My dear Mr. Aitchison:-

Inasmuch as it has been suggested by friends interested in the success of the New World Movement, including members of the Board of Promotion, in veew of the difficulty in raising the entire sum of one hundred million dollars for the use of the denomination, that various educational institu-tions including the Baptist Theological Union, readjust their requests for sums apportioned, and that such institutions waive further payments on the basis of such requests; and further, that inasmuch as the present needs of the denomination in various ways are very great and can less easily be met than the needs of the Baptist Theological Union for its Divinity School; and also inasmuch as the Theological Union regards the general needs of the denomination as of far more importance than any particular needs; therefore the Board of Trustees of the Theological Union, out of regard for these larger interests of our denomination, desires to go further than merely to meet the suggestion, and to that end hereby withdraws its request to participate in the one hundred million dollar fund, excepting only insofar as sums have been specifically designated for particular purposes, which of course it is not in its power to withdraw. The Board of Trustees have unanimously and very heartily adopted this action.

It is the purpose of the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Theological Union in carrying out its purpose of withdrawing its request for participation in the one hundred million dollar fund to turn over to the Treasury of the Board of Promotion all the funds already paid in to the Union from the Treasury of said Board of Promotion excepting only those which must be applied to designated purposes. May we add that it is the earnest desire of those entrusted with the administration of the Baptist Theological Union and also of the Trustees of the University of Chicago, whose funds so largely enable the Union to carry on its work, that the Board of Promotion may have entire success in meeting the great needs of the denomination.

Dear Doctor Judson: -

Replying to your favor of January 30th with reference to the relation of the Northern and Southern Baptist Conventions, will say the situation is both delicate and complicated. If the Northern Convention was a unit the situation would be less complicated and the mode of procedure less difficult.

As you know there is a very large split among the members of our own Convention. This has been apparent for many years but became acute at the Buffalo Convention. Without doubt, the Northern Baptist Convention is on the verge of a split. On the surface the differences seem to be a matter of belief. The Fundamentalists are insisting the Liberalists are not Baptist. Personally, I have doubted whether the leaders of the Fundamentalists really were concerned over the proposition which at the present time seems to be the dividing point, my idea being they have other matters which they consider of more value. The Southern Convention has been making inroads on our territory, upon the proposition they were the only true Baptists, and therefore were entitled to occupy our territory so that those of the North who were true Baptists would have a body with which to connect.

My opinion is the Southern Baptists actually believe in such propaganda, but that those of the Northern Baptist are making the same claims and using the same, to a considerable extent, as a camouflage. We are therefore confronted with a general understanding, both among the Baptists of the North and the South, that there is a wide difference of opinion amongst us as to belief. It seems to me therefore a practical move to have a large joint committee from the two Conventions to see if they can make a statement as to Baptist belief upon which the rank and file of both Conventions can agree. If this can be done, it would force those in the Northern Convention who are using this as propaganda to come out in the open and make the split in our Convention on the real thing which they have in their minds.

I consider the matter of belief in our denomination one which can be used with effect because of the general idea pre-vailing among Baptists, both of the North and the South, with reference to Baptist distinctive principles. I have no doubt the joint committee will come to an agreement and if the two Conventions will adopt such agreement, further propaganda thereafter with either North or South will be futile. The committees can only be appointed at the next annual Conventions and would not be ready to report for a year after next summer.

Our one hundred million dollar drive is badly jeopardized by this trouble. A year and one-half is of value, if the

Conventions adopt the joint report of the committee it would be another year before new propaganda could become prevalent. If we can maintain sufficient unity for the next two years and one-half we will be successful in raising our one hundred million I feel our educational and missionary interests would then be on a fairly stable basis and could continue to operate successfully Even if a large faction of our present members should withdraw, I do not think the Baptists of either the North or the South would adopt a creed, but a simple statement might be formulated satisfactory to the great majority. Unless we can come to some understanding, we will have a very decided split in our Northern Convention defeating our present drive and making it necessary for us to make new plans for continuing the work of our various boards and societies. It is possible, also if this matter of division is delayed two and one-half years conditions may obtain which would not threaten our unity as at present.


Presbyterians to Give Exhibits of Missionary Work

By the Rev. W. B. Norton. HICAGO Presbyterians will hold a series of expositions which will exhibit all phases of city, national, and world-wide missionary work. The first exposition will be held in the First Presbyterian church, 41st street and Grand boulevard, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. The second one will be held in the Buena Memorial church, Broadway and Sheridan road, Feb. 14-16; the third in the First church, Oak Park, Feb. 21-23. Each evening there will be given a pageant entitled "The Striking of America's Hour." Motion pictures, singing in costumes of various countries, and children's meetings will all be features. The various Presbyterian churches in the three districts will participate. Today will be field day in the south side churches, in which visiting ministers will speak.

