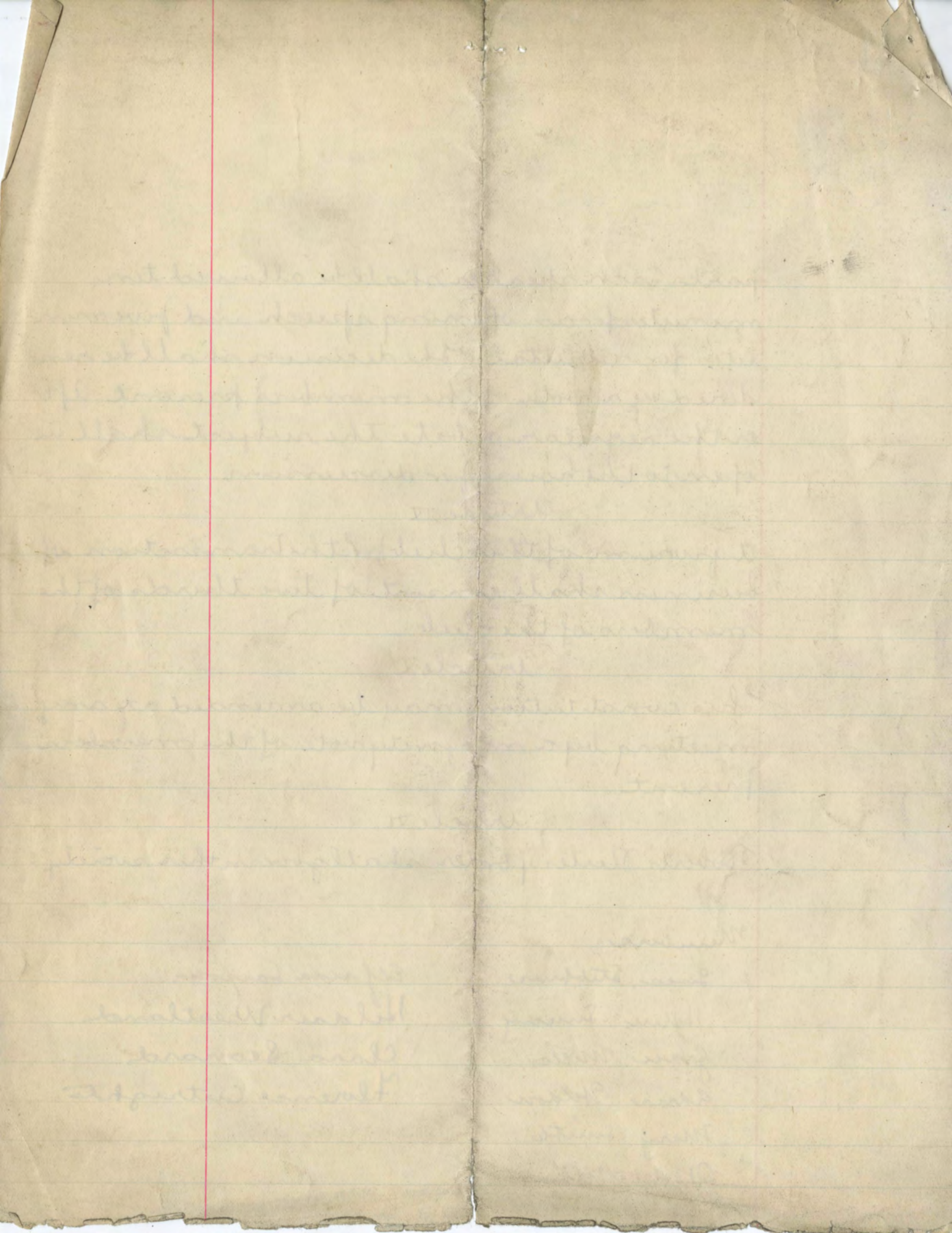

The Intercollegiate Socialist Society was organized on September 12, 1905, at 140 Fulton Street, New York City, by a gathering which met in response to the following call:

CALL FOR AN INTERCOLLEGIATE SOCIALIST SOCIETY

In the opinion of the undersigned the recent remarkable increase in the Socialist vote in America should serve as an indication to the educated men and women in the country that Socialism is a thing concerning which it is no longer wise to be indifferent.

The undersigned, regarding its aims and fundamental principles with sympathy, and believing that in them will ultimately be found the remedy for many far-reaching economic evils, propose organizing an association, to be known as the Intercollegiate Socialist Society, for the purpose of promoting an intelligent interest in Socialism among college men and women, graduate and undergraduate, through the formation of study clubs in the colleges and universities, and the encouraging of all legitimate endeavors to awaken an interest in Socialism among the educated men and women of the country.

The first officers elected were Jack London, President; Upton Sinclair, First Vice-President; J. G. Phelps Stokes, Second Vice-President; Miss M. R. Holbrook, Secretary; Owen R. Lovejoy, Treasurer, and George Willis Cooke, Morris Hillquit, Robert Hunter, Harry W. Laidler, Mrs. Darwin J. Meserole and George H. Strobell, additional members of the Executive Committee.

