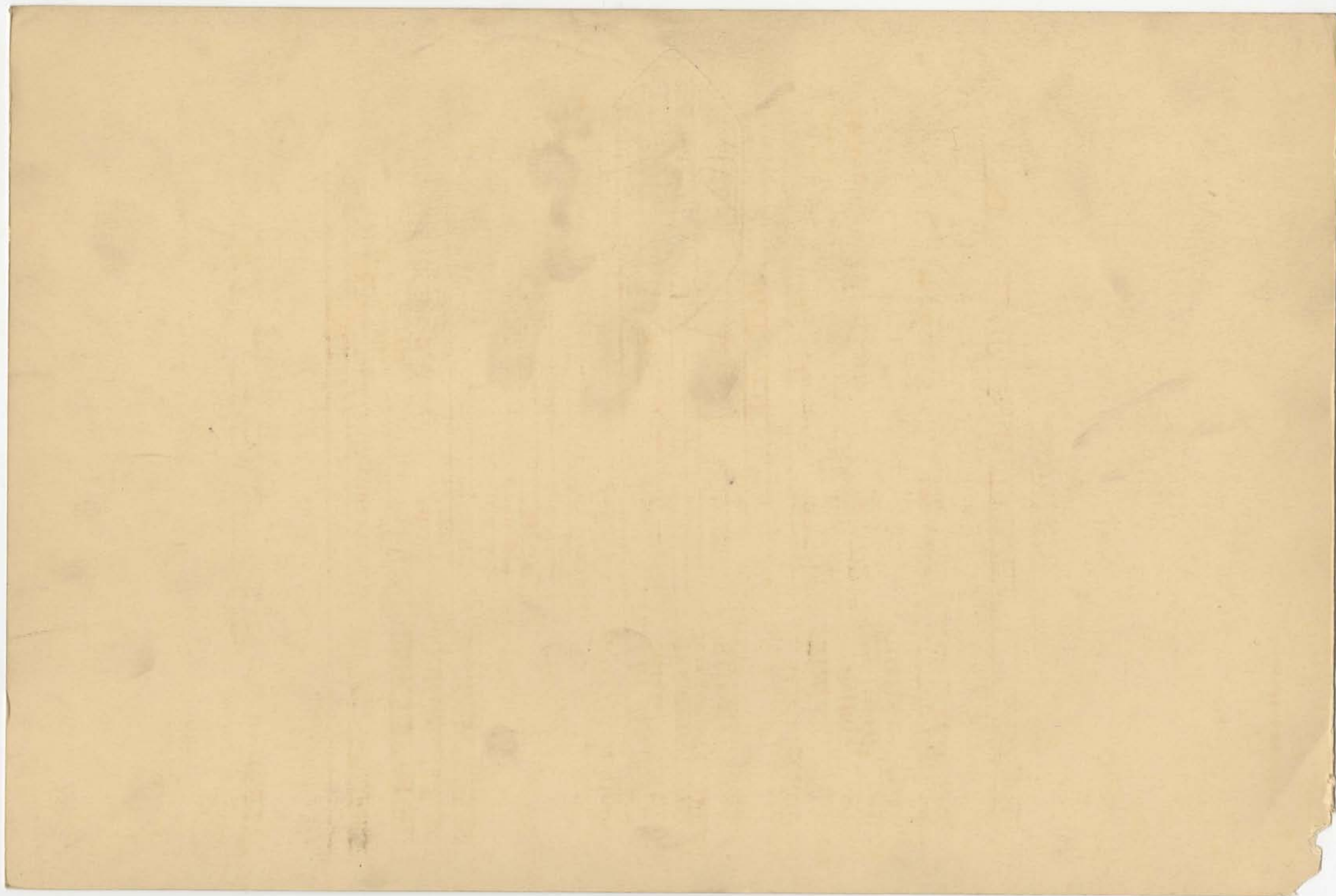

## PERSONNEL DEPARTMENT

1920-1921

The aim of the Personnel Department of the Federation of University Women is two-fold: first, to bring the women into friendly relationship with one another; second, to be influential in so dividing the offices and honors of campus activities that there will be a fairer distribution of responsibility than heretofore.

The definite machinery carrying on the work of the department consists of a committee, composed of the chairman, a sub-chairman in charge of the Halls Committee, and a sub-chairman who takes care of the Federation file. This sub-chairman has under her a committee which invites girls to the General Council meetings. Lists of five names and addresses each are given to the Sponsors and to the members of the Executive Council a week before a meeting, and these girls invite those whose names they receive to come to the dinner and meeting. The invitation is usually by telephone, and made as personal and cordial as possible. During my chairmanship we started the practice of having girls at the meetings sign up as "hostesses" for the following meeting, and these girls were then sent lists of names also.

The regular work of the Personnel Department is briefly as follows:

### I. Card File

At the beginning of every quarter Sponsors at the Deans' offices hand out Federation registration cards, upon which the women indicate their activities and interests. These cards are filed alphabetically, by classes. Colored tabs have been affixed to show at a glance the distribution of ability therein represented. This file is at the disposal of anyone in the University, and has been used to advantage by various organizations in making up committees etc..

### II. May Calling Day

We instituted the custom of having a Federation calling day on the first Sunday in May. Girls signed up to call or to be called on, and many calls were made.

The callers carried mimeographed sheets outlining the Federation, its scope and ideals. Many girls have been brought into the range of Federation activity by this means.

