Dear Dr. Harper:

I have duly received your letter of the 24th. of February in regard to the celebration in honor of the contribution of German scholarship to higher education in the United States, which is to take place from the 18th. to the 22nd. of March, at the University of Chicago, and I am much interested in your wish to have the German Emperor write a letter, addressed to you as President of the University, which might be read upon that occasion. I regret, however, that, as your letter did not reach me until the 8th. of March, it was impossible to present the request to His Majesty in time to have a letter arrive at Chicago before the date of your celebration. I had an opportunity, however, of speaking to the Emperor personally upon the subject, and I read your letter to him. He expressed great pleasure at your wish to have him make a communication to the University and said that, as the time was too short for him to write, he would send you a telegram of greeting through Baron von Sternburg, who could read it at the time when he makes his address at Chicago. I telegraphed you last evening

to inform you of this decision of the Emperor.

I thank you for the honor that you have done me in conferring upon me the degree of Doctor of Laws, and I am proud to be brought thus into closer connection with the University of Chicago. Your telegram informing me that the degree may be conferred on the 22nd. of March, in absentia, came to me last evening and I have replied this morning saying that I shall be happy to receive it in that way. As I am absent from the United States in the service of the Government and not likely to be able to present myself at Chicago at a moment which would be suitable to you to confer the degree upon me otherwise, I am gratified that you have decided to confer it upon me in connection with the celebration about to take place on the 22nd. of March.

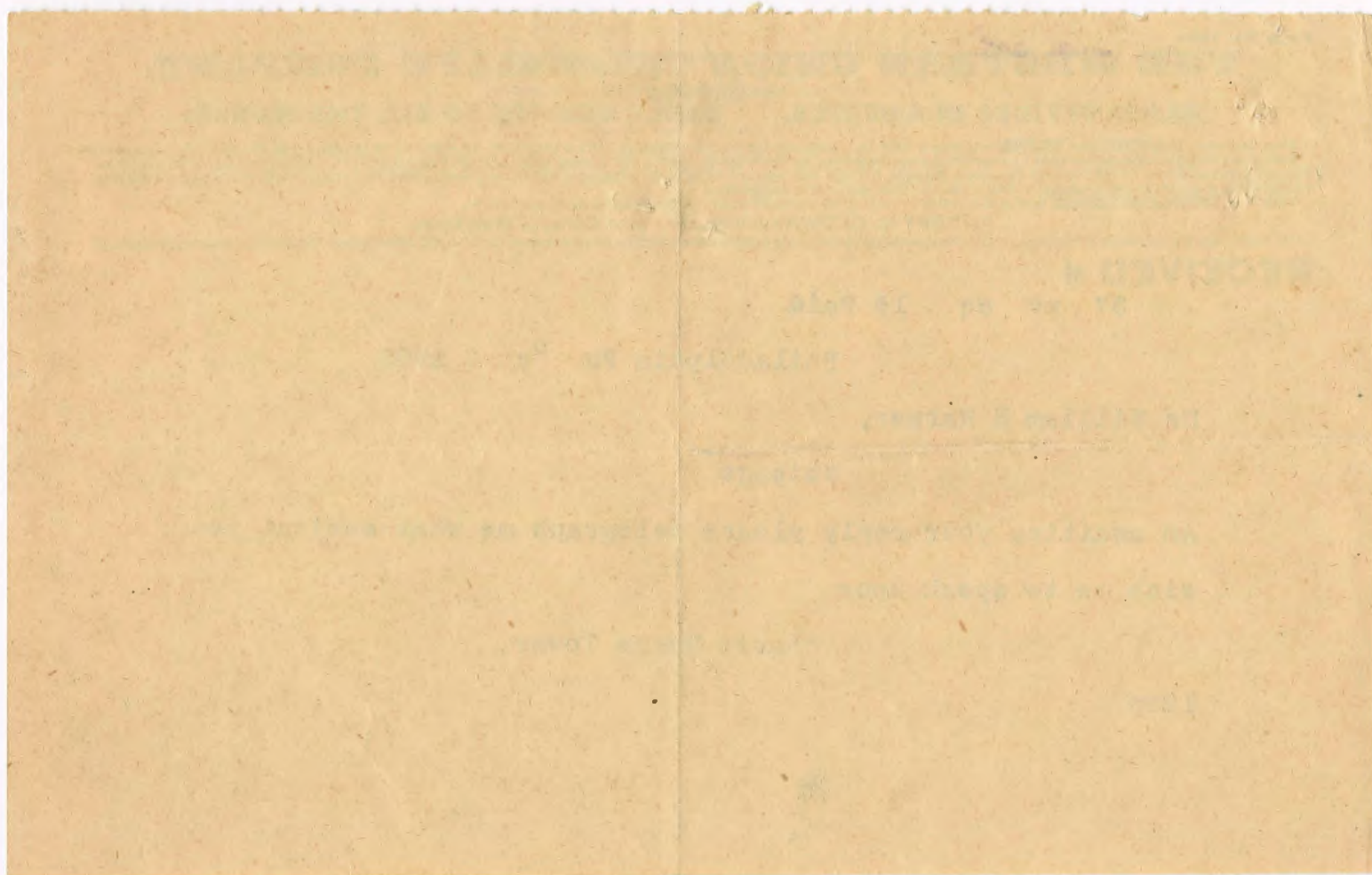