The Baptist Theological union, which is the name used by the divinity school of the University of Chicago, because of the desire of the theological union to promote the general interests of the Baptist denomination and to favor institutions in more needy circumstances, has announced its intention to relinquish all claim to their share of the \$100,000,000 fund, except some specially designated funds which they cannot legally divert, which the Baptists are raising in a victory campaign. The sum the divinity school was to have received out of the total fund was \$250,000. The announcement is signed by Harry Pratt Judson, president of the University of Chicago, and Robert L. Scott of Carson, Pirie, Scott & Co., president of the board of trustees of the Baptist Theological union.

"Our action," said Mr. Scott, "is not that we do not as a divinity school need the money, but because we feel the needs of some other Baptist interest can be less easily met than ours at this time."

Fifty Evangelical churches will unite in a missionary rally today at 2:30 o'clock in Christ church, Francisco and Lexington avenues, under the auspices of the Evangelical home mission board for Chicago and northern Illinois.

My dear Dr. Judson;

I realize that there is perhaps a danger in continued discussion between representatives from the Northern and the Southern Conventions; but I feel sure that if you could have been in the conference held at Columbia, you would have felt that its results were wholesome. We made it very clear that it was non-representative - purely informal and personal.

I believe that the one resolution which we passed, regarding the adoption of a statement of faith, will be exceedingly valuable to us, in that it will side-track the Confession of Faith drawn up and adopted by the Fundamentalists. I do not think there is any possibility, at this time, of our avoiding some sort of statement of our beliefs, and I believe that the resolution offered by Judge Freeman will make it possible for us to have a representative committee, chosen by each Convention, and appointed to draft such a Confession of Faith.

It was very clearly stated by President Mullins of the Southern Baptist Convention that any such statement drawn up by Baptists can never be authoritative, but must always be purely voluntary; that it must not be made a test for appointment of officials; that its purpose is purely educative and enlightening. I think that if we can keep these principles in mind we may do much to allay the unrest and dissatisfaction without in any way departing from our historic Baptist position.

I was very glad that Dr. Mathews could be present. I think his speech was an enlightenment to many of the Southern delegates, who had imbibed all sorts of erroneous and distorted ideas concerning his position. Two or three expressed themselves to me to the effect that they had an entirely different view of his purposes and personality.

I agree with you that we should resist all attempts at having a creed imposed upon us; but I have come to feel that the making of some sort of statement is necessary. I was rather interested in looking up the New Hampshire and Philadelphia Confessions, to find that the New Hampshire Confession was never adopted by the State Convention, nor was the Philadelphia one by the Philadelphia Association. They were made upon the direction of these two bodies, and were adopted voluntarily by individual churches. They spread by their own intrinsic merits. Do you not think it is time for us to have a new Confession of Faith, that will take the place of these antiquated instruments? You remember that the Philadelphia Confession enjoined Foot-washing.

I appreciate your letter of the 30th and assure you that I sympathize with your concern about some of the tendencies observed among us.

I felt no hesitation however about accepting an invitation to an informal and unofficial conference with some brethren from the South. I think if you had been present throughout the meeting (Dr. Mathews was there only at the closing fraction of it) you would have discerned a real spirit of fellowship.

There was also manifested an objection to the imposition of anything which would operate as a creed. It was recognized that any Baptist or any number of Baptists has a right to make a statement of faith. It is my own conviction that if the Northern and Southern Conventions should agree to the appointment of a representative commission to prepare a brief statement which would express our agreement and not wander into detailed differences, it would automatically compose the tempest that is brewing in our Northern family.

My dear Dr. Goodchild:

In reply to your letter of February 11th. I would say that I fully recognize the delicate duties imposed upon your committee by the vote of the Northern Baptist Convention and I desire, personally, to render all possible help. The cause of Christian education is dear to us all, and only through cooperation can progress be made.

When, however, it is proposed to impose any theological tests upon schools and colleges, Brown University is obliged by its charter to decline such imposition. The charter, whose date is 1764, represents the historic attitude of the Baptist denomination when it declares: "Into this liberal and catholic institution shall never be admitted any religious tests, but on the contrary, all the members hereof shall forever enjoy full, free, absolute, uninterrupted liberty of conscience". If, therefore, we should respond to your questionnaire, we would violate our charter and subject ourselves to legal action.