### III. Helle Week

Believing that there is a lack of real friendliness and fellowship among the students of the University as a whole, we inaugurated "Helle Week", aiming to have people speak to one another even if they had not been formally introduced. The movement was not as large as we had planned, owing to the novelty of the idea. The Week that is planned for the fall, however, will profit by the previous experience and should accomplish a great deal toward establishing a better feeling among the women of the Univ-

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ersity.

#### IV. Letters to Class Presidents

On the evening of the elections for class officers it is the custom for the chairman of the Personnel Department to send a letter to each new class president telling him of the desire of the Federation to be instrumental in bringing about a fairer distribution of work, and suggesting that deserving girls, rather than a quota from each club, be appointed to the class committees. The presidents have been coöperative, and have selected several committee members from those girls whose names have been furnished on request.

The Personnel Department is one capable of great expansion and improvement. Its importance is inestimable; the whole future of the Federation is dependent upon the results for which this department is aiming. To divide the work involved in "campus activities" and to create a spirit of real Friendliness, Cooperation, and Vision among the women is a task worthy of the greatest effort and interest.

Social Committee, Federation of University Women

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In general the aim of the Social Committee is to further and carry out the aims of the Federation of University Women - Co-operation and Friendliness. In particular, it is to promote the spirit of friendship, especially at class affairs; to manage the Sings so that they will be a means of fostering not only class but also community spirit; and to help make the machinery of the University move smoothly.

The Social Committee is made up of the vice-presidents and the social chairmen of the four undergraduate classes, and any others whom the chairman may appoint. It is the business of the committee to see that University affairs are carried on successfully; that is, that all present enjoy the affair, and that there are no "wall flowers" or left-out people. In the Federation itself, this committee takes charge of the reception for the candidates, and of Federation dinners and council meetings, and other affairs given by the Federation, such as the tea for foreign women.

The Calendar Committee is made of three girls, not of the Social Committee, but under the supervision of the Social chairman. This committee has charge of the calendar in Ida Noyes hall, where all social events are posted. In this way one may know the date and place of various functions, and may plan so that there will not be conflicting parties.

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The Sing Committee is composed of about ten members, both men and women. The social chairman acts also as chairman of this committee. Two sings are given every quarter. It was felt that much was accomplished during the war by community sings, and it is our aim to promote the community spirit in just such a way. College songs, as well as the old melodies and the popular songs, are sung. Either a professional leader or a student leads the sing, and there is usually a feature of some musical act, or a dance.

I, personally, feel that this committee could be organized much more successfully than has been the case during the past years. Things have become a little stale, and they need new enthusiasm. It takes much of this enthusiasm, as well as a great deal of energy, to carry out our aims, but surely they are aims well worth-while.

of the Vocational Guidance Committee of  
the Federation of University Women, for  
the year 1920-21

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The Vocational Guidance committee of the Federation of University Women tries to establish some connection between the women of the university and their future work. Many students enter and go through college with only the vaguest notions of what they are preparing themselves for. Often this is due to ignorance of the work which is open to them. The Vocational Guidance committee tries to help such students "find themselves." This is by no means an easy task for a student organization, since the committee has no wide experience to draw upon. But the committee tries to find out what are the chief branches of the world's work in which women are giving the best service, and to pass such knowledge on to the students.

The committee attempted personal conferences with interested students, in which, student-to-student-fashion, they could talk over the problems of selecting a vocation. The committee also collected and subscribed to such pamphlets as are published along this line. There is not

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a great deal of literature to be found, but there are some magazine articles and a few leaflets put out by the Vocational Guidance committee of New York which tell of the lines open to college women. The committee also arranged for a lecture by Miss Helen Bennett of the Chicago Collegiate Bureau of Occupations on "Work for College Women." The lecture was very well attended, and Miss Bennett later held conferences with the students in which she gave advice on their personal problems. The committee also began a series of talks by qualified women on specific vocations, a series which is now being carried forward by the new chairman.

The undersigned does not feel that she accomplished a great deal, but she does know that the problem of a vocation is one which touches every college woman, and that any work done by a student or faculty committee toward the solution of this problem will be highly valuable to the student body.

## THE SPONSORS

The sponsors of the Federation are a group of representative young women who are chosen to carry the spirit of the Federation to the general student body and to give whatever service may be asked of them. The sponsor has two big ideals: true friendliness and unselfish service.

At the beginning of each quarter the sponsors act as information bureaus and guides for the new girls; and at the same time the sponsor tries to make the new girl feel at home and as if she were with her friends. To make the contact more lasting and more personal on May the first the sponsors devote the entire afternoon to calling on new girls who have during the year made but few friends. These girls are "discovered" by the personnel department of the sponsor group. This department working all the year secures the names of girls who are lonely, who do not like Chicago, or who have not found their particular place in college life, and there are more of these types than one would believe.

The sponsors act as hostesses at the Federation dinners and General Council meetings. Each sponsor personally invites five girls to the meeting. In this work the chief aim of the sponsor has been friendliness; not the superficial soon-to-be-forgotten sort but a sincere effort toward genuine friendliness.

The sewing room is the field of the most definite service. Each sponsor is responsible for one hour each week in the sewing room. Outside of the sewing room the sponsors

In this way the object of the sponsor is to be friendly; and the sponsor should never be forgotten as a friend.

The evening from the first of the year to the last is a time when a sponsor is responsible for one hour each week in the social room. Details of the social room are explained



knit sweaters. This is one of the most concrete tasks. There are, however, less important jobs such as acting as ushers at chapel (before the new system) and at sings.

The sponsor group not only help others but by being closely associated with one another, each having the same big aims, the individual herself is greatly benefited. I believe that this department has one of the greatest opportunities. Sponsors have the most gratifying task of actually helping some one; they realize that it is for them to carry the ideals of "Friendliness, Cooperation and Vision" plus Service to the general student body.

