My dear Dr. Harper, (63)
 Yours of April 13 & 15 were very
 welcome. I am sorry that I can take
 time now only to reply to the request
 contained in the latter. The matter
 of making up the list of professors
 for Helmaica I have placed in the
 competent hands of Mr. Ozone Davis,
 Kürnbergger str. 48. II. a graduate
 of Hartford and the best man in
 Germany for the work. Fannie knows
 him well, in fact gave him a letter
 of introduction to me, and I know
 what sort of stuff is in him.
 We both feel that the list of Professor
 Price is not perfectly consistent with
 the idea you had in mind and that

your own letter did not give a perfectly
clear idea of what you wish. When
we attempt to approach the problem
from the conditions on this side some
very important questions arise, since
the chairs at the University are
not specifically named and Hebrew
is taught in every Gymnasium in
the country. Setting aside instructions
in the ^{Vernacular} ~~English~~ Bible whom Professor
Price rather strangely included
in his list, the Hebrew instructions
in the Gymnasium would fill
several of your numbers I suppose.
We take it that you wish to limit
yourself to the Universities, and
that you wish to have Semitic
professors generally included
as well as Hebrew & O.T. professors.
Some of the more important questions

then, that at once arise are:
Do you wish to include English Universi-
ties and those of the British Isles?
Do you wish to include in-
structions in Gymnasien & Universi-
ties? Do you wish instructions in Semitic
languages to be included & with
those who teach O. Testament?
It is a matter of some trouble to get
the degrees & titles but I suppose
you want them.

I am desirous I suppose a brief
statement of what the men
teach. e.g. Arabic - Semitic
Philology - O.T. Interpretation
Assyrian and Ethiopic: Since
all are professors in Phil. Fakultät
or Theol. Fakultät & not disting-