The first two years of the life of the Society were spent largely in the distribution of printed matter and in the giving of lectures before college students. During the season of 1907-08 an active endeavor was made to organize the graduates and undergraduates of the American colleges into groups for the study of Socialism. The progress made in this work by the Society has been most encouraging, and augurs well for the future.

In the fall of 1907 the Executive Committee decided to employ an organizer, and in January, 1908, Fred H. Merrick was chosen for that position. Mr. Merrick worked energetically and ably among the colleges during a portion of the winter and spring terms, and by May 1, 1908, reported the formation of study chapters at the University of Pennsylvania, Harvard, Princeton, Columbia, Barnard, New York University and New York University Law School. Mr. Merrick also visited several other colleges, where he paved the way for future organizations.

During the winter Miss Mary R. Sanford and Miss Helen Phelps Stokes visited, in the interest of the Society, Vassar, Wellesley and Bryn Mawr colleges, at each of which they gave informal talks on Socialism, which elicited much favorable attention.

Under the auspices of the Society, furthermore, lectures upon social and economic problems were delivered during the year in several eastern and western colleges by Robert W. Bruère, Morris Hillquit, Robert Hunter, Edmond Kelly, John Spargo and J. G. Phelps Stokes.

In April, primarily to inform the general membership of its activities, the Society began the publication of a semi-monthly bulletin. Each issue of the bulletin contained a review of the recent work of the Society; an announcement of its future plans; a list of recent books and magazine articles of note on Socialism and allied subjects; short discussions upon some current events and a question box. The

CONSTITUTION

NAME

This Society shall be known as the Intercollegiate Socialist Society.

OBJECTS AND PLANS

In the opinion of its members the remarkable increase of the Socialist vote and sentiment in America should serve as an indication to the educated men and women in the country that Socialism is something concerning which it is no longer wise to be indifferent. Regarding its aims and fundamental principles with sympathy, and believing that in them will ultimately be found the remedy for many far-reaching economic evils, we purpose through this organization to promote an intelligent interest in Socialism among college men and women, graduate and undergraduate, by the formation of Study Chapters in the universities, colleges and high schools; by furnishing speakers, and placing standard Socialist books and periodicals in college libraries and reading-rooms; also by publishing or otherwise providing literature such as may be needed.

MEMBERSHIP

The membership shall consist of:

1. Graduates, students or former students of colleges or educational institutions of similar rank, or persons connected with the educational system of the country as instructors, elected to regular membership by the Executive Committee. The grades in these memberships shall be as follows:

- A. Active membership, paying \$2.00 yearly dues.

B. Contributing membership, paying \$5.00 yearly dues.

C. Sustaining membership, paying \$25.00 yearly dues.

2. Non-collegiate persons, interested in the work of the Society, elected to honorary membership by the Executive Committee, and paying \$5.00 or more yearly dues.

(In case of the organization of members in any locality into a Local Chapter, the body may retain one-half of the dues for use in propaganda.)

3. Students of any university, college or any educational institution above the rank of grammar school, formed into Study Chapters. Such members shall pay \$1.00 yearly dues each.

GOVERNMENT

The officers shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall be elected by referendary vote, to hold office for one year.

The Executive Committee shall consist of the six general officers, nine other members to be elected by a yearly referendary vote, and one additional member for each Local Chapter.

The Executive Committee shall have charge of and administer the affairs of the Society, and hold office for one year. The Secretary shall, in addition to the regular duties of his office, send to the Chapter representatives and the individual members requests for nominations for officers and members of the Executive Committee, during the month of January of each year. The voting blanks shall be sent out by the 20th of February and returned by the 15th of March. The newly elected officials shall take their offices April 1st of each year, at or about which time there shall be called a general meeting of the Society.

Any proposition or regulation initiated among the membership and signed by twenty-five representatives or members shall bring the subject matter before the Executive Committee for definite action upon its reception by the Secretary.

Any rule, regulation or action of the Executive Committee shall be subject to referendary vote of the members and representatives when petition for this purpose is presented to the Secretary signed by twenty-five or more members or representatives.

