Dear Mr. Burton:

I understand there is being held by the University a fund which at the time of its receipt in 1910 amounted to \$650.00, but which now consists of between \$1100.00 and \$1200.00, and which the University was requested by the women who turned it over to hold as a credit to the Woman's Athletic Association. Mr. Plimpton tells me that in our reports we have classed this fund as a "special" whose purpose was to be indicated later.

I believe the fund originated in 1910 in the campaign of the women, which, you may remember, was to secure "a mile of pennies" which would be the foundation of a women's gymnasium. Of course, Ida Noyes has since taken away the purpose that was then in mind. Recently several alumnae have asked me whether I believed the University would accept the fund to be applied toward the equipment of a women's athletic field at such time as a permanent place is designated and ready to be equipped. After hearing from Mr. Heckman (as per his letter attached), I advised that I believed the University would accept the fund if they were not committed as to the time or place of allocating the ground.

I give you this information because you may hear further from it, i.e. - assume that such action soon will be taken.

I believe Mr. Judson had some correspondence on the subject about a year ago with some of the alumnae. They were not clear as to his wishes or viewpoint and, therefore, started over fresh with me a few months ago.

My dear President Burton:

At the request of your secretary I am enclosing copies of correspondence between the President's office and his appointed committee, as well as of two letters between the W. A. A. and this committee.

The original letter from President Judson appointing the undersigned as chairman with Miss Josephine Allin and Miss Ethel Preston as the two other members of a committee I regret is not at hand. The duty of the committee as outlined by President Judson was to determine a use for the so-called "W. A. A. Alumnae Building Fund". This Fund had been turned into the University originally by the W. A. A. toward a womens' building. The advent of Ida Noyes Hall cancelled such a use for this Fund. I presume President Judson appointed the above three alumnae because of their intimate connection with the movement in 1909.

President Judson did not reply to me following my letter of June 19, 1922. The whole matter remained undecided until this spring when President Judson's committee discussed with Mr. Harold Swift the possibility of having the University accept the Fund according to the plan first outlined by the committee. We did not understand why President Judson felt that the University could not accept the Fund. It was suggested that it might be a legal matter and in order to do away with that possible angle we wrote the letter of May 14, 1923, to the W. A. A., a copy of which is enclosed. We have not received a reply to date.

1. A committee composed of Alumnae, undergraduates, and members of the Physical Culture Department, appointed by the President of the University shall decide on the necessary preparation and equipment of the Field.
2. This Fund shall be administered by this committee which shall also make provision for a suitable memorial similar to that outlined in paragraph 3.