REPORT OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT OF THE FEDERATION  
OF UNIVERSITY WOMEN. 1920-1921

In the Spring Quarter of 1920 a new plan was introduced into the program for Community Sewing Room. Instead of inviting girls to sew in the afternoons any time from one to five o'clock, the period was divided into one hour sessions and a definite schedule made out with responsibility placed on certain girls to have a group of three or four sewing at every hour. Definite results were felt and the number of girls attending increased. Mrs. Lovett graciously superintended thruout and planned the materials while Florence Settle gave exceptional and faithful help. A Quilting Bee attended by forty or fifty girls together with a fudge party, at which baby sets were made, added sociable pleasure to the work of Spring Quarter.

During Fall Quarter, 1920, the plan of making the Federation Sponsors - sewing chairmen for the different hours was begun and proved successful. There were two Quilting Bees and at the end of the Quarter over one hundred and fifty girls had registered as having helped in the sewing. Miss Wallace entertained with stories at a tea one afternoon while the girls sewed, and at one quilting bee we were honored with the presence of one of the little live babies, for whom the clothes are made, from the Lying In Hospital.

During the Winter Quarter the Sponsors carried out the duties of the Sewing Room very enthusiastically. Each sponsor signed up for a definite hour a week and all were faithful in their attendance. A trip to the Lying In Hospital was a great success and was very instructive. The girls were so interested that they all went over to the West Side Dispensary the following week to see the charity work of the Hospital. We visited a home and took some baby clothes to the young mother. It has become a definite plan of the Federation to make a trip to the Chicago Lying In Hospital and to the Dispensary every quarter.

We visited a home and took some baby clothes to the young mother. It has become a definite plan of the Federation to make a trip to the Chicago lying in hospital and to the laboratory every quarter.

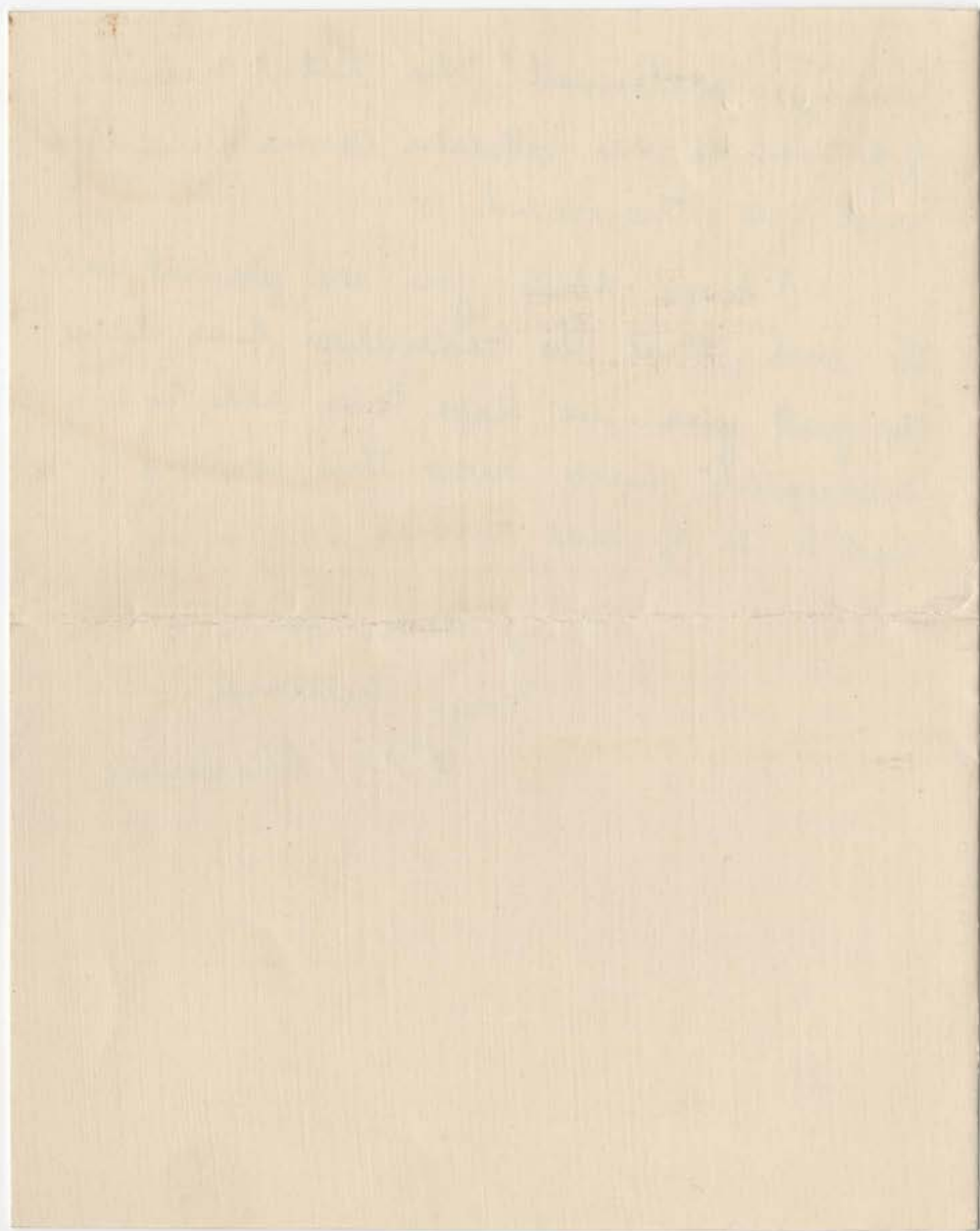
The report of the

I hope that you are pleased with the work that the Federation has done the past year. We hope to be able to accomplish much more this coming year and to be of real service.