The question, however, is very much broader than the legal one. Baptists have from time immemorial enjoyed the freedom which is affirmed by the Brown charter. It was to escape from the imposition of tests that this University was founded. The Baptists of Philadelphia came to Rhode Island in order that they might escape from the tests imposed in other colonies and find here in the land of Roger Williams freedom from all man-made creeds. If they now submit to any theological formulas imposed by ecclesiastical authority, they thereby part with their birth-right. May we not ask that your committee respect the historic position of the denomination? I earnestly hope that all the schools founded by Baptists in this country will affirm once again the conviction of our fathers and stand fast in the "soul liberty" of Roger Williams and in the original faith of the founders of Brown University.

At the request of President Judson I am sending you herewith a report of the religious activities among students of the University so far as it is possible to obtain a survey of these activities.

You will recall that the University is situated in the midst of a great city of about three million inhabitants. The students are not all residents in student halls. Many of them live in their own homes. Furthermore, while the total number of students during the year is about 11,000, the number present at any one quarter is customarily about one-helf of this number. Necessarily a report made at a give time would concern itself with only a portion of the entire student body for a year. The four quarter system in operation at the University makes a comparison of its student body in almost any particular with that of other sastitutions quite difficult, if not impossible.

In a group of students coming to the University from every state in the Union and from numerous foreign countries (there are 500 students from foreign countries in the University) it is exceedingly difficult to secure wholly adequate statistics with reference to their religious activities. The writer has been at the head of enect the men's dormitories of the University and has been directly or indirectly connected with it in one way or another for ten or fifteen years, and his impression is that the moral tone of the students of the University of Chicago is unquestionably high. The number of cases of intemperance, or of gambling, or of other immoralities is comparatively small. The fact that so large a number of the students of the University are in the Graduate Department lends a higher moral tone to the student body.

Your favor of the 21st instant is received. The University of Chicago did not itself file an application with the Board of Promotion for funds. The Baptist Theological Union, which is responsible for the Divinity School, but which in that capacity holds contractual relations to the University, did file such application. This, of course, was done with the knowledge and consent of the Board of Trustees of the University. It was done primarily to extend the interests of the Theological Union with the common purposes of the Baptist undertakings. The Union was allotted by the Board of Promotion \$250,000 for endowment, and part of this was for designated purposes in connection with the University. The rest would come from undesignated funds. My dear Dr. Judson:

You would have been deeply interested if you had been present at the meeting when the agreements were entered into to which your letter refers. The Chairman, Mr. Rhoades, tried to get us around to a doctrinal statement and we fought shy of it and said it would not mean anything.

Dr.Massee arose and said he wanted to state exactly where he stood. I am quoting him also verbatim. "I believe that the revelation of God and the inspiration as contained in the Scripture are static and cannot be altered or added to. I believe that the Baptist faith and Baptist position are static. I believe that all religion is static and that it is our bounden obligation to stand by the faith once for all delivered to the saints."

After the Chairman had tried once more, for a seventh time, to get us to agree to propositions like "God is love". I arose and said that it seemed to me the issue was a very plain one, the line of demarkation is both wide and deep in this very room. I do not believe at all as Dr. Massee does. I believe that revelation and inspiration are abiding and continuous, that some of Whittier's hymns and George Matheson's and others were as inspired as many of the Psalms and that God is still present with us to lead and guide us in the discovery and apprehension of wider areas of truth and newer fields of service. The question is, is the Baptist Denomination large enough for both Dr. Massee and myself? From my point of view there is a place where Dr. Massee can do his own work and serve God as he understands Him. The question is whether from Dr. Massee's point of view there is a place for me? The discussion after that turned upon that issue and the agreement was that each man must have the privilege of having his own faith and propagating it as he understands it. It was most clearly understood that whatever a Commission might draft in the way of stating the Baptist position it is not to be regarded as a Creed nor used as a test for either the Convention, Associations, Churches or individuals, but that at most it might be a publication of what the Baptist position had been in the past and which in general represented the situation to-day.

While Dr. Massee signed this agreement I will say I do not have any faith in his living up to it. By this I do not mean to impune his sincerity but his ideas and conduct are regulated by an entirely different code than that which you and I hold in the ethical world. However, I do not think that he can project much in the Convention after this agreement.

As I hope to meet you in Indianapolis, where I anticipate a very profitable session of the Northern Baptist Convention, I would be pleased to have you consider the following points as a practical program for action at the Convention:

I consider the editorial chair of "The Baptist" the most potent office in the denomination. The Editor and his Associate should be elected, or re-elected. directly by the Convention every two years. The present committee-control of "The Baptist" is causing dissatisfaction. I have no one in mind for the editorship, but I am convinced, in the interests of efficiency, "The Baptist," to be a great blessing to the entire denomination, must have a truly big man, both in mind and heart, at its head. The Convention should also, in my judgment, direct that its editorials should be signed and its book-reviews initialed.

Southern Baptists turned this down.

- 2 I understand that the Southern Baptists, falling in line with the recommendation of the Columbia Conference, have appointed a Committee to co-operate with Northern Baptists in preparing a declaration of faith. Shall we not also take similar action? The so-called "Des Moines Confession" is a good one but not, in my judgment, prepared with sufficient care nor does it cover some points of very great importance to us just now. Shall not the Baptists of the United States and Canada prepare with great care and thoroughness a declaration of faith to be broadcasted to the entire world? This confession of faith would be reported to us next year and we could then judge it on its own merits. This action will clear the theological atmosphere and permit us to concentrate upon our world-wide program of education, social service and evangelism.
- 3 A special session for prayer alone, prayer for unity in Christ and His truth, for loyalty to His word, and for the power of the Holy Spirit to complete the Hundred Million Dollar Campaign.

- 4 The appointment of a deputation authorized to call conferences or conventions of the non-participating churches throughout the field of the Northern Baptist Convention for the purpose of hearing their grievances and securing their cooperation with the Hundred Million Dollar Campaign. Churches may now designate their gifts and there is no sufficient excuse for not participating, but we must go "the second mile" in attempting to align all Baptists.
- 5 Action on the part of the Convention caling for American intervention in behalf of Armenia, and the appointment of a deputation to take the resolutions to Washington. The Federal Council is sending out 75,000 letters to evangelical churches asking for action in behalf of Armenia. I am informed that there are twenty bills in committee in the House of Representatives looking in this same direction. Now is the time to strike. Eight millions of American Baptists ought to be able to influence the Administration and the Congress of the United States. We were influential in Virginia in 1775 and we should repeat our success.
- 6 An emphatic demand upon the part of the Convention that no men be retained as members on our Boards who are not outspokenly loyal to the fundamentals of the faith, and in particular, to the Virgin Birth, Atonement, Bodily Resurrection and Return of our Lord, and to the integrity of the Ordinances of Christ, and the Salvation of the soul by Grace alone through faith in Christ. It is a shame that there should be some in high places in the Convention now who have abandoned their faith in our Lord Jesus Christ. They are a threat to our people and a cause of division, and they halt the progress of our host. There is an Achan in the camp. Let us not compromise by further tolerating such men. True Baptists will take down their guns and fight, if necessary, for religious liberty, for the right of the soul to its own approach to God. That is, if a Unitarian was denied the right of being a Unitarian we are pledged to help him obtain that right. But when a Baptist becomes a Unitarian and still tries to be a Baptist, we ought to fight just as vigorously to get the moth out of the bee-hive.
- 7 I would, in particular, call your attention to the pitiful failure of the leaders of the Divinity School of the University of Chicago. Shall men, who have lost the greatest opportunity that Baptist educational leaders have had in a generation, be entrusted with positions of vital leadership in our denomination? The University of Chicago is doing a splendid work as a secular University, but to call it a Baptist University is childish. Out of an enrollment of over 6000 students it has 322 Baptist students. With a proper loyalty to Baptist fundamentals it could easily have had a thousand Baptist students by this time. The Divinity School proper has

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no longer a consistent Baptist position. The majority of its students are not Baptists. It is an a la carte School of Religion, and is traveling the inevitable road of Andover, Harvard and other similar semi-rationalistic schools. It has failed intellectually as well as spiritually although of course not without its achievements and virtues. Let us face the facts and break up the undue influence of the men who have failed at the University of Chicago and in particular in the Divinity School. Let us not allow them to mislead the minds and dampen the ardor of the Baptists of the North and West. They are doubtless sincere men but they have failed to do their own work well, and we need a new type of leadership for the present crisis, men who believe with all their souls in the fundamentals of the Baptist position and men who are thoroughly educated and alive to this modern age.

These are some of the things that have been upon my mind and heart and I would be happy if we could stand together in accomplishing some of these things. There is a "lunatic fringe" amongst the fundamentalists who are narrow, rabid and extreme. A better education and a deeper culture will cure this trouble. There is the opposite extreme of the German rationalism, men who are the victims of disintegrating Biblical criticism. The cure for these men is, in some cases, conversion and in all cases a spiritual deepening. Let us follow neither extreme but keep on "The King's Highway."
