My dear Mr. Woodward:

At the meeting of the Committee on Press and Extension yesterday it was proposed that a memorial volume of the Journal of Geology be issued in commemoration of Professor Chamberlin's long service, and also that an index be prepared and printed to cover the first thirty-five volumes of this journal. It is estimated that the net amount required will not be in excess of \$1,750. Mr. Steere agreed with me that it would be desirable to ask you to secure this designation from the Rosenwald Fund, and the Committee approved the projects provided funds could be found. I understand from our telephonic conversation today that you are willing to request an appropriation of not to exceed \$1,750. from the Rosenwald Fund for the purposes mentioned, and on the basis of this assurance I am notifying Mr. Bean that he may proceed. Will you please bring the matter to the attention of the Board at its next meeting?

I enclose a letter from Dr. G. E. Moore, with the object of eliciting and enacting a suitable definition of "solid" and "firm" and of the corresponding terms "Lamellar" and "Spherulitic" which may be used in the description of mineralogical features of rocks. He suggests that the term "solid" be used to denote a rock which has been completely converted into a mineralogical feature, while "firm" may be used to denote a rock which has not yet been converted into a mineralogical feature. I hope you will find this suggestion satisfactory.