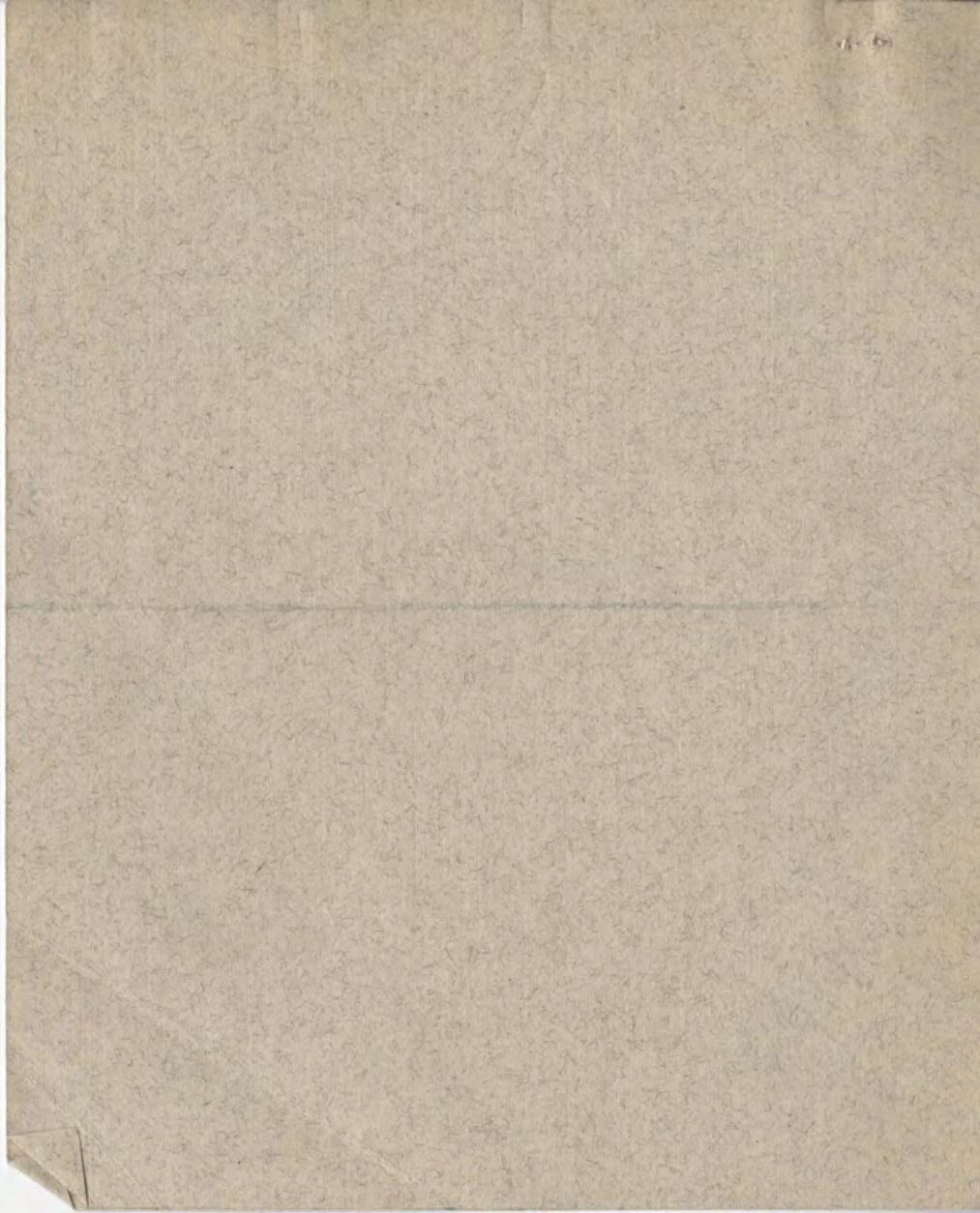

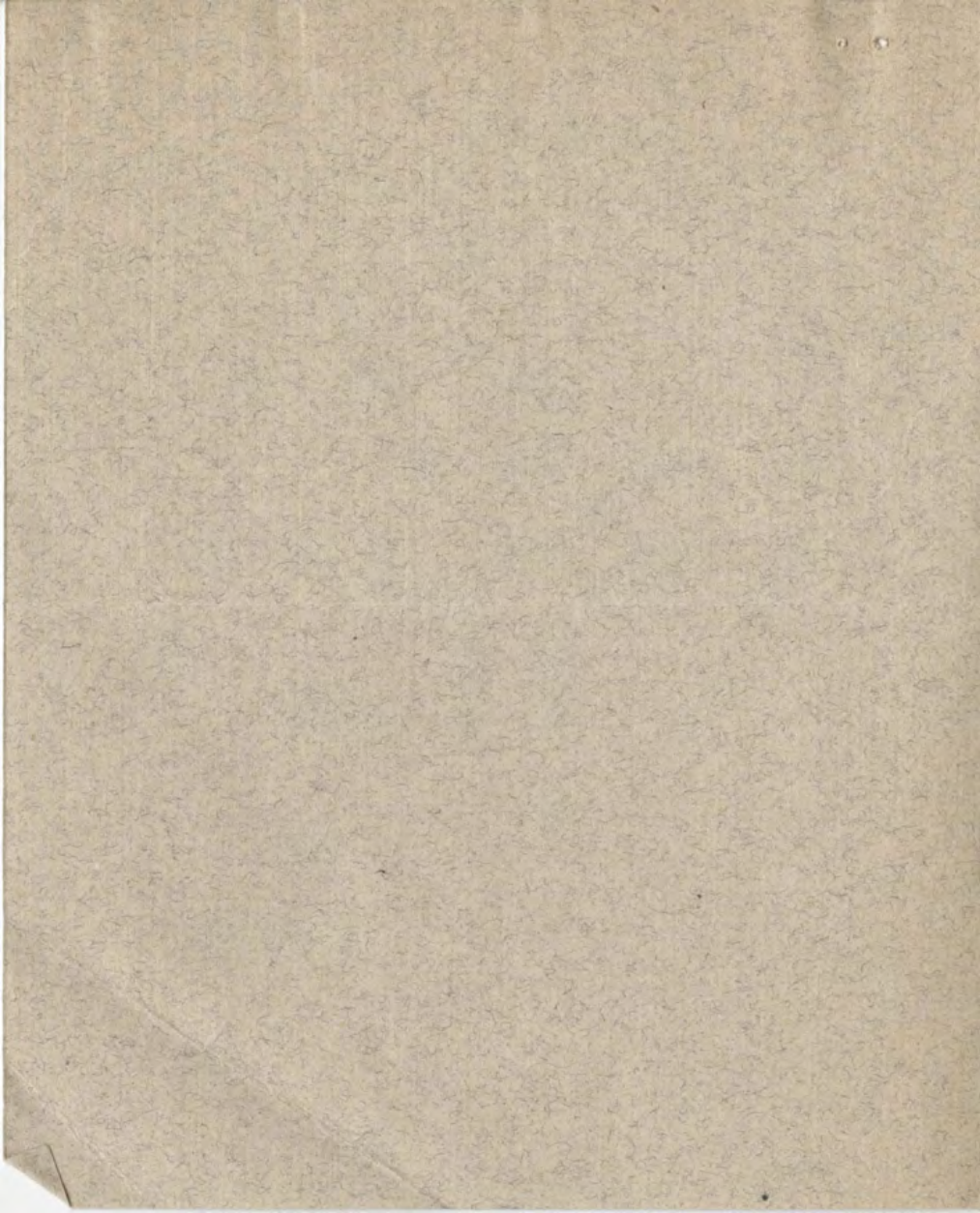

Some of us who have for years been members of the Prairie Club, others who have watched with interest the use made by our women in the medical school of their shack at the Dunes, until it was taken away from them by monied interest, realize what a great inducement to week ends in the out of doors, is a place to stay.

The fact that the Trustees of the University of Wisconsin last year gave to the Women's Athletic Association of that university, a 99-year lease of a piece of land on an adjoining lake and the report received this fall that their house is nearly completed, has made the Women's Athletic Association of the University of Chicago, very eager that this shack become a reality during the administration of this Board.

Estimates as to cost vary. Land may be purchased, not on the lake front, from \$25.00 to \$50.00 for a lot 25' x 125'. Cost of construction will be determined by plans. They are considering a house simple in construction and one story high. From other building that has been done there recently, I should judge \$500.00 to \$700.00 would cover construction.

My dear Mr. Burton:

The speakers at your Sunday morning services draw from our church (Methodist) congregation. Have you ever thought of an afternoon service instead; I should like to attend one of these services myself for the first time some Sunday afternoon.

