Northern Baptist Convention

Action taken May 17, 1916

On motion of Prof. F.L. Anderson, of Massachusetts,
the following resolution was adopted:

The Convention hereby makes it the duty of the Board of Education and its executive officers to be watchful of all attempts to extinguish or diminish Baptist influence or control in educational institutions now wholly or partially Baptist; and to take such legal and other action in the name of the Convention to safeguard such influence and control as shall be deemed necessary, whether the Baptists immediately concerned are favorable to such action or not. If for any reason and in any case the Board doubts the expediency of such action, they shall take steps to postpone any move hostile to Baptist influence or control until they can refer the case to the Convention for its decision.

EXHIBIT F.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE
BOARD OF MANAGERS
OF THE AMERICAN BAPTIST EDUCATION SOCIETY.

December 27, 1916.

WHEREAS, the American Baptist Education Society in the years 1889-1890 raised a sum exceeding one million dollars for the founding of a well equipped college in the City of Chicago, and said sum was used for the founding of the University of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, at its annual meeting held in Boston, May 17, 1889, the American Baptist Education Society passed the following among other resolutions respecting the founding of a college in the City of Chicago, viz.,

"3. RESOLVED, that the Board shall secure the incorporation of the proposed institution as early as practicable; that the Board of Trustees shall consist of twenty-one members ----- and that the President of the institution and two-thirds of the Board of Trustees shall always be members of Baptist churches;

"10. RESOLVED, that the Society shall take the title to the real estate of the institution and convey the same to the Trustees of said institution subject to a reversionary clause, providing that in case the Trustees shall ever mortgage the same, or any part of it, or any portion of the property thereon, it shall revert to this Society."

WHEREAS, the deed by which the said Society conveyed to the University of Chicago the west half of the main quadrangle of the University of Chicago, and the north half of the east half of the same, made this conveyance "upon the express condition ----- that the said premises shall for a series of a hundred years from the date hereof be used exclusively by the said party of the second part for educational purposes, as the site of a college or university and upon the further express condition that the said party of the second part shall at no time alienate or mortgage the said premises for any debt or other purpose without the consent of the

WHEREAS, the President of the University of Chicago has, on several occasions in the last three years, approached the Chairman of this Board with reference to the possibility of the American Baptist Education Society surrendering its reversionary rights to the above mentioned property of the University of Chicago, and has stated that this cloud on the title of the property of the University is a source of present embarrassment and of possible future injury to the University, and

WHEREAS, the President of the University of Chicago has in the interviews above referred to expressed his own judgment that the University ought never to pass out from under the control of the Baptist denomination, and latterly has said that his suggestion had reference solely to the removal of the cloud from the title to the real estate in question and did not contemplate any change in the articles of incorporation.

WHEREAS, the initiative in this matter has always come from the University, and in no case from a representative of this Board, and the Chairman has repeatedly discouraged even the consideration of the matter;

with practical unanimity expressed the opinion that the Board of Managers of the American Baptist Education Society ought to give serious attention to the Considerations advanced by the President of the University of Chicago, now, therefore,

RESOLVED, that the Executive Committee of the Board of Managers of the American Baptist Education Society place on record its convictions,

(1) That this matter should be dealt with in view of the fact that the American Baptist Education Society took the initial steps in the founding of the University of Chicago, and that it is still an agent for the Baptist denomination for the conservation and development of its educational interests;

(2) That the present relation of the University of Chicago to the denomination is an asset to the latter which the American Baptist Education Society can not lightly esteem, and is not without its advantage to the University.

(3) That account must be taken of the fact that the University has developed far beyond any plans which were contemplated when the reversionary clause was inserted in the deed above referred to, and that of the total gifts which have made this development possible, and which now amount, including unpaid pledges, to approximately \$50,000,000, not more than \$500,000 has been given by Baptists other than the founder;

(4) That as Trustee for the Baptist denomination and the donors to the million dollars raised by the Society for the founding of the University, it is the duty of the Board of Managers of said Society not

to hamper and embarrass the development of the University, but, in the maintenance of the same attitude which it takes toward all other institutions founded by the denomination, to seek to further the usefulness of the University as an agency for the promotion of human welfare through education; and also in particular to seek to conserve such a relation between the University and the denomination as will make for the healthy development of both; and

RESOLVED, that in our judgment these facts and principles exclude the settlement of the matter upon a monetary basis, or as a matter of the sale to the University of rights belonging to the Society, and demand that whatever action is taken by the American Baptist Education Society or its Board of Managers should be taken with a view to furthering the development of the work of the University and to the conservation of mutually advantageous relations between the University and the Baptist denomination, and

RESOLVED, that the Chairman of this Board, to whom all communications on this subject have been made thus far by the President of the University, be advised to report to the President of the University that if the Board of Trustees of the University shall appoint a committee of conference on this subject, representatives of this Executive Committee will meet such committee for the discussion of a plan which may subsequently be laid before the Board of Managers of the American Baptist Education Society for its consideration.

RESOLVED, that we appoint as the representatives of this committee to take part in such conference, the following persons: Ernest D. Burton, Frank W. Padelford, and C. A. Barbour.

