My dear Dr. Harper

I did not hear of the glorious result of the \$1,000,000 effort until I got to Cologne the other day. My letters had missed me as also the papers. I congratulate you on the magnificent conception of this effort and its accomplishment - May you be long spared - so that you will witness in the years to come the growth of an institution which will equal any in the world.

I called at Freiburg on my way north from Strasbourg - found that Dr. V. Holst has left for Berlin & was to sail from Antwerp for N. Y. last Saturday.

At Strasbourg - I was much impressed with the grand buildings of the University. I met there Dr. Hausmann, the Secretary of the University and he gave me their late issue giving history and illustrations of their buildings.

At Heidelberg I met Dr. A. Merx who ~~he~~ wished to be specially remembered to you. I also met Dr. Zangemeister the librarian and saw the manuscript of Menasse lately acquired from the National Library of Paris at the immense price of 360,000 marks.

I am sorry to be obliged to leave out in my trip Leipzig - Dresden, Berlin, Hamburg, Göttingen, Amsterdam & The Hague, but my time will not allow of it.

I had a good time at Cologne, Brussels & Antwerp and must finish now with a few days in England and ^{then} sail on City of Paris Aug. 17. for N. York, and hope to be in Chicago August 27. - Chicago and the University are known very widely, as well as the University President.