I believe we need an auditorium that would seat about ten thousand people and be accessible with adequate parking space and landing field and be used as a drill hall. If you had the pleasure of hearing the Hon. David Lloyd George speak at the amphitheatre you will understand this need; perhaps you might assist the South Park commissioners financially in the remodeling of the Fine Arts building and also arrange with them for canoeing and other aquatic sports in the new lake front improvement.

(November 23, 1924)

The erection of buildings so crowded together that the sun never shines in some of the rooms and not enough room in the yard to put up a line is a serious menace to our neighborhood, hundreds of people occupying the space where one family formerly lived. If these new buildings are undesirable now what will they be in ten or fifteen years. Suppose ten or twenty years ago the university had set aside two million dollars and quietly picked up real estate which was a menace or which would control corners and blocks covering the territory one mile in each direction from Cobb Hall it would have paid big dividends; it would even pay to do this now. Do we want two more movie theatres and dance halls in this residence district - even now one of our select hotels has commenced to put on a cabaret entertainment Saturday nights. Should not the University and churches take steps to discourage this?

Regarding your new heating and lighting plant I would suggest you act cautiously, considering the use of fuel by pipe line or wire, with two or more units, always bearing in mind the cost of operating. All new buildings should be planned and materials and decorations used that will require the minimum of janitor service and upkeep. Also a critical inspection of all property, under your control, should be made periodically and all fire hydrants protected from frost and fire equipment kept in condition.

