Dear Sir:-Last Friday I wrote a letter to you in regard to the proposed plans for the Pullman School. On Saturday I gained certain information that furnishes an additional reason for asking the trustees of the school to take this matter under consideration before April 15th. At the annual meeting of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, Professor John B. Johnson of the University of Wisconsin, read a paper in support of the following resolution:-RESOLVED, That the manufacturing interests of this country demand a secondary school training more extended than that given in our manual training schools and better suited to the purpose than that given in our engineering schools. Professor Johnson has an intimate knowledge of industrial conditions which made his paper an exceedingly valuable contribution to the discussion of this subject. After the meeting I learned that he expects to sail for Europe April 15th, and to spend the entire summer making a careful study of the best manual training and industrial schools in Germany. For ten years Professor Johnson was a practicing engineer, and then he became Professor of Engineering at Wash-

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I believe that if I should be appointed Director of the Pullman School I could obtain from the Commissioner General leave of absence from this country for four months in order to accompany Professor Johnson. The preliminary plans for the exhibit of education and social economy have been completed, and the exhibits will not begin to come in to the Albany headquarters until September. It is possible, therefore, that Director Rogers might be willing to recommend that I be given leave of absence until September, especially as the study of German schools would prove very useful to me if I should be appointed a member of the International Jury of Awards on exhibits representing technical education at the Exposition next year.

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schools of Germany in company with Professor Johnson is very attractive. It is rare to find a man whose training and experience are broad and thorough, and whose interests are in so many ways identical with my own. And when in addition I find that he is going to spend four months in Germany doing precisely what I should desire to do if I were appointed Birector of the Bullman School, it seems to me too great an opportunity to be neglected.

Hoping that you may be willing to bring this matter before the trustees of the Pullman School before I leave Chicago, I beg to remain,
