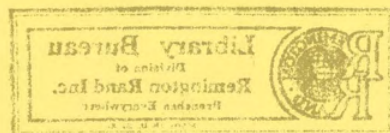

My dear Mr. Rockefeller:

I am writing, on behalf of the University, in connection with Founders' Day. The address was given by President Angell. In it he drew a contrast between the old college and the new university. A copy of the address will be sent you, and I am sure you will be interested in it. The day was a glorious day. The crowd was the largest we have ever had at the University--larger, even, than it was three years ago, when you were present. The enthusiasm was very great. Reference was made again and again to the fact that but for you and your help no such work would have been undertaken. I wish again, and I hope that you will allow me the privilege very often, to express to you our gratitude for the possibilities which you have placed within our reach.

You will receive within a few days a copy of the President's Annual Report. This is the first published report, and includes summaries of the work from the beginning. I venture to hope that you will find time to look into it. During the year which closed last Friday 2950 ~~stu~~ different students were in attendance. This is a much larger attendance than during any previous year. When you realize that we have no medical school, or law school, or school of engineering, these numbers are really very large indeed.
