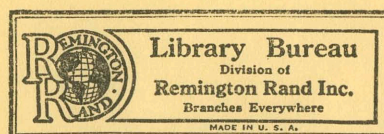

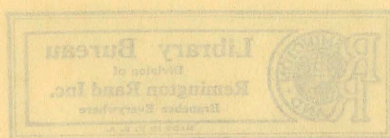

of the girls on whose

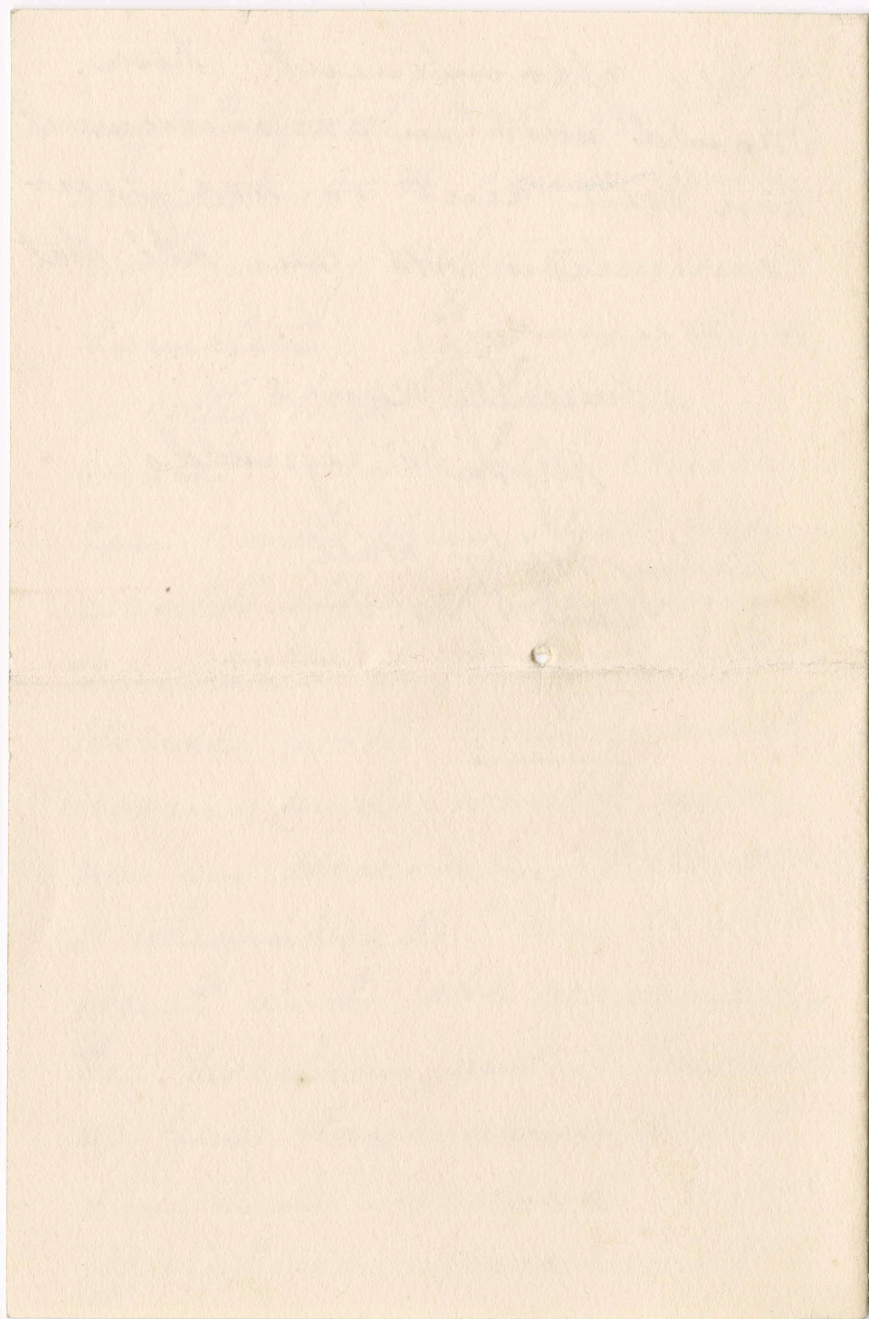
right spirit and good
