THE LUNCHEON IN HONOR OF THE PRINCE OF WALES
HUTCHINSON COMMONS, Monday October 13, 1:30

The cars with the Prince's party arrived at the corner of 58th Street and Woodlawn Avenue at 1:30. The party consisted of 1. Prince of Wales, 2. General Trotter, 3. Sir Walter Peacock, 4. Major Metcalfe, 5. Captain Lascelles, 6. Inspector Burt, 7. Mr. L. F. Swift, 8. Mr. H. H. Swift, 9. Mr. Minotta. They entered the campus at 58th and after swinging partly around the Circle to the left, followed the driveway into Harper Quadrangle, passing in front of the Law School and then proceeding to the door of the West Tower of Harper.

President Burton, attended by the University Marshall, Robert V. Merrill and two undergraduates, Kenneth Laird, Marshall, and Josephine Maclay, Aide, met the Prince on the doorsteps and was presented to him and his party. He took them into his office where the Prince was presented to Vice-President Tufts and a group of representatives of the Faculty, Dr. Michelson, Dr. Breasted, Dr. Billings and Dr. Manley. After signing the guest book, he left the office with President Burton and walked to the Reynolds Club. They were conducted by the University Marshall and four assistants, two walking with the Marshall in front of the Prince's party and two bringing up the rear. All the Marshalls were in cap and gown.

The party paused at the top of the steps at the southwest corner of the court.

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The University Marshall with two assistants preceded the party as before and two other Marshalls brought up the rear. The Marshalls conducted the Prince's party to the room at the south end of the second floor of the Reynolds Club which was set aside as the dressing room for the Prince and his suite.

THE LUNCHEON

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After all the guests were at their places in Hutchinson, the President and the Prince and those who were to sit at the speaker's table entered the hall. An orchestra, stationed in the balcony of the hall, played God Save the King, and all the guests remained standing while the party passed up the center aisle to the speaker's table which was on the dais at the west end. The hall was decorated with British and American Flags, with palms, and with flowers. In the main body of the hall there were two members of the faculty and one trustee at each of the tables to act as hosts to the guests from the city. The orchestra played softly during the luncheon. At the end of the luncheon President Burton made a brief speech (about five minutes) and concluded it by proposing the Prince's health, which the Prince acknowledged with a bow. The party at the speaker's table then passed down the aisle, all the guests standing while they did so. The Marshall and his Assistants conducted them to the dressing room on the second floor of the Reynolds Club. They then took them downstairs where President Burton joined them again and proceeded with them to the automobiles at the Mitchell Tower door. Following the taking of several pictures, the President said good-bye and the cars proceeded west on 57th Street.

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
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

My dear Mr. Beck:

As has been announced, His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, will come to the University of Chicago for luncheon at one o'clock on Monday, October 13. His schedule provides that the whole time at the University shall be only slightly more than an hour, which precludes any attempt at the usual, otherwise desirable, formalities. On this account, we have decided there shall be no ~~programme of~~ ^{but} speech-making, merely an informal luncheon, ^{after which} ~~and then~~ His Royal Highness and the party will proceed to the Field Museum.

It has been suggested that reporters representing the daily papers be invited to the luncheon. We greatly regret ^{that we are} not ^{comply with} being able to agree to this suggestion, ^{There will be no} ~~but since formalities will~~ ~~not occur~~ and there will be only a five-minute address of welcome and appreciation on my part, ~~it seems impossible to comply.~~

Dear Mr. Burton:

- (1) Attach you herewith message received on question of the Prince's making a reply or any kind of speech. You will see that it is out of the question and I think you should be ready immediately to quell any demand. As I see it, under no circumstances should it now occur.
- (2) Probably the Prince's party will arrive in two or three cars, the first of which will include the Prince and my brother, L. F. Swift, with one or two other people. I am now raising the question whether the whole party needs to go into your office or whether just the first car may go. Will try to answer this before arrival.

Question is now up as to whether I shall go from the Yards to the University with the party, arriving with them rather than being there in advance. It rather looks as though this question would be decided affirmatively but I will let you know definitely well beforehand. In that event, either my brother or I will meet you and present you to the Prince and present the others to you -- after which you will take charge.