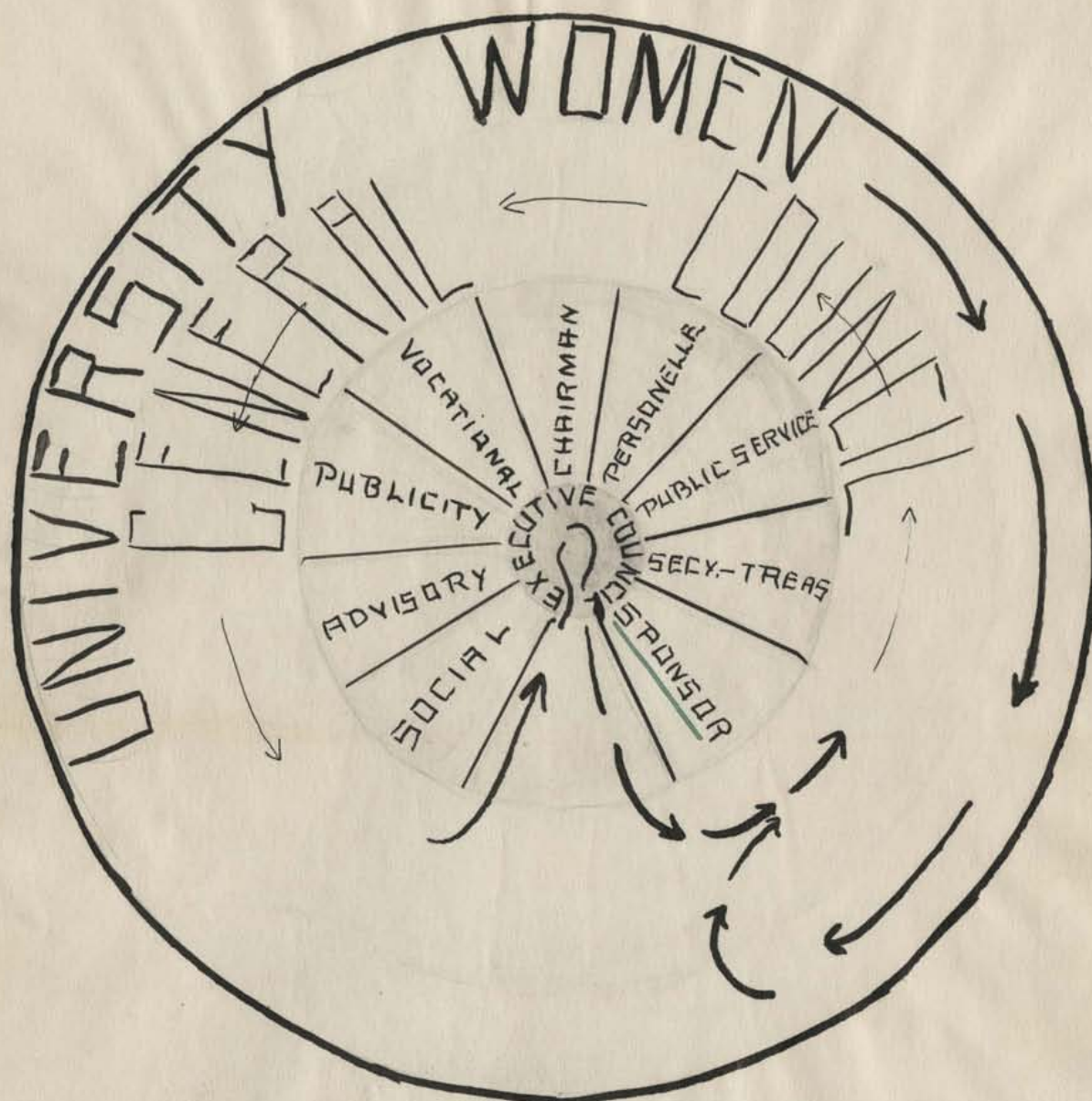

## THE FEDERATION OF UNIVERSITY WOMEN.

### The Sponsors.

THE SPONSORS: The Sponsors are twenty representative women elected by the executive council. They make up a staff always ready to put its plans into action; they are channels for spreading the spirit of the Federation; and they are also publicity agents for everything connected with it.

### The Work of the Sponsors.

REGISTRATION: Certain of the twenty Sponsors are stationed at each registration place to help the new students through the maze of registration, to give out information concerning college or the city, and to distribute Federation cards--trying all the time to disseminate the spirit of friendliness.

CHAPEL: A committee of Sponsors passes out slips in junior chapel in accordance with a plan evolved from an early council meeting.

THE FEDERATION CIRCULARS: The Sponsors planned the Federation circulars under the inspiration of the council chairman, had them printed, and distributed them.. The circulars give the schedule of the activities of the Federation for the quarter. They have as a permanent heading the Federation seal with the three words suggesting the purpose of the Federation beneath it, and a brief introduction to the Federation and to the Sponsors.

