

I have in my posession the original of a cartoon made by Mr. McCutcheon showing these gay birds and their plumage. You can well imagine that I must have been immeasurably gratified to be able to give orders to underlings in uniform.

These documents connected with the early history of the University are exceedingly interesting; at least to me, and I thank you for your thoughtfulness in sending the contract to me.
