Dear Dr. Harper: -

No man

can do a really big work in  
the world and not know the  
highness of it and something of  
his own value. It is impossible  
that you should not be sensible  
of the import your illness has  
for many hundred of people.  
You must know, even if they  
did not tell you, what they  
are thinking, - that you have

wrought greatly, and that we  
could ill spare you who alone  
can best do that which is  
yet to be done.

But my mind keeps dwelling  
on something very different. I  
am thinking, not of your won-  
=derful achievement, but just  
of those first farred few of  
us, your eldest children, who  
came to you in the early years.  
Nobody with so many big con-  
=cerns ever so wonderfully  
and humanly kept in touch

with the little personal ones as you. But  
it is not possible that the thousands  
of students of to-day can have as near  
a sense of their President as a person,  
as we had. Our smallest affairs are laid  
to you without misgiving, and nothing  
in the way we were met ever answered  
in us a suspicion that we had mis-  
=taken any tradition as to the relation  
between the dead and dead. So the close-  
=ness of our feeling were supposed  
unpaid ment, but has proven stronger with

the years, as maturity has taught  
us to appreciate our privilege.

And I am sure that among these  
frettings of your flock there  
are scores of hearts to-night which  
ache with a personal ache because  
of your pain and which might  
find some comfort for their  
anxiety if they could tell you  
that it is not admiration  
and esteem they feel for  
you, but love, and that  
they are holding you close in their  
prayers.