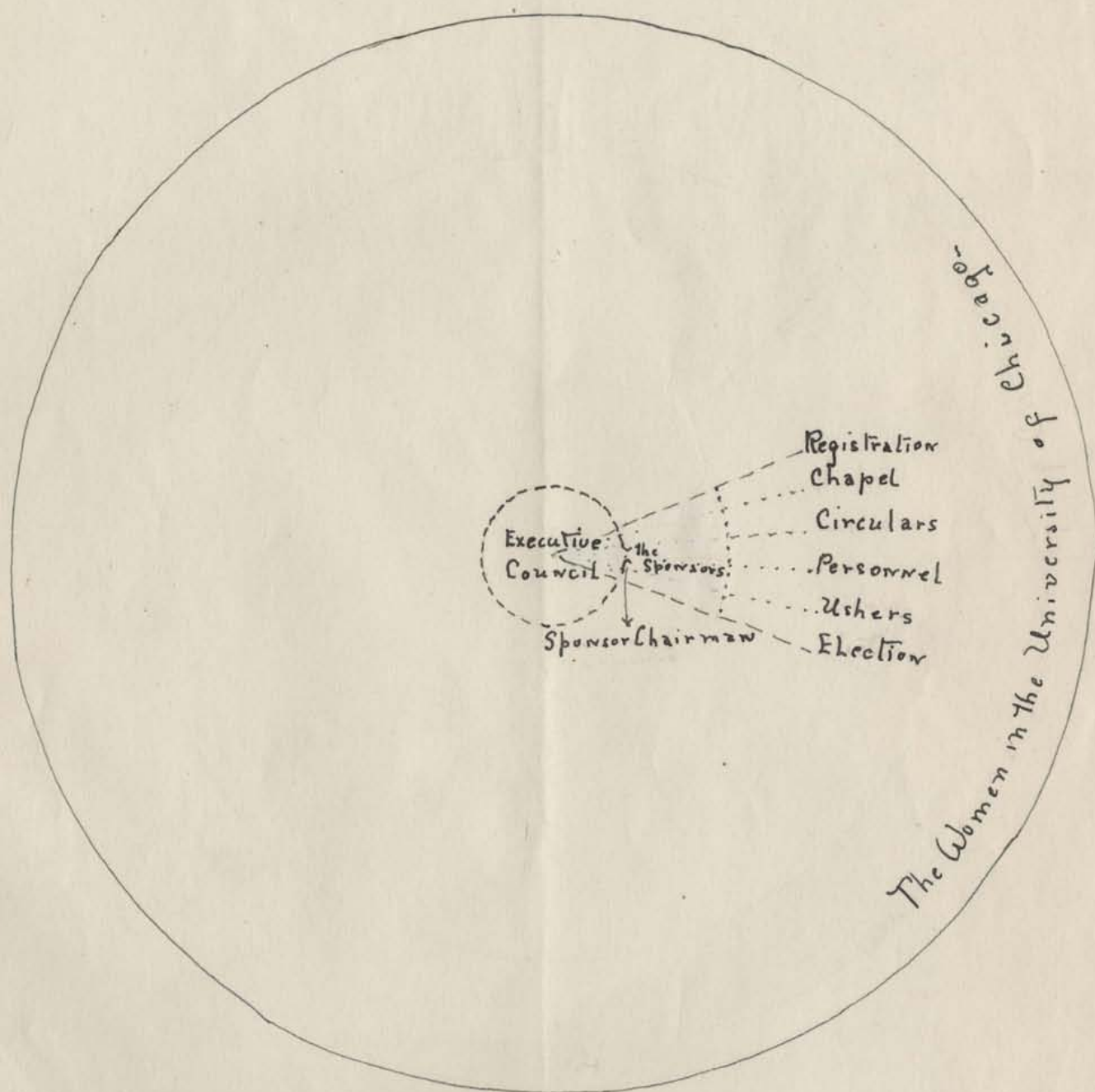

**AIM:** To distribute honors and duties of the various college activities as equally as possible among all the women students in the University, rather than among a few, as was previously the practise.

**METHODS:** (a) The file: At registration each woman in the University filled out a card, a sample of which is enclosed. These cards are arranged alphabetically in a file which is kept in the Federation desk, and is accessible to everyone in the University. The card system has not yet been completely worked out, but we plan to tell on these cards the qualifications of each woman, that is, what her chief interest is; whether she is interested in college activities or not; and to what extent she is participating in them. In this way any stranger can go to the file and learn the qualifications of any woman in the University without even knowing her.

(b) General information: The Personnel department has obtained information concerning the University women in various ways; (1) through interested members of the faculty who have sent in lists of women who are especially capable, or lonesome, or who have some particular need which the Federation can supply; (2) through presidents of the various college organizations who send in a list of members, starring those who are particularly active; and (3) by suggestions offered the department by students, and especially by the Sponsors of the Federation, who come in contact with many women who need help.

(c) Suggesting committees: When the various college organizations wanted people to work on committees or to be nominated for office, as the Honor Commission and the class committees etc. the Personnel department submitted to them a list of women who are very capable but who have never been given any responsible position in college.

**ACCOMPLISHMENTS:** (1) It is quite impossible to thoroughly accomplish such an aim as ours in a year's time, but we have talked our ideas, printed them in the "MAROON", and have people thinking about them and agreeing with us. More and more the various organizations are coöperating with us, and are asking for lists of women who have not had responsibilities and who are capable of handling them.

(2) The Personnel department has also made up the lists of women who were invited to the General Council meetings and has kept a record of those who have attended them.

The Public Service Department of the Federation of University Women has centered its activities entirely in Community Sewing. The Community Sewing Room on the third floor of Ida Noyes Hall is open every afternoon, except Friday, from one until five.

The work is carried on under the supervision of Mrs. Robert M. Lovett who is there every day and who has devoted untold time and energy to helping the women with their work. With her are the Public Service Committee, consisting of some twelve or fifteen members who work in groups of twos, in two-hour shifts. This means that there is a sewing chairman and a social chairman there with Mrs. Lovett all of the time that the room is open.

