Dear Sir:-

Your favor of the 8th inst. with enclosure received.

It would hardly be worth while for me to fill out the questionnaire, as of course it is adapted to offices primarily of a business character. I should answer your fourth question (a) in the affirmative, and (b) in the negative. It seems to me that the work should be distributed throughout the high school curriculum. I should answer question 5 in this way: It would in my opinion be better for suitable commercial courses to be provided in all the high schools, rather than a single school. Question 6 I should answer in the affirmative. As to question 7, it would seem to me that it might be possible to arrange such connection with the best high school students in commercial courses on the one hand, and commercial houses in the city on the other as is now in existence between certain students in the Lewis Institute with manufacturing establishments. These students spend part of their time in the school classes, and part of their time in
