#### ILLINOIS COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

THAT we believe the patriotic enlistment of each man, woman and child in the service of his or her town or country community under competent leadership will result in improved conditions, justifying a great spirit of pride in citizenship appropriate for the celebration of the 100th Anniversary of Illinois in 1918.

THAT we urge co-operation between the various state forces in order to enlarge and make more effective the efforts of each association; to bring together the best information obtainable and make it readily available for each community seeking to secure, through an efficient citizenship and organization, that preparedness for Illinois which is essential to the life and growth of the Nation.

Dear Sir:-

We are today sending over fifty state wide associations in Illinois the enclosed form of resolution for adoption and expect a general representation at a joint banquet given at the Lasalle Hotel. Wednesday evening, January 26th.

We hope this meeting and others to be held at the same time will culminate in a line of action resulting from the intense study which a number of agriculturalists and other country life leaders have been giving to the matter during the past year.

We are hoping the associations will be able to maintain a permanent. joint commission, which among other things, will hold community development courses in each county in the state twice a year and attempt to arouse public interest in the many problems to be solved and to enlist a large number of local leaders who can intelligently carry out the work.

As we feel the meeting will be almost historical in its importance, we are anxious to have the University of Chicago represented at the banquet on the 26th by yourself and the heads of such departments as are somewhat related to the problem.

We would appreciate it if the University might consider the movement as much a matter of its concern as that of any of the many associations which will be interested, and I would be only too glad to see you at any time you may designate, to explain the situation more fully. Indeed, I have for some time been most anxious to have a talk with you in order to get the benefit of your advice.

If it so happens that you will be downtown sometime next week and will let me know where I could meet you, the courtesy would be greatly appreciated. I have great confidence that we are taking a step of far reaching importance to the central west and possibly the entire country.