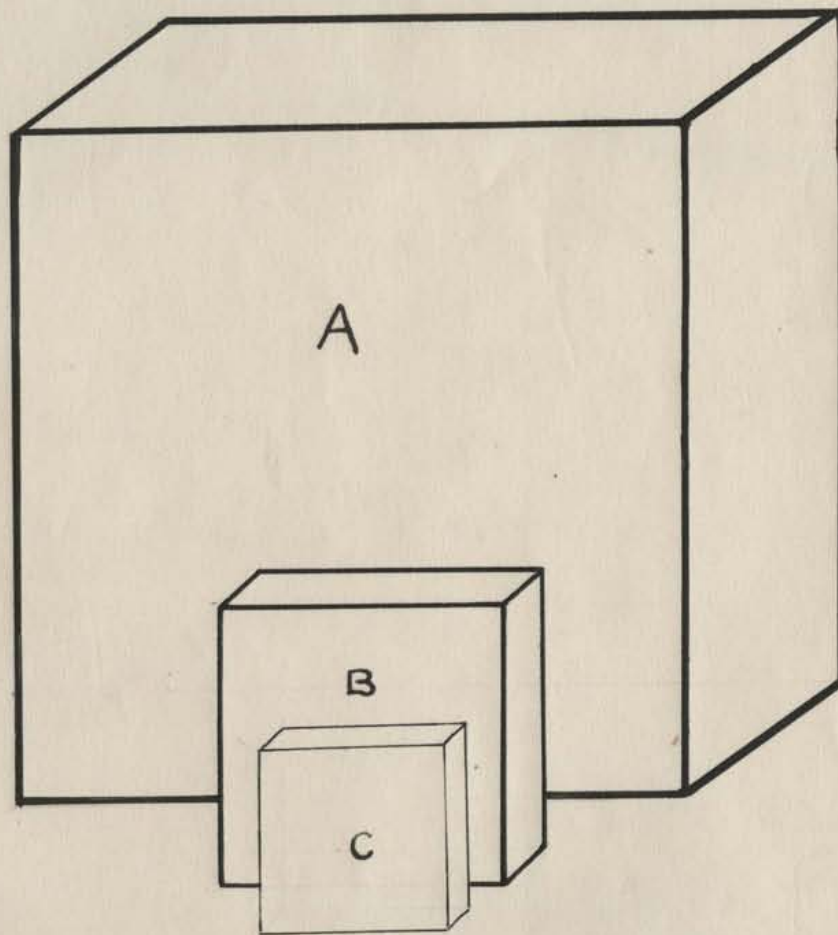

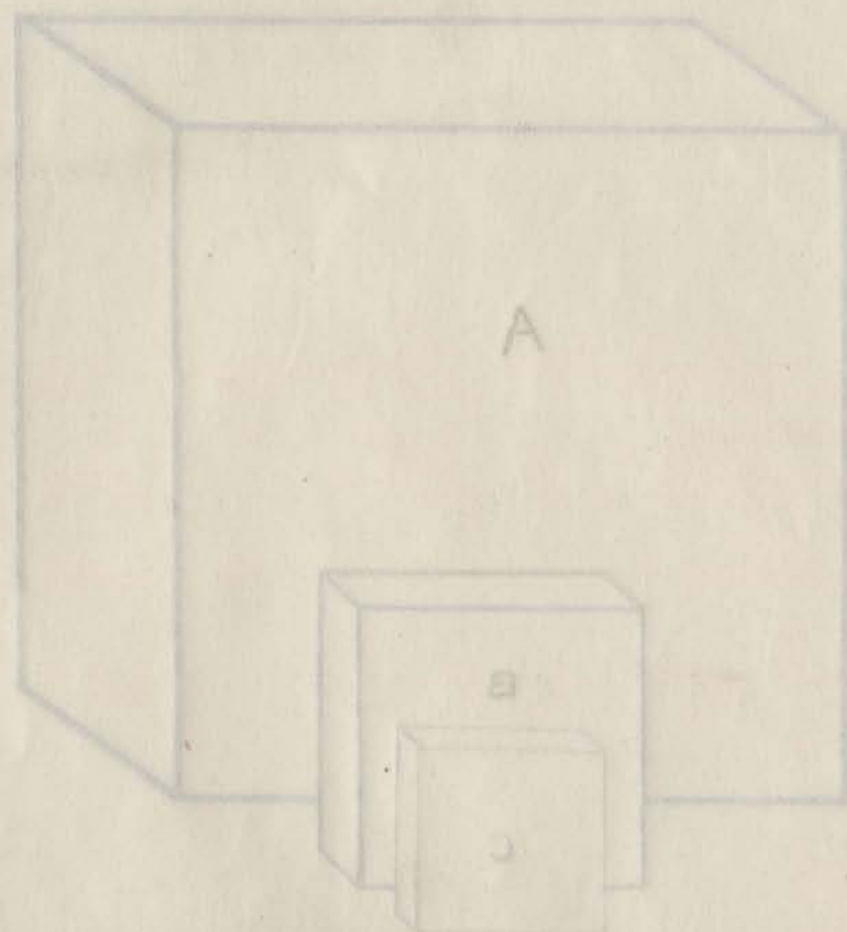
A: representative of all University Women.

