Dear Sir:-

Your favor of the 10th inst. is received.

I should regard it as wholly inadvisable to abandon the Monroe Doctrine. The United States can maintain it if it sees fit to exert its power. Intelligent people in South America have always regarded the United States in adhering to this doctrine as their chief safeguard. Of course it is greatly disliked in Europe, as it is the desire of certain European powers to parcel out South America among themselves, as has been done in Africa. Pan-Americanism would not be a substitute, but would be a great reinforcement for the doctrine.

I am always inclined to suggest to young people engaged in a debate that tangible arguments are much more useful than the expression of opinions.
