

Dear Sir.

The Royal Society of Literature (founded by Royal Charter in 1825) recently appointed a Committee, which may fairly be said to include some of the most distinguished men in this country, for the purpose of promoting an Intellectual Entente among the Allied and Friendly Countries. This Committee has appointed a Sub-Committee on Relations with America. It is on behalf of that Sub-Committee that I now address you, and I venture to ask that we may include you and the body which you represent in the list of our correspondents in the United States.

The object of our work, which should continue long after the War, and which we shall earry on in loyal co-operation with other agencies that can assist in the task, is nothing less than to bring about the utmost possible co-operation between our two countries in all the higher branches of knowledge and thought. With this in view, we shall encourage and in various ways assist the

writing both of books and of magazine articles calculated to make each country better known and understood in the other. As a single illustration of what may be done in this respect, we may mention that a distinguished historian who is a Fellow of our Society, has now undertaken the long-needed work of writing a popular History of the United States for English readers. We are also directing our attention (in conjunction with others interested in this matter) to the development of co-operation between the Universities and other teaching Institutions of the two countries, by encouraging and guiding students in either country to pass on for further study to a University in the other country, in cases when that is advisable, and by encouraging the interchange of teachers.

Apart from this work, which looks mainly to the future, we find ourselves able at the present moment to be of much assistance in promoting lectures in schools and in clubs, and addresses on public platforms, by which English people generally may be made aware of the significance of America's entry into the War.

We think that we can be of considerable service by bringing about meetings and correspondence between individuals who, hitherto unknown to each other, are interesting themselves in the study of the same subjects on opposite sides of the Atlantic, and we are invited by

the Ministry of Information to co-operate with them for this purpose.

In the present crisis correspondence such as we are able to promote may be of use in clearing away possibilities of political misunderstanding. In this respect we think that the enclosed Statement of Political Aims, made on behalf of the Entente Committee, may be of interest to you and those with whom you are associated.

We shall be gratified if you would at any time address to us enquiries which you may wish to make, or information which you may wish to convey, and we hope that you will in like manner permit us on occasion to address ourselves to you.