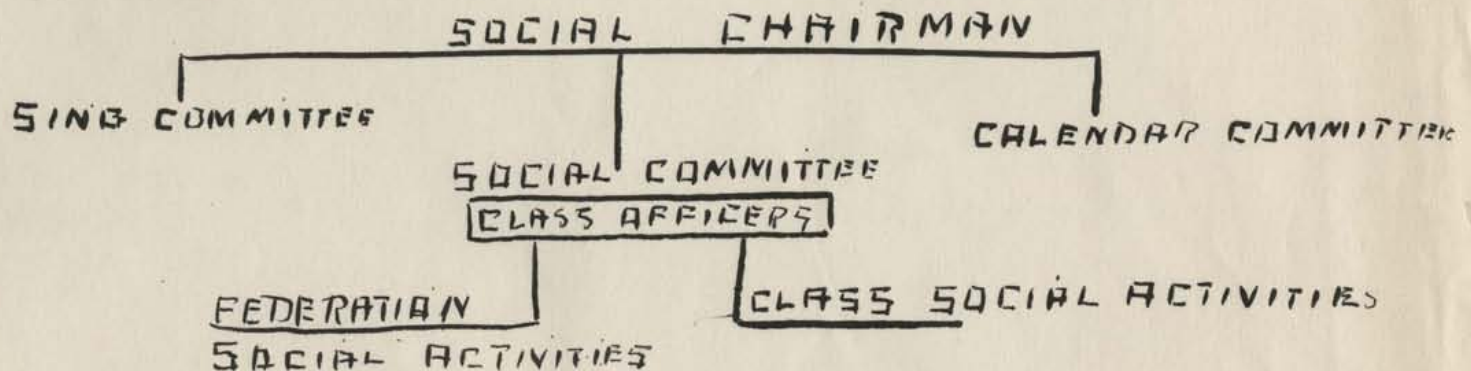

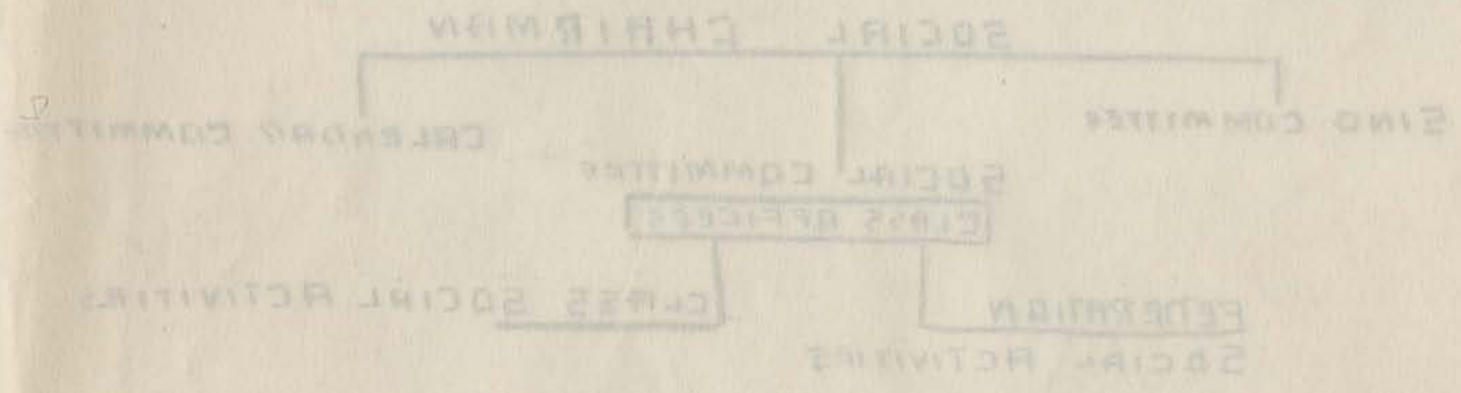

PUBLICITY COMMITTEE REPORT.

I - Aim.

The aim of the publicity committee is three fold:

1. To make known the Federation to all University woman and to interest them in its work.
2. To make every women feel that she is a vital part of the Federation and responsible for its success by giving her some work to do in connection with it.
3. To make every woman feel that she is a personal publicity agent to advertise the activities and disseminate the spirit of the Federation.

II - Organization.

Under the general chairman there are four sub-chairmen of (1) the Daily Maroon, (2) Posters, (3) Halls, (4) off campus organization.

1. Daily Maroon. Sub-chairman is responsible for all publicity obtained thru space in that sheet.
2. Posters. Sub-chairman is responsible for the placing of posters in their places at the proper times. Definite poster locations have been assigned to nine members of the committee assisting the sub-chairman.
3. Halls. Sub-chairman has eleven women under her, one or more of whom are living in each of the following halls: Foster, Green, Kelly, Beecher, Greenwood, Woodlawn, Drexel, and French. This committee



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is responsible for all Federation publicity in the halls.

IV Off Campus. Sub-Chairman is now working with a committee of eight, and is organizing all off campus women into groups of fifteen. There will be two women at the head of every fifteen, one acting as chairman and the other as her assistant - the assistant to be chairman the following year. These two heads will be expected to know personally every woman in her group, and will be responsible for spreading the spirit of the Federation and making known its activities.

The personnel of the off campus committee when the plan is completed will consist of the off campus sub-chairman of the publicity committee and the chairmen of the off campus groups.

#### IVI - Work.

Besides the regular committee work the Publicity Committee has this year supervised the designing and adoption of the Federation Seal. Seal executed by Elizabeth Fisher. The work of the Publicity Committee has only begun; it is of the greatest importance to the Federation that ~~the~~ the work of the Committee be carried on upon an increasing scale.