RESOLVED, that we instruct these representatives (1) not to give their assent to a proposition to surrender the reversionary rights of the Society for a monetary consideration, direct or indirect, but to say to the representatives of the University that this Committee will give consideration to any proposition which looks toward the promotion of the interests of the University; (2) to express our conviction, which we believe to be shared by the Board that we represent, that the Baptist denomination, which through the American Baptist Education Society had the privilege of laying the foundation of the University of Chicago, will always desire that close and friendly relation shall be maintained between the University and the denomination; (3) to express themselves as favoring an understanding between the University and the Board of Managers of the American Baptist Education Society that the stipulation of the articles of incorporation of the University respecting the relation of the University to the Baptist denomination will not be changed without consultation with the Board of Managers of the Education Society; and (4) not to commit the Board of Managers to any proposition, but only to the consideration of the proposition which may be agreed upon in conference.

"The Board of Managers of the American Baptist Education Society having given prolonged consideration to the matter referred to in your resolution of May 15, desires to express its sense of the importance of the considerations that underlay your action, but regrets to be obliged to reply that in its judgment the usefulness of the Board as a conservator of the interests of education under Baptist auspices would be seriously jeopardized if the Board became associated in the minds of the denomination with an effort to change the terms of the relation between the Baptists and the University of Chicago. Regardless therefore of the merits of the case, it is the judgment of the Board that it can not wisely become the medium for the transmission to the Society of the proposition of the University, but must leave it to the University itself to present such request as it may judge wise directly to the Society. The Board is, however, willing to continue a committee of conference with a similar committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Chicago if the University so desires."

THIS INDENTURE made the 24th day of February One Thousand nine hundred and nine, between JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER, of the City, County and State of New York, party of the first part, and THE UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Illinois, herein-after called the University, party of the second part.

WITNESSETH, that the party of the first part, in consideration of one dollar to him in hand paid by the University, receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, does hereby for himself, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns release and discharge the University, its successors and assigns, from any covenant or condition to the effect that the President of the University and two-thirds of its Board of Trustees shall always be members of Baptist churches, which was contained or implied or which may be deemed to have been contained or implied in any gift of money or other property, real or personal, heretofore made by him; and does hereby grant, convey, sell, assign, transfer and set over to the University, its successors and assigns, all gifts whether of money or other property, real or personal, which he has heretofore made to it, free and discharged from any such covenant or condition; and covenants and agrees that any gifts which may hereafter be made by him, whether of real or personal property, shall be free and discharged from any such covenant or condition, unless the same shall be expressly stated in the instrument of gift transferring and conveying the same. This instrument is not intended to express any desire or suggestion that any change should presently be made in the matter of denominational control, but simply to provide that if at any time in the future the said University

or its Trustees should consider such a change to be advisable, either in the interests of the University or of the public which it is intended to serve, the gifts from the party of the first part should not present any legal obstacle to the making of such change.

JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER

Gentlemen:

In 1889 I made my first pledge of \$600,000 toward a million dollars for the foundation of a college in Chicago under Baptist auspices. This pledge was made to the American Baptist Education Society under a plan made by that Society - a plan which met my entire approval. It was hoped that the initial sum would be supplemented by further contributions made by others and that the college would in time have a normal growth.

That growth in fact has been phenomenal. So great was the need, so favorable the location in Chicago, so generous the response of Chicago people, that the college has become a great university of nation-wide influence. Such an institution, with its professional schools and its material contributions to knowledge, is of necessity undenominational in its administration. Realizing this vital and inevitable development, on the 24th day of February, 1909, I executed an indenture whereby I released the University, so far as any gifts of mine were concerned, from the condition in the Articles of Incorporation providing that the President and two-thirds of the Trustees should be members of regular Baptist churches. In making this indenture, I said that this instrument was not intended to express my desire or suggestion that any change should presently be made in the matter of denominational control, but simply to provide that if at any time in the future the University or its Trustees should consider such a change advisable, either in the interest of the University or of the public which it is intended to

serve, my gifts should not present any legal obstacle to such change.

The development of the University since 1909 has been even more notable than it had been up to that time, and its eminently university character, as distinguished from that of a mere college, has been very significant. I have followed that development with much interest, and from time to time have aided it by such contributions as circumstances seemed to warrant. I understand that my total gifts to the University of Chicago amount to nearly \$35,000,000, that the gifts of others than Baptists directly to the University total approximately \$15,000,000, and those of still others to non-Baptist institutions, contractually bound to the University, are upwards of \$10,000,000 more.

In the light of these facts, while I by no means urge a change of policy on the part of the Northern Baptist Education Society, which I understand is the legal successor of the American Baptist Education Society, yet if the Society should think it wise to adopt measures for releasing the University from all or any of the denominational restrictions in its Articles of Incorporation and in the tenure of its property, such action would meet with my hearty concurrence.

SUBSCRIPTION FOR INSTITUTION OF LEARNING IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Ill.
June 20, 1889

WHEREAS, The American Baptist Education Society has undertaken to raise the full sum of one million dollars for the purpose of establishing a College in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and

Of the list set out in Instrument No. 8, Mr. E. S. Conway died at Oak Park approximately a year ago; and I do not think that anybody on behalf of the family would make any objection to our change. His subscription, moreover, was only \$1,000, and I feel confident that I could secure a waiver from the representatives of his family. I do not know whether Mr. Needham, at Washington, D. C., is still living. As to John A. Reichelt (incorrectly written "Rickett"), under the title "Theological Union", he resides at Deerfield, Illinois; and, because of my personal relations with him, I think I perhaps would be more likely to secure a waiver from him than could anyone else.

I had an impression that Mr. Francis W. Parker had signed a release, but I do not find it among my files. Unless it is found among your files down there, I will at once apply to him for another.

May I trouble you for your views in the matter?