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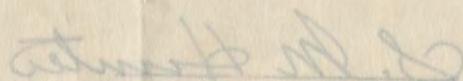

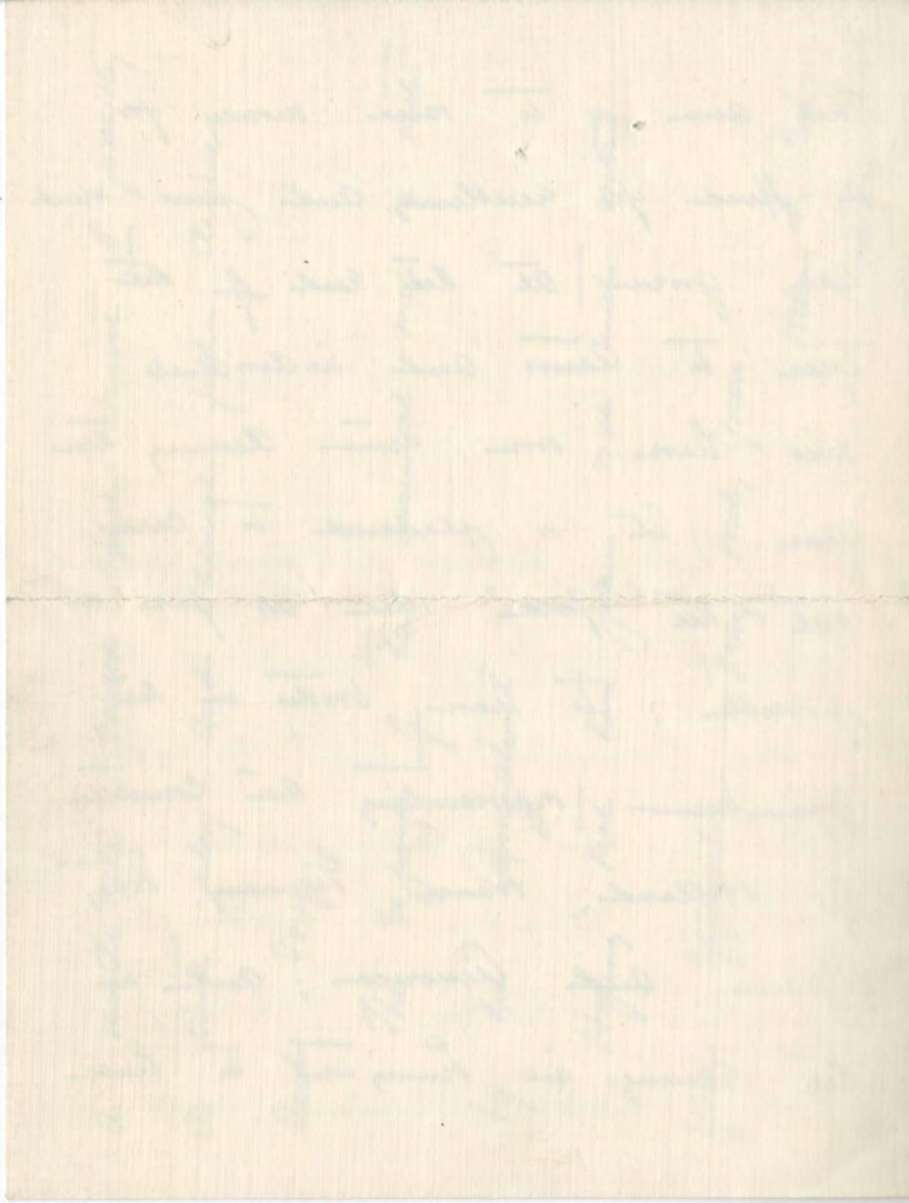

CONSTITUTION.

Article I. Name.

The name of this organization shall be the Woman's Athletic Association of the University of Chicago.

II.

Purpose.

The purpose shall be cooperation with the Womens department of Physical Culture for the promotion of physical and social activity of university women.

III.

Officers

The officers shall consist of a president , vice-president, and secretary and treasurer.

President.