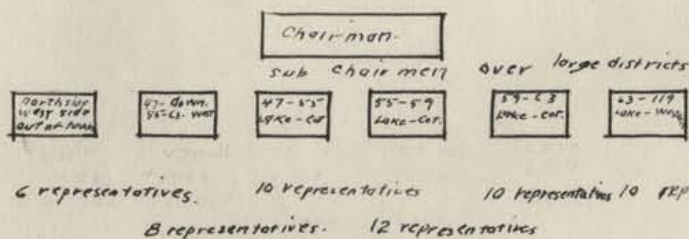

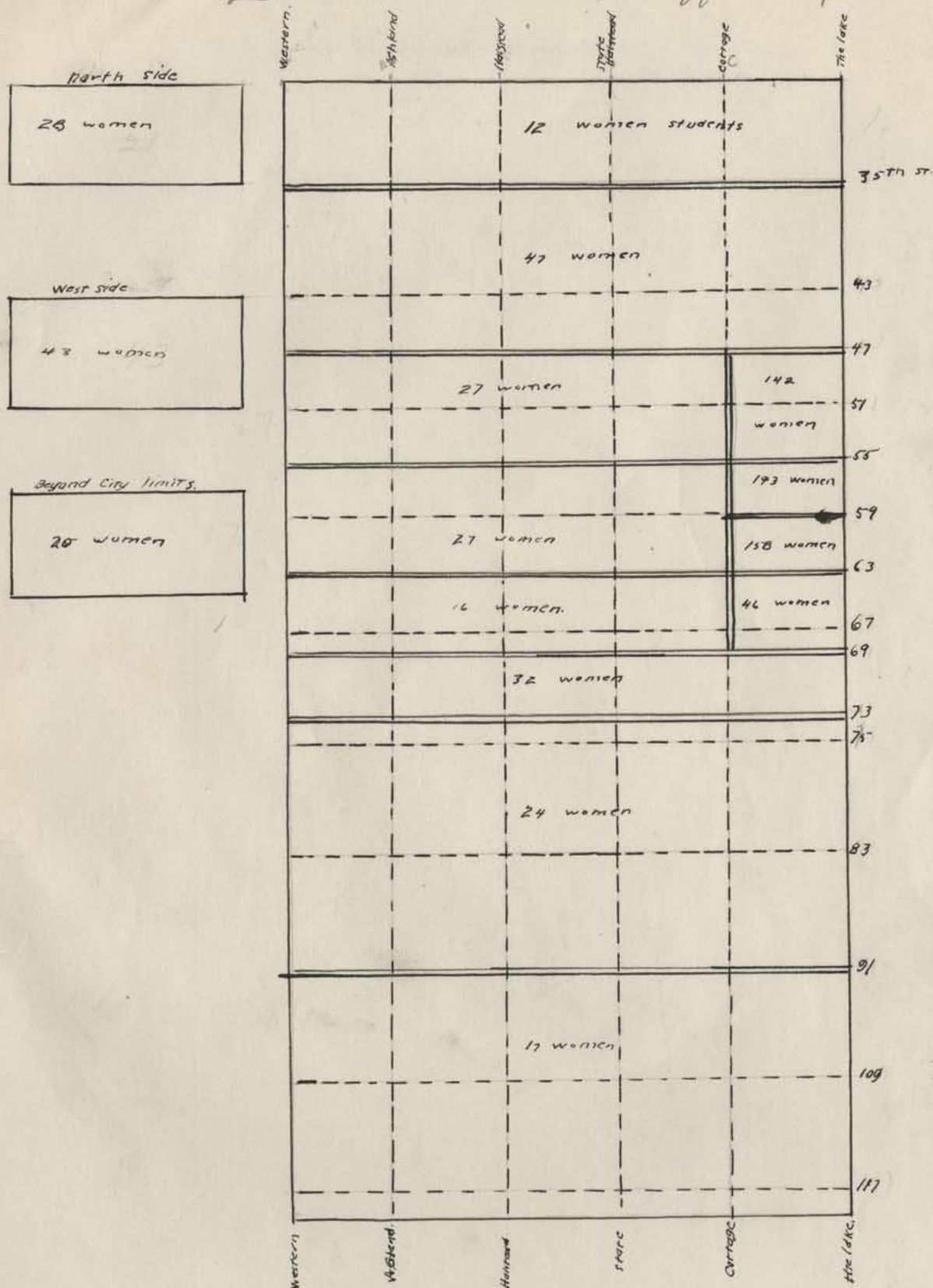

# Diagram showing the distribution of University women living off campus.

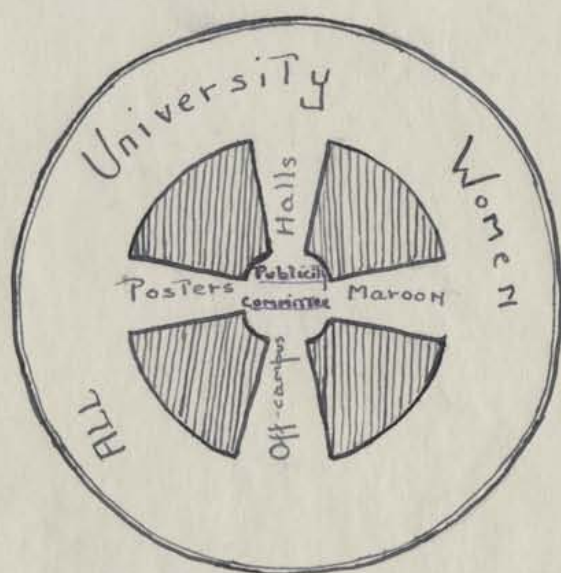
