

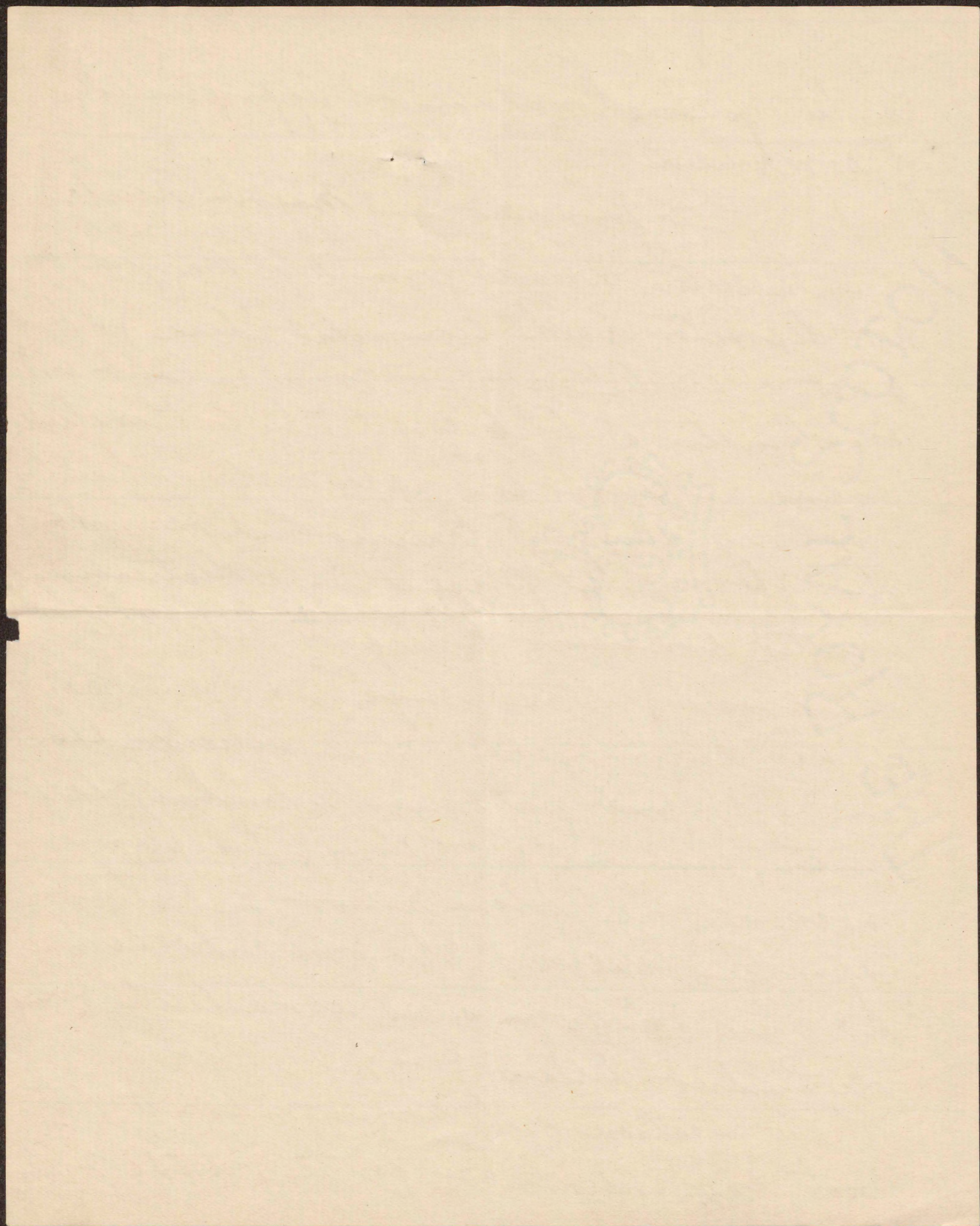

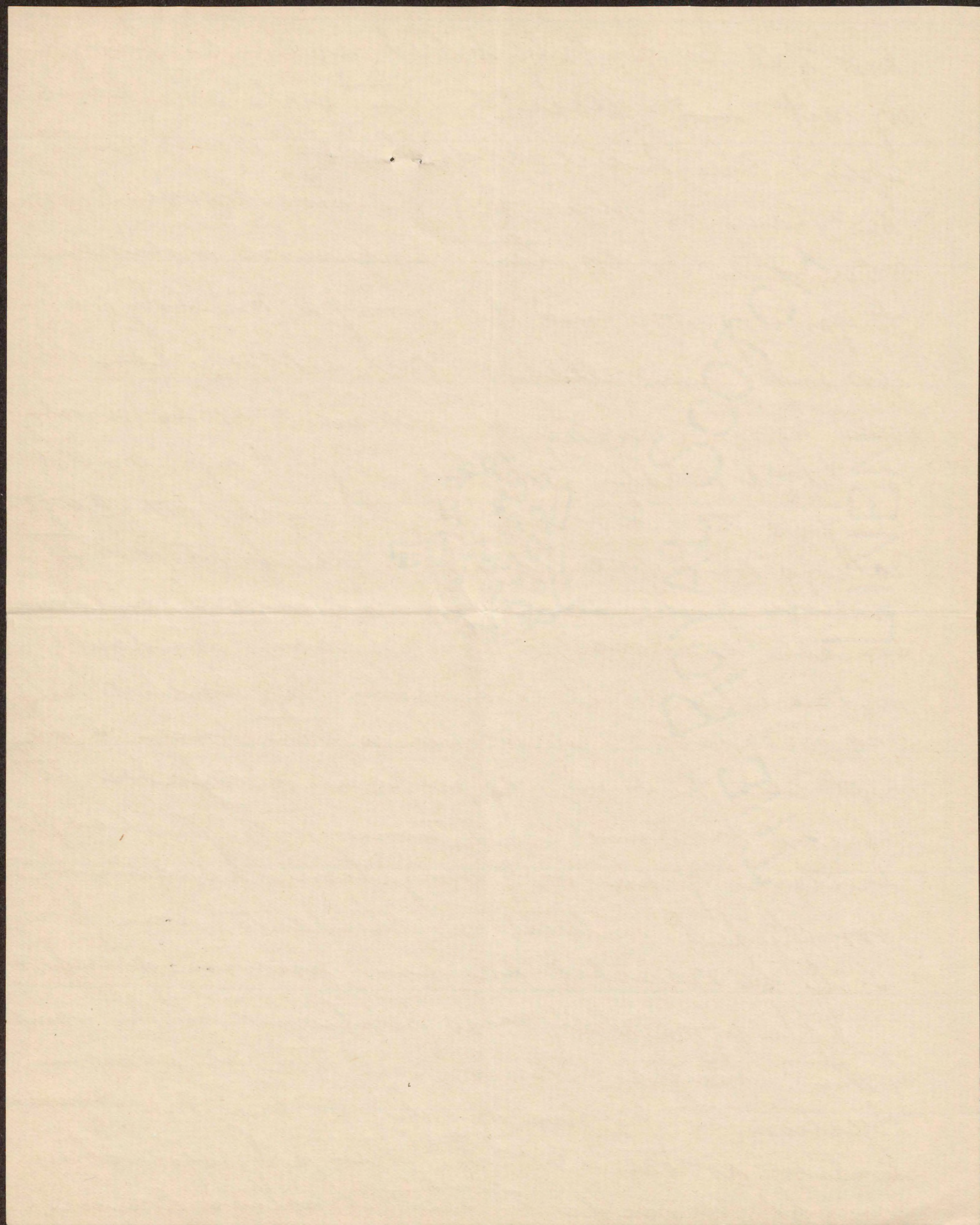
In a letter received from Miss Burgess an
art decorator. (with economical ideas) I find
a list of articles for the room in Cabt and
an estimate of total cost. This list includes
tinting the ceiling and upper walls - which is
now very dingy; staining and varnishing
the floor - at present in a distressingly
spotted condition; burlap to hide the
blackboards; three rugs, ^{one} 8 x 14) & two 13 x 9 ft
of the Oleson make; three benches 2 x 6 ft
- we'll prob patronize the Ministry car-
penter; cushions and pillows; two plain
rockers; one plain mirror and two
Japanese screens. This work could be done
and these articles procured for a little over
one hundred dollars (\$100.).

