



Annual Free Picnic for Chicago's Poor Children and Mothers

THURSDAY, JUNE 25th, 1903

PROCLAMATION.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CHICAGO, May 25, 1903.

Whereas, There are in the City of Chicago many poor children who from circumstances are compelled to act in the capacity of bootblacks and newsboys, etc., in order to eke out a meagre existence, and

Whereas, It has been the annual custom during the last eighteen years, through the benevolence of our newspapers and citizens in general, to give these children an outing and picnic, the same will be given again this year under the auspices of THE VOLUNTEERS OF AMERICA, at Washington Park: and

Whereas, the 25th day of June has this year been selected as the date for holding the said annual picnic,

Therefore, I, CARTER H. HARRISON, Mayor of the City of Chicago, do hereby proclaim the 25th day of June, A. D. 1903, as Children's Day, and earnestly recommend the same to the citizens at large. I call upon them to warmly support the project of giving the children of Chicago a happy day's outing among the trees and flowers of one of our City Parks, thus bringing into many clouded lives some of the gladness and sunshine so freely enjoyed by children in happier circumstances.

Furthermore, I appoint Brigadier-General EDWARD FIELDING to be the Director General of the day.

This Picnic is absolutely non-sectarian,

The Picnic has been established nineteen years.

I desire to impress upon your mind the fact that this is not a denominational Picnic, but a City affair for all classes, irrespective of persons or creeds. It is also a large undertaking; not merely a few hundred, but thousands of children take advantage of this outing yearly. We have never had less than seven trainloads, whom we have taken out to the Park and brought back safely.

I would remind you that this is not a small undertaking. We have always had from 10,000 to 15,000 children, hence you can judge from this what a great responsibility we have taken upon ourselves. It is not confined to newsboys and bootblacks, but poor mothers come here with their whole family and enjoy the day's pleasure with us.

A large refreshment booth will be erected in the Park, where each child will be given a box of food, also ice cream and

lemonade. This year we will make a special feature of the games, to make the day interesting; prizes will be given and every

effort put forth for the happiness of the Children.

The Park Commissioners have again given us the free use of Washington Park.

The Superintendents of all Charitable Institutions in the City will receive invitations to come and bring their Children with them, everything being free; and it is expected that a number of Sabbath Schools, who are unable to give their Children a Picnic this summer, will join with us to enjoy the good things provided at this Outing.

We were delighted with the success of last year's Picnic, the evident enjoyment of the Children, and also touched with the many little ones who, poorly clad, came to us with baskets at the close of the Picnic, requesting food for the needy ones at home who were unable to accompany them to this day's pleasure and freedom, but were not forgotten, that we have dared to undertake this worthy enterprise again. We have also been appealed to by the Children themselves on the streets, asking if there would be another Picnic this year, and though it means a tremendous responsibility and is almost a herculean task, we have confidence that the Christian and philanthropic people of Chicago will willingly help us to make this Picnic possible, especially when they know that there are so many loving, willing hearts giving their thought, time and energies free for the benefit of these little ones who would seldom, if ever, have one day's happiness or brightness were it not for some such charitable undertaking as this.

To give you some idea of the magnitude of this outing, I wish to say, that we never distribute less than 18,000 lunches, 200 gallons of ice cream, 1,000 gallons of lemonade. The work in this effort keeps our force of officers busy night and day for a month, and the expenses are far greater than it would be possible for you to imagine, unless you had the responsibility

of such a task yourself.