The president, and in her absence, the vice-president, shall call and preside at all meeting of the association, executive committee and advisory board, and shall perform such other duties, as the associati on may assign to her.

Secretary Treasurer

The secretary-treasurer shall conduct all correspondence, keep the minutes of the meetings, and all athletic records, and shall have charge of all funds of the association. She shall have all accounts authorized by the executive committee, and shall notify persons of thair electio n to membership.

Executive Committee

The executive committee shall consist of the president, secretary-treasurer and directors of the Womens Department of Physical Culture or some one appointed by her. They shall have

charge of the funds and property of the Association, and such matters as the advisory board refer to them.

Advisory Board.

The advisory Board shall include the executive committee, and the chairmen in charge of the various sports and branches of work. They shall supervise all movements for the promotion of athletic spirit and interests, including all features of public games(except as provided in Rule II) mass-meetings and social functions. They shall decide all questions not otherwise provided for.

IV.

Meetings.

A meeting of the Association may be called at any time by the President or upon the written request of any ten members of the Association.

There shall be an annual meeting held the second Tuesday in December for purpose of election and other routine business.

V

Election.

All nominations for officers shall be made by a nominating committee selected by the advisory board. There shall be at least three nominations for each office.

2. The remainder of the advisory board shall be elected as follows. Each branch of organized work shall nominate and elect from the floor a committee of five, whose duty it shall be to supervise and represent that sport, and to have charge of the matters designated to it by the body electing it. The chairman of the various committees of these sports constitute with the officers the advisory board.

3. All nominations shall be posted one week prior to the meeting; all voting shall be by ballot, and a majority vote shall be required to elect. For all meetings of the Association fifty person shall be deemed a quorum.

VI.

Term of Office.

1. All officers and members of the board shall hold office for the period of one year. Committees shall serve for the same length of time.

Vacancies.

All vacancies for president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer shall be filled by the advisory board appointing one of its own members. All other vacancies shall be filled as provided in Article V. Section 2.

VII.

Members

The association shall be open to all women in the University under the following provisions and classification

1. Active:- All women registered in all organized sports, track athletics and indoor competitive work, conducted by the Womans Department of Physical Culture.

2. Associate:- All women registered for gymnasium work and not included in Section 1.

3. Honor:- All women who make the University and College teams who win points and make records in athletic and gymnastic contests and tournaments. These members must be without university conditions

4. Honorary:- University Faculty and Alumnae.

5. All applications for active membership shall be made to

the Secretary who shall refer them to the Director of the Woman's Department of Physical Culture, who shall decide upon eligibility and membership. Names of persons for honorary membership shall be sent in writing to the secretary and referred to the advisory board who will pass upon them and refer them to an association vote.

6. Active and associate members shall have the same powers and privileges. Honorary members shall not have voting powers or the right to hold office.

VIII.

Fees

There shall be no regular membership fee or tax but contributions may be solicited by a committee appointed by the advisory board, when necessary.

IX.

Amendments.

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Association present at the meeting. These amendments shall be posted in the gymnasium at least ten days prior to the meeting called for this purpose.

By-Laws

I.

All meetings shall be conducted under Roberts Rules of Order.

II.

Neither the Association nor any member thereof shall have any jurisdiction over the selection of teams, kind or time of ^{regular} contest or the ~~color~~ of players. That shall be vested in the physical culture department.

III.

The advisory board, subject to the approval of the association shall select and award all emblems of honor to members and all prizes and trophies to the teams.

IV.

No member shall hold more than one office and shall be without University conditions.

V.

Two members of the Colleges shall represent the Association on the Board of Physical Culture and Athletics, should that privilege be accorded us, and shall be elected in accord with University Regulations.

VI.

All questions of appeal, except upon Article VII, Section 5 and Rule II shall be taken to the Association upon written request of 25 members. These two shall be appealed only by amending the Constitution.

Constitution

Article I

Name

The name of this organization shall be the Women's Athletic Association of the University of Chicago.

II

Purpose

The purpose shall be cooperation with the Women's department of physical culture for the promotion of physical and social activity of university women.

III

Officers

The officers shall consist of a president, vice-president, and secretary and treasurer.

President

2.

The president, and in her absence, the vice president, shall call and preside at all meetings of the association, executive committee and advisory board, and shall perform such other duties, as the association may assign to her.

