Dear Sir:-

The annual state conference on tuberculosis will be held in Albany November 4th and 5th under the auspices of the State Charities Aid Association and the State Department of Health. In conjunction therewith the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis will hold its North Atlantic Conference for the tuberculosis workers in New York City, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland and the District of Columbia.

There will be one mass meeting, three general sessions and nine sectional meetings for members of local tuberculosis committees, for beards of managers and medical superintendents of tuberculosis hospitals, for dispensary and clinic physicians, for tuberculosis visiting nurses. for Red Cross Seal agents, and for those interested in open air

schools and fresh air classes, and a clinic for general practitioners of medicine. A private mailing card giving the program of the meetings is being sent you.

The mass meeting will be held on Thursday evening, November 4th, in the Auditorium of the State Education Building. Governor Whitman will make an address; Dr. Biggs, the State Commissioner of Health, will tell "What Has Been Learned About Tuberculosis Since the International Congress of 1908, and What Modifications, If Any, This Should Have on the Constructive Program". Mr. Folks, the third and last speaker, will have for his topic "The Next Eight Years". (The New York State Tuberculosis Campaign was begun eight years ago this fall.)

The objects of the conference are to take stock as to results secured up to this time, to consider whether new knowledge gained during the last seven years calls for any change in the constructive program, to take a look forward for a similar period of time, and to gain fresh impetus, inspiration and momentum for the remainder of the program.

We hope it will be possible for you to attend the conference and take part in its proceedings. All of the meetings will be held in the State Education Building.
