- A. Number of marshals and aides. Experience goes to show that the size of the staff should be approximately as follows: a) 12 marshals; b) 10 aides.
- B. Method of selection. While this body is maintained by appointment by the President, it should be in some sense self perpetuating, that is, nominations made by the marshals and aides in residence should have weight in determining the final selection.
- C. Points to be considered in making nominations and appointments: a) Personal character, general usefulness and prominence in student activities; b) scholarship; c) number of university credits. Ideally the student should be selected at such period in their course in that they can be in the position to serve from three to five Convocations. This would mean that the largest

- the congregation marshal 1) gets scholastic record from Bureau of Records, 2) consults the respective deans, 3) puts material in shape and submits to President for final consideration and action.
 - E. Having followed essentially the plan outlined above I wish to submit the following recommendations to you for your consideration in preparation for the coming Convocation.

III. Marshals and Aides.

A. Qualification and Appointment.

Before we proceed farther with the exercises of Convocation week an explanation of the work of marshals and aides is in order. There are faculty marshals to the number of twelve and student aides to the number of six. The number of marshals and aides in residence at any one time may fall below this. The faculty marshals including the marshals of the Congregation are appointed by the Congregation. The student marshals and aides are appointed by the President. In practice nominations are made by the Secretary to the President who confers as a rule with the Marshal of the Congregation. * In making selections for student marshals and aides the aim is to name students who have creditable records in their courses and who are leaders in some field or other. It is usually wise to appoint students with not more than twenty-seven and not less than fifteen majors of credit in order that on the one hand marshals may be upper-class-men and on the other hand serve long enough to become experienced. Summonses for service in the case of both faculty marshals and of student marshals and aides are sent in the name of the President or the Secretary to the President but specific directions concerning participation in exercises are issued by the Marshal of the Congregation.

It is the custom in the nomination of aides for the Secretary to the President to consult with Miss Talbot.

B. Duties.

The duties of marshals and aides are to direct action at public exercises, the receptions, the entertainment of guests, and Convocations. Specific assignments are made by the Marshal of the Congregation.

Duning.

The dation of marginals and mides are to direct colimn at public exercises, the receptions, the entercalmention greats, and Convocations. Specific annienments are made by the Marshal of the Congregation.

C. Duties of the Head Marshal.

The duties of the Head Marshal are more definite. They include, first the direction of public exercises supreme for the occasion. The Marshal of the Congregation forms his plans in consultation with the President and the President's Secretary, but all orders issue from him at the time of execution and he is in charge. Second, as incident to the power of direction, the preparation of instructions for the exercises of Convocation week to the faculties, to candidates (these instructions prepared by the Marshal of the Congregation are printed under request and order of the Secretary to the President), marshals, the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds concerning arrangements in buildings, the Steward of the Reynolds Club concerning the disposition of the Club, the Director of the Choir, and the Director of the Band concerning music, the Manager of the Information Office concerning ushers at the Convocation, and the Deans concerning the presentation of their candidates for degrees. Typical instructions to candidates and the faculties are herewith appended. All these instructions except those to the faculties

and candidates are usually typewritten under the direction of the Congregation Marshal, but they may in an emergency

Selection of University Marshals and Aides will soon take place. Since the method of picking these high honor students is not generally understood, The Daily Maroon prints the following from Dr. E. J. Goodspeed, Secretary to the President, explain-

The Marshals and Aides assist the Marshal of the University in the conduct of public functions of the University, such as Convocations, Convocation receptions, and Convocation religious services. They are chosen annually in the Spring quarter on the basis of scholarship, activity in undergraduate life, and general promise. A list of persons in the Senior college who have not more than 30 majors, and not less than 18 majors, with a scholastic record certainly not with a scholastic record certainly not lower than "C," is first made up for the Marshal of the University.