Secretary Treasurer

The secretary - treasurer shall conduct all correspondence, keep the minutes of the meetings, and all athletic records, and shall have charge of all funds of the association. He shall have all accounts authorized by the executive committee, and shall notify persons of their election to membership.

3
Executive Committee

The Executive Committee shall consist of the president, secretary - treasurer and director of the Women's Department of Physical Culture or some one appointed by her. They shall have charge of the funds and property of the Association, and such matters as the advisory board refer to them.

Advisory Board

The advisory board shall include the executive committee, and the chairman in charge of the various sports and branches of work. They shall supervise all movements for the promotion of athletic spirit and interests, including all features of public games (except as provided in Rule II) mass-meetings and social functions. They shall decide all questions not otherwise

The Executive Committee shall consist of
the President, Secretary, Treasurer and Directors
of the Woman's Department of the Baptist Church
or some one appointed by her. The same have
charge of the funds and property of the
Association, and have authority to the
Association to refer to them.

Advancing Women

The Advancing Women shall include the Executive
Committee, and the Chairman in charge of the
various efforts and branches of work. They shall
superintend all movement for the formation of
Baptist spirit and interest, including all features
(II) and in advance as to the subject of
missionary and social functions. They shall
be the one question not otherwise

provided for.

IV meetings

A meeting of the Association may be called at any time by the president or upon the written request of any ten members of the Association.

There shall be an annual meeting held the second Tuesday in December for purpose of election and other routine business.

V election

All nominations for officers shall be made by a nominating committee selected by the advisory board. There shall be at least three nominations for each office.

Meeting

A meeting of the Association may be called at any time by the President or upon the written request of any ten members of the Association.

The Association may also be called for an annual meeting and for the purpose of electing and other routine business.

Article

All nominations for officers shall be made by a nominating committee, elected by the assembly, and shall be at least three nominations for each officer.

2. The remainder of the advisory board shall be elected as follows. Each branch of organized work shall nominate and elect from the floor a committee of five, whose duty it shall be to supervise and represent that sport, and to have charge of all matters delegated to it by the body electing it. The chairman of the various committees of these sports constitute, with the officers, the advisory board.
3. All nominations shall be posted one week prior to the meeting; all voting shall be by ballot, and a majority vote shall be required to elect. For all meetings of the Association 50 persons shall be deemed a quorum.

VI

Term of Office

1. All officers and members of the board shall hold office for the period of one year. Committees shall serve for the same length of time.

2. The members of the advisory board shall be elected as follows. Each branch of organization shall select a representative and elect from the floor a committee of four, whose duty it shall be to prepare and report that report, and to have charge of all matters referred to it by the body electing. The chairman of the various committees of their sports committee, with the officers, shall be the advisory board.

3. The members shall be elected one year from the meeting; all voting shall be by ballot, and a majority vote shall be required to elect. For all meetings of the association to provide shall be deemed a quorum.

IV

Terms of Office

3. Honor: All women who make the University and college teams who win points and make records in athletic and gymnastic contests and tournaments. These members must be without university conditions.
4. Honorary: University faculty and alumni. ~~These members shall~~
5. All applications for ^{action and} membership shall be made to the

Secretary who shall refer them to the Director of the Women's Department of Physical Culture, who shall decide upon eligibility and memberships. Names of persons for honorary memberships shall be sent in writing to the ~~advisory board~~ secretary and referred to the advisory board who will pass upon them and refer them to an association vote.

6. Active and associate members shall have the same powers and privileges. Honorary members shall not have voting power or the right to hold office.

VIII

Fees

There shall be no regular membership fee or tax but contributions may be solicited by a committee appointed by the advisory board, when necessary.

IX

Amendments.

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Association present at the meeting. These amendments shall be posted in the gymnasium at least ten days prior to the meeting called for this purpose.

By - Laws

1. All meetings shall be conducted under Roberts Rules of Order.

II

Neither the association nor any member thereof shall have any jurisdiction over the selection of teams, kind or time of contest or the regular of players. That shall be vested in the physical culture department.

III

The advisory board, subject to the approval of the association shall select and award all emblems of honor to members and all prizes and trophies to the teams.
