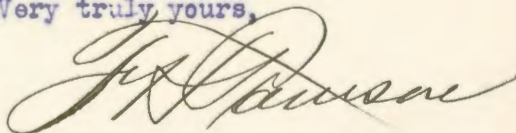
Dear Dr. Judson:
