Last evening I had great delight in reading the little booklet of thirty-two pages, covering the program of the University of the present and the near future. This was indeed inspiring. It quickened my desire to participate in some humble way.

When I read the section regarding scholarships, et cetera, it brought again to my mind the days when I was assisted by the "Student Loan Fund". I look back to that help with genuine appreciation. Mr Robertson was at that time in charge and the kindness which met my request for loans and the spirit which I encountered later in paying them, were indeed encouraging. The truth is, if I had not had the help I then received, I should have been forced to drop out of the University, at least temporarily. And in view of the opportunities that chanced to come my way at that period, there was the likelihood of my getting into remunerative work such that I should have postponed going on with my studies and possibly thereby of finishing my undergraduate work.

Many times since then, I have desired greatly to add to that Fund so that others might be assisted, but the chance for doing that seems as remote as ever, since even to this day I continue to carry two loans made to me during my University period by some good farmer friends of my boyhood days.


arise, who shall have both the vision and the means to found such a School of Music.





Dear Harms -

Following up my letter to you of April 7, I have looked further into the matter of the distribution of the University booklet.

So far as the alumni are concerned, I have been informed by Secretary Goodspeed, a copy will be mailed free to all whose addresses we have.