The location of the room renders it the
most convenient one for the inside women



and will, if properly fitted up be a haven
of rest and place to the girls who have to
spend the entire day at the University
and have no place but the two dressing rooms
where there is constant confusion incident
to putting on and off wraps, muddy rub-
bers and umbrellas. Such a room can be
used without further investment or expense
until a large building is put up on the
campus to be used exclusively for assoc-
iations and societies. I believe it is the
policy of the University to make it as com-
fortable as possible for Chicago students,
and I believe the University has such a build-
ing in view. If such is the case I do
not see how an appropriation made to
benefit existing conditions, with the coop-
eration of an organization which stands
for student interest in students, can pos-
sibly be regarded as an unwise precedent.

The room itself was petitioned in the name
of the Christian Union. If there be some
objection to giving money to any one organ-
ization as the Y.M.C.A. the appropriation
might be made to the Christian Union,



to be expended by a Committee appointed from
the Y.M.C.A. If it is impossible to give
the sum, in whole or in part, at present,
I am sure Miss Burgess would be willing
to wait for her remuneration, if an
order is made on her by your committee.
Her time and effort is to be donated, ^{and}
she says she will be glad to take the room
in charge even if the whole amount
cannot be raised. However, if the room
is to be made artistic and comfortable
\$100, at least will be needed. Part of
this might be raised by subscription, but
we cannot ask Mrs Stone for help, as was
suggested because the City Association
is truly deeply in debt. Our cabinet
which leaves office in April is very eager
to leave this room as a monument of
its interest in the material comfort of the
Student, hoping too to arouse a reciprocal
interest in the spiritual work which we have
undertaken.

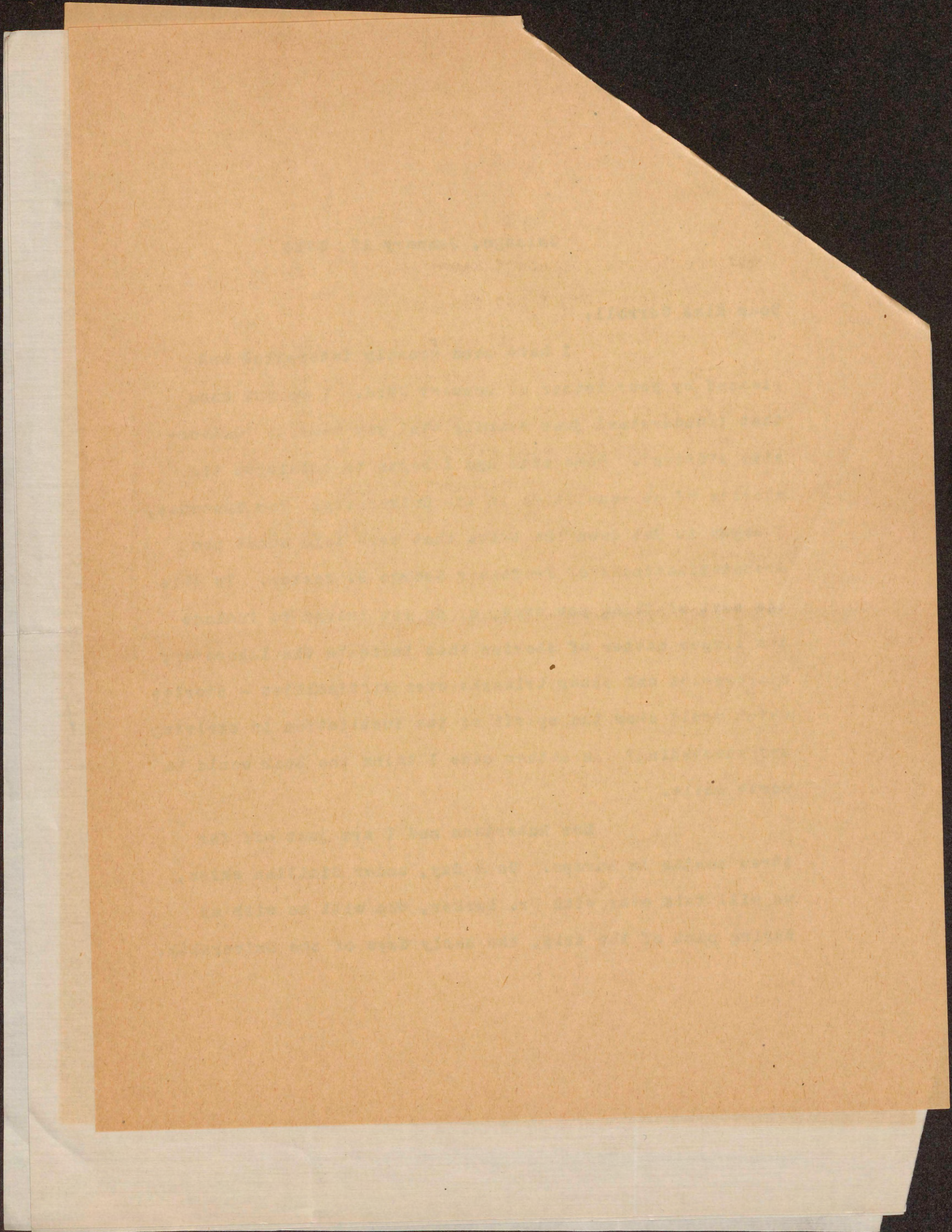

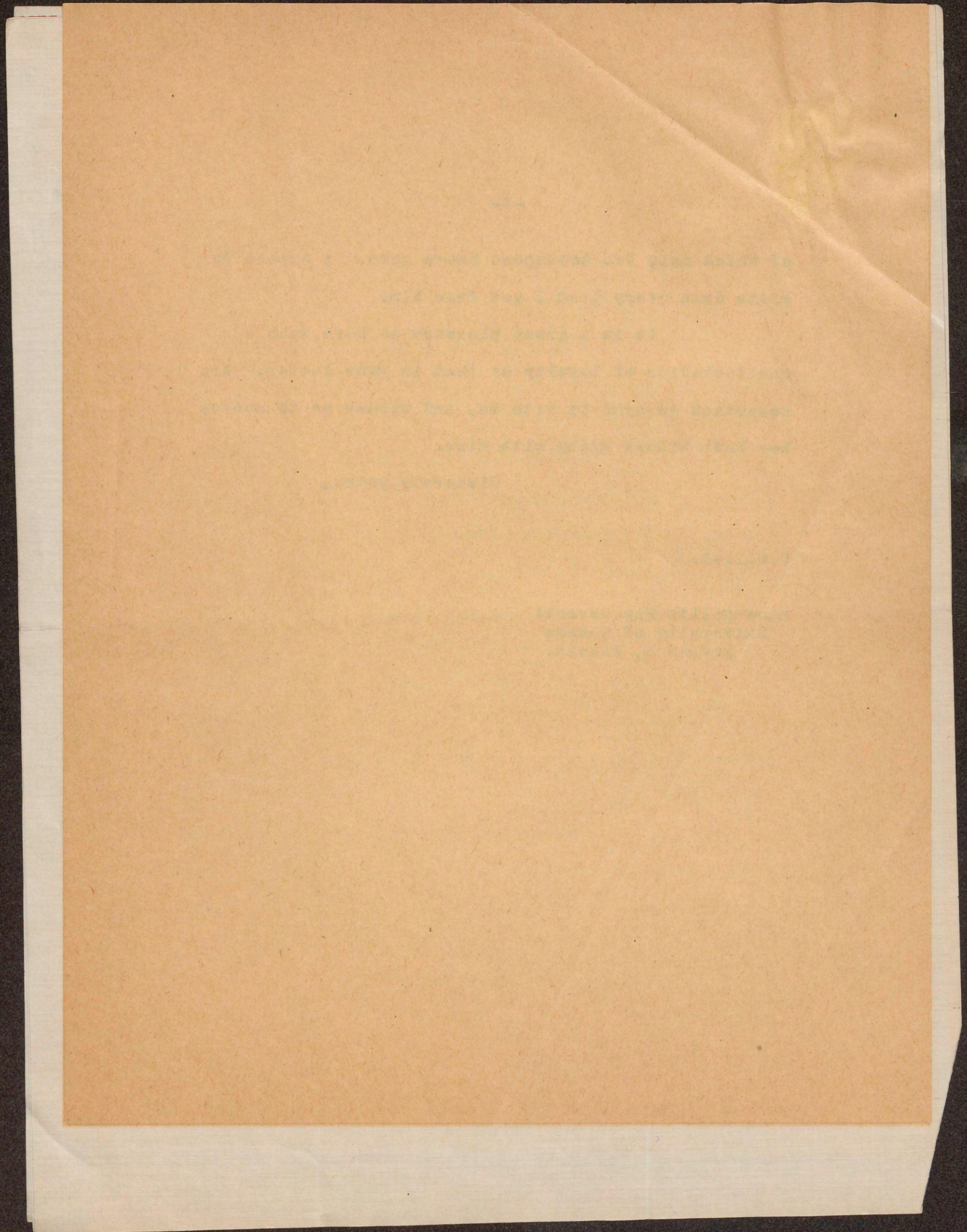

In 1913 the Commission on Social Morality undertook the experiment of offering courses of lectures in series of not less than three in normal schools, in universities and in women's colleges of whose graduates a large proportion go into the teaching profession. The Commission has four lecturers—women physicians—at work in different sections of the country. The course given by Dr. Ulrich consists of six lectures in which she covers both the moral and *social phases of her subject*.

Lecture Course

- I. The Social and Biological Evolution of Sex.
Its significance to the race and to the individual.
- II. The Period of Preadolescence.
Normal sex manifestations in childhood.
Ethics of the school room.
- III. Physical and Mental Changes of Adolescence.
- IV. Adolescent Ethics.
Hygiene of the Imagination.
- V. The Unnecessary Evil.
Social phases of prostitution and venereal disease.
- VI. Choice of two lectures
Eugenics and Heredity
or
Love and Marriage and the Art of Living.

Conferences and Individual Consultations

Every opportunity is offered during the week of lectures for the students to meet Dr. Ulrich singly or in groups, to discuss with her personal problems, or to develop more fully such social questions as may have been suggested by the lectures.

Dr. Ulrich's Preparation and Experience

Dr. Ulrich is a graduate of Cornell University and Johns Hopkins Medical School. She is the wife of a physician, the mother of two young daughters, and has practiced medicine for ten years. She has had experience in social work and in 1911 served on the Minneapolis Vice Commission. She has given this course of lectures in many of the leading colleges and universities in all parts of the country. The students who have heard her have been enthusiastic in their praise and from deans, presidents and professors have come such testimonies as the following:

"I considered Dr. Ulrich's presentation far and away the best that I have ever heard on the subject. The lectures were perfectly direct, were sane and not sentimental or so scientific that the girls did not understand them, and were really constructive in their insistence upon building up of wholesome, womanly ideals along the line of sex problems."

From the standpoint of the girls:—"Practically every girl in the University, voluntarily, went to her six lectures. A number met her in private interviews. As many mothers as we could accommodate were admitted. She held the absolute attention of everybody every instant; the girls went away to talk over and think over what they had heard. I have heard but one girl out of the four hundred say anything except in thankful appreciation."

My dear Miss Talbott:

Next week I start on my round of visitations and I do want to get your ear for a moment before leaving because I believe that a faculty member and the Association Secretary can reinforce each other at many points and I covet a closer cooperation than ever with you.

If you should make a casual inquiry of your cabinet as to how they are planning to meet this "Character Standard" program, it perhaps would hasten on the efforts begun by the Annual Members.

We have added Dr. Holmes of Omaha to our list of women physicians whom we recommend to present Social Morality talks to women students. Like Dr. Ulrich she gives five addresses and has met with such splendid commendation from the colleges she has visited, that I hope many more of our colleges may desire her services sometime during the year. Dr. Ulrich's expenses are the same, railroad fare and entertainment plus eighty dollars for the lectures. The National Association is able to pay the entire salary of Dr. Holmes, releasing the colleges from all expense except for the entertainment and railroad fare. If you wish our cooperation in securing a person whom we can thoroughly recommend for these health and social talks, will you not let me hear within a fortnight what time of year best fits your calendar? We shall begin to draw up the schedules of both doctors early in November.

This mission is confidential, but I may tell you that it is in response to a cabled request from a group of public-spirited women in Petrograd who are oppressed with the number of refugee women in their city and who perceive that much could be done and yet feel unable to make a beginning by themselves. Mr. Harte, who is working for the International Committee of the Young Men's Christian Association, has made a place for himself in Russia so that these ladies turned to him. He advised them to cable for assistance to our National Board. Within ten days after the request came two of our very able secretaries were on the way to Vancouver.

