



I believe that the surgical Department should pay his rail road fare to Boston and am writing to make that request.

If the men in the clinical departments of the Medical School are to advance in the profession, they will have to join the national societies, attend meetings, and present papers. Since the expenses connected with membership in these societies are reckoned for physicians working on a professional rather than an academic basis, and since the pecuniary rewards ^{resulting} from participation in them go to the University instead of to the man, I feel that it is proper that the University share some of the expense.
