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Dear President Harper, --

I write to consult you with reference to a matter of inter-scholastic courtesy. We have been engaged in the course of the last few days in making up mailing lists for the announcements of courses to be given in our Graduate School during the academic year 1897-98. These announcements have hitherto been sent to instructors and students in those Universities which do not make a feature of Graduate work. We have not sent any to the University of Chicago, for we have not wished to appear as entering at all into competition. Does it not seem desirable, however, that the Graduate students of our American Universities should be encouraged to move more freely from University to University, much as is done in the Universities of Germany? That the need of some such system is becoming felt among the students themselves is sufficiently evinced by the publication of the Graduate Handbook, which has been recently undertaken by the Federation of Graduate Clubs. We feel, therefore, that our announcements might with propriety be put into the hands of your students, and it would give us great pleasure to see in like manner the announcements of your Graduate work in the hands of our Graduate students, and of our present Senior Class.

May I ask for an early expression of your views on this point?