Miss Clarissa Spencer has travelled for the World's Committee of the Young Women's Christian Associations and speaks many languages. She is more European almost than American. Miss Boies is a typical young American woman who is an organizer, an experienced business person, has a good sense of humor, and keen sense and judgment. It was she who helped organize the social and protective work for all the women who performed in the amusement zone during the California Exposition. Last summer she was

sent to the border with the troops and organized protective Associations amongst the women and girls in those districts where the troops were quartered and by so doing rendered a service which men high up in army positions at Washington have commended as by far the best thing done for America during the Mexican upheaval.

We are preparing to send other women, trained social workers and teachers, to Russia after these two have found out what are the best ways in which American women can join forces with Russian.

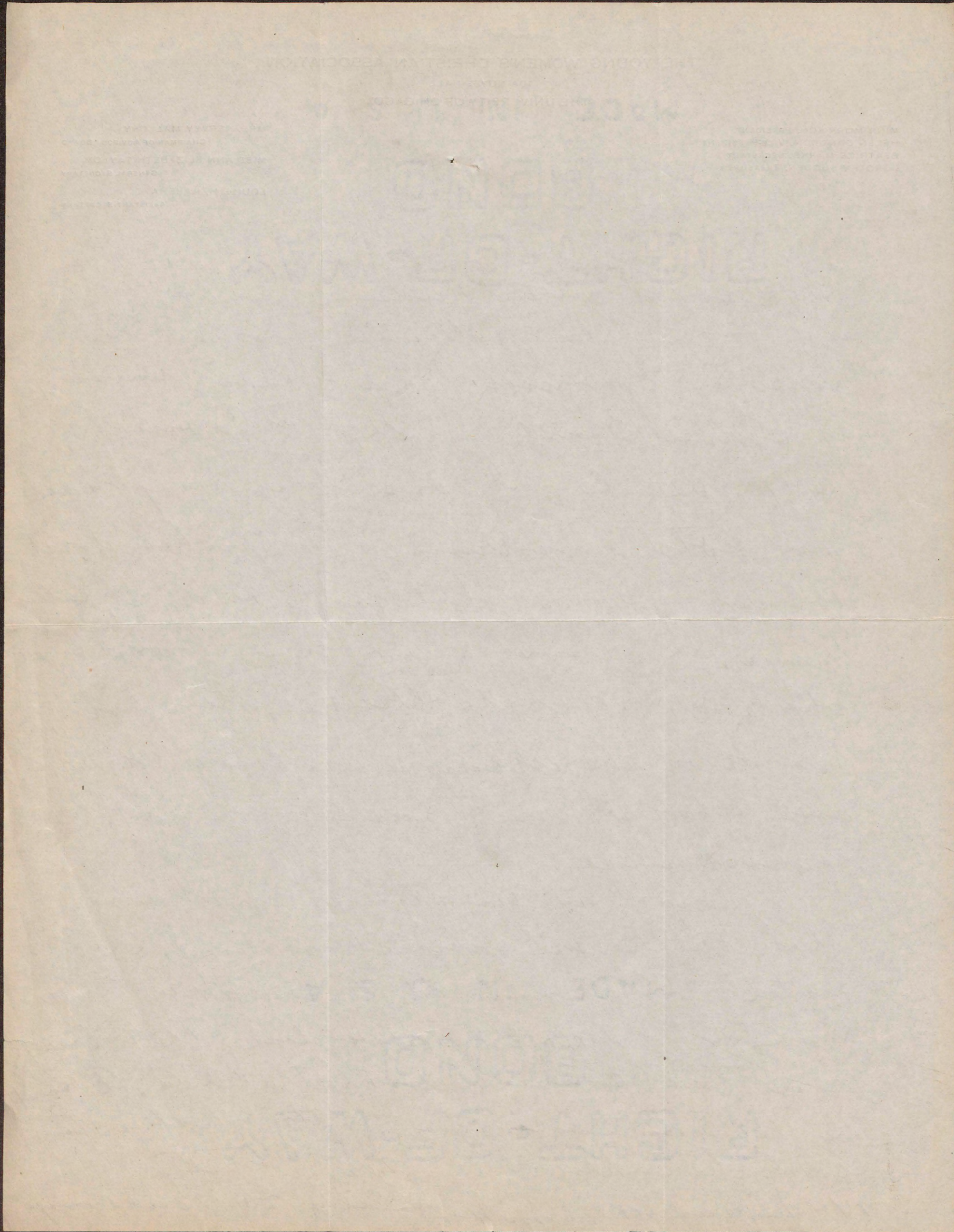
My dear President Judson:

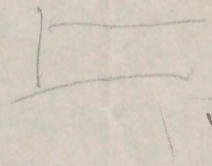

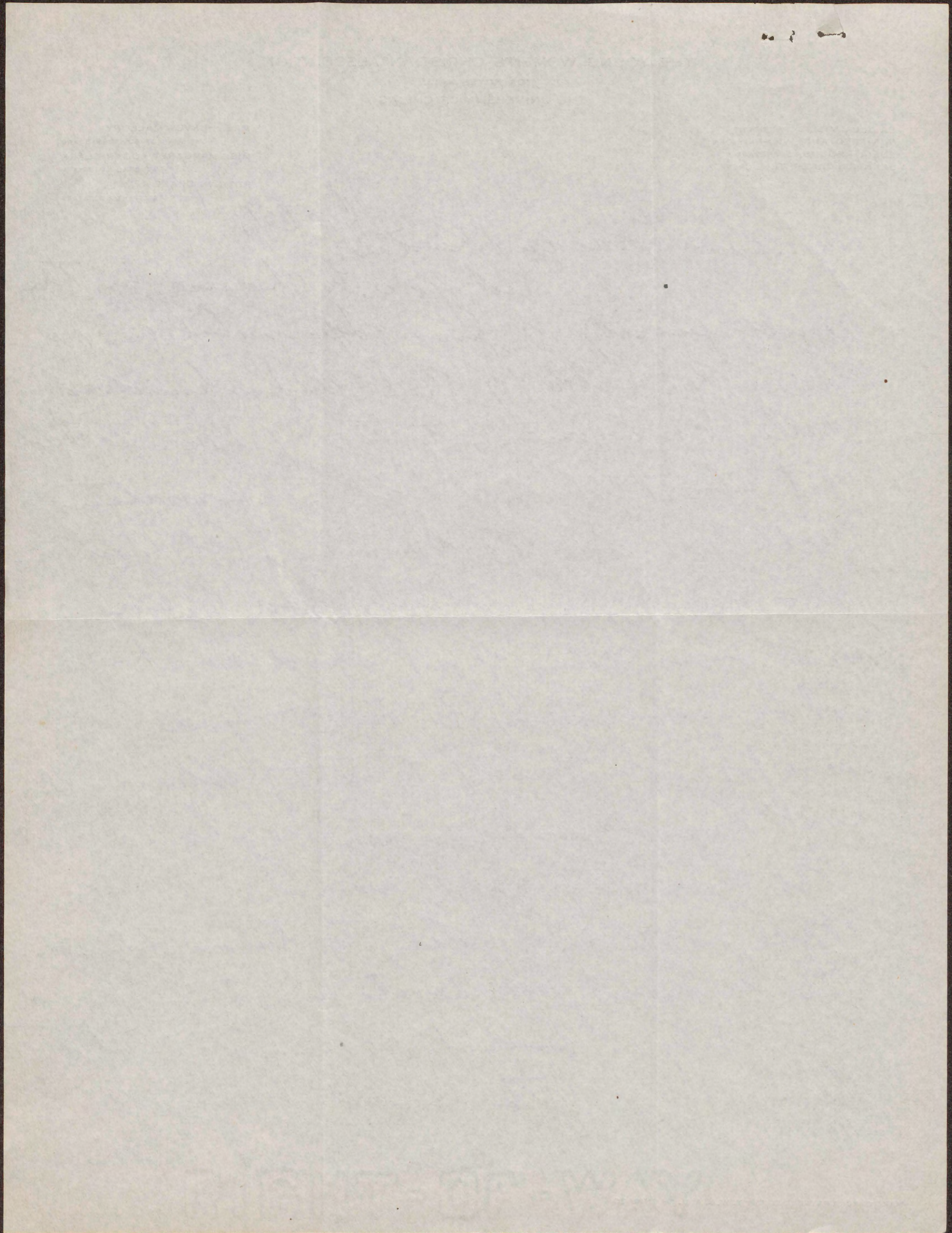