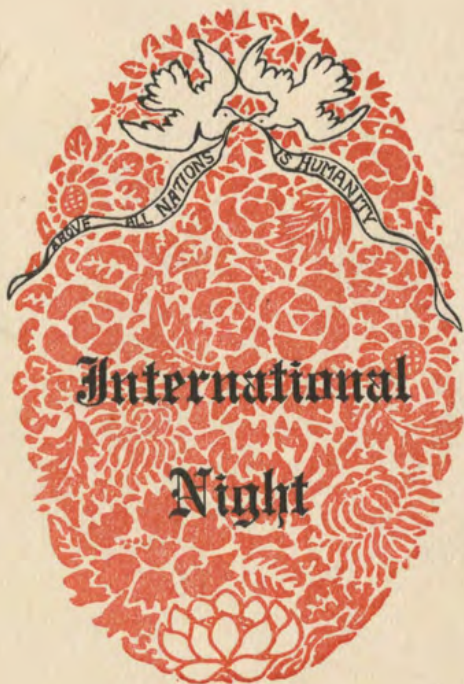

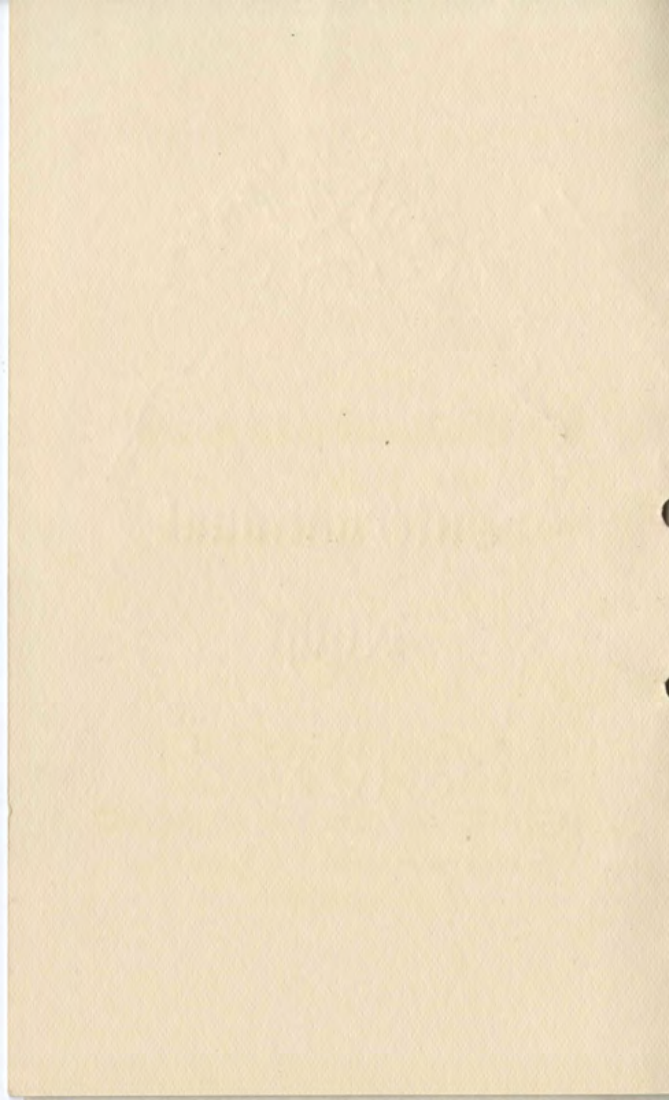

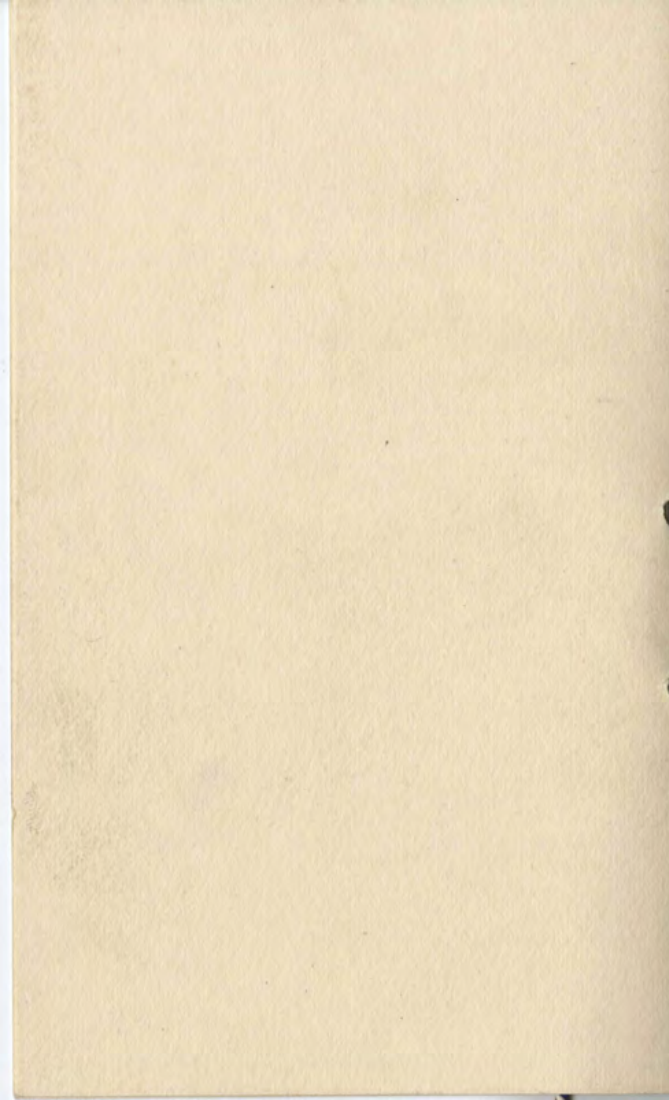
