Dear Sir:

The Russian Revolution has freed a people and a race and has made more secure the foundation of liberty for all men. It is an event whose magnitude can hardly yet be estimated.

The birth of FREE RUSSIA has been celebrated throughout the United States and many messages of rejoicing and congratulation have been sent to those directing the course of the new government. But generous, liberty-loving Americans will welcome, we are sure, the opportunity now to encourage in some more substantial form those who in Russia are today facing the difficulties of making secure that which has been gained.


Accordingly, The Society of The Friends of Russian Freedom proposes to raise, as speedily as possible, a fund for those political exiles who, returning by thousands from Siberia, find themselves in temporary but pressing need of financial assistance.

Professor Paul N. Miliukoff, Minister of Foreign Affairs, to our offer to raise such a fund to be administered by a committee in Petrograd to be appointed by him, has cabled: "Thanks for the suggestion. Accept most heartily".

We believe that this plan will meet with immediate and generous response from a very large number of Americans and that thus may be shown some small measure of the great esteem in which we in America, hold the survivors of that host of men and women who have sacrificed their all for the cause that has at last triumphed.

Dear Sir:

The Russian Revolution has been a topic of much discussion lately to the point of hyperbole. It is an event whose magnitude can hardly be estimated.

The people of FREE RUSSIA have been compelled to fight for the United States and many messages of relief have been sent to those fighting for the new Government. But remember, Imperial Russia with few exceptions, was the rule, the opposite of most of the countries in Europe. It is some time since adaptation to form of government has been effected.

Accordingly, the Golets of the Russian Free State propose to raise as quickly as possible a fund for those best fitted to do so, leaving the responsibility to the Comptroller of the Treasury. This will be used to meet the expenses of the revolution and to finance its operations.

Progressive Paul N. Miltonton, Minister of Foreign Affairs, to our offer of lists down a fund to be submitted by the Comptroller to the Comptroller of the Treasury for the use of the Comptroller, and has accepted.

We believe that this will meet with immediate success and general response from a very large number of Americans and friends in America, now the first to meet the needs of the poor of men who have suffered greatly from the revolution in Russia. We hope to meet this need by sending money to the Comptroller.
