I write to convey to you information which, without question, I should have given you some time since. It relates to the division of work between the department of gynecology and surgery. The commuttee of the Trustees. 

My Dear Doctor Harper:-

I have received Dr. Webster's letter this morning from which I quote the important features:

"I have wired the President that I have practically accepted. The MCGill guns are booming heavily around me and I have postponed my definite decision out of courtesy to Principal Peterson and the McGill authorities who are trying to hold me. I know they cannot do so, but they have begged me to wait a few days. I know they cannot shake me as I have well considered everything. The opportunity in Chicago is so great, I want to build up the greatest obstetrical school in America. I owe this to my training and to the great obstetrical school of my Alma Mater - Edinburgh. The generous sympathy and the ideals of yourself and colleagues have enabled me to decide. I shall arrange to come to Chicago as soon as possible according to your suggestion. An abled staff is an essential factor. We must get the right sort of men. Do you think we can kind sufficient to begin with in Chicago, or should we try to get one young fellow trained in Johns Hopkins? I wish to raise as little local trouble as possible and must depend upon your judgement and experience for help. I shall try to get away from Montreal as early as possible in June in order to get a rest. I think I can pick up some good things in Edinburgh and Paris without great expense. Believe me,
