THE ANNUAL MEETING AND REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S UNION

The annual meeting of the Woman's Union was held in the room of the Union, Lexington Hall, on January 18, 1905. The following were elected officers for the year 1905:

Ex officio — President of Woman's Athletic Association, Miss Elizabeth McFarland; General Secretary of the Young Women's Christian League, Miss Ada B. Hillman.

The secretary of the Union, Miss Clara H. Taylor, submitted the following report for the year 1904:

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

During the past year the Council of the Woman's Union has held ten meetings, two of which were general meetings, open to all members of the organization. The last annual meeting was held January 20, 1904, at which the following officers were elected:

President — Miss Marion Talbot.

Vice-Presidents — First, Miss Anne E. Allen; Second, Miss Lena D. Harris; Third, Miss Verna Moyer.

Secretary — Miss Ethel Jaynes.

Treasurer — Miss Anne H. Martin.

Chairmen of committees — House, Miss Gertrude Dudley; Hospitality, Miss Halle D. Woods; Membership, Miss Sophonisba P. Breckinridge; Entertainment, Miss Alice S. Thompson; Music, Miss Louise Larrabee; Philanthropy, Miss Henrietta K. Becker; Lunch-room, Miss Lulu Just.

At this meeting it was decided that the president of the Woman's Athletic Association and the general secretary of the Young Woman's Christian League be made *ex-officio* members of the Council of the Union. These were, respectively, Miss Marie Ortmyer and Miss Ada B. Hillman. The constitution was amended also by making provision for three vice-presidents instead of one.

The following changes in officers have occurred during the year:

Miss Harris, second vice-president, resigned, and on June 8, 1904, Miss Gladys E. Gaylord was elected to fill the vacancy.

Miss Ethel Jaynes, the secretary, presented her resignation, and on June 8, 1904, Miss Anne Martin was elected temporary secretary for the Summer Quarter. Miss Clara H. Taylor was elected October 4, 1904. Miss Halle D. Woods resigned as chairman of the Committee on Hospitality, and on November 11, 1904, Mrs. H. A. Bigelow was elected to fill the office.

During the year the management of the lunch-room has passed from the hands of the Woman's

Union into the care of the University Commons. With this change the Lunch-Room Committee was found to be no longer necessary.

The magazines for the reading table have arrived with great regularity and have covered every inch of the table. To make room for the new magazines and to provide for the disposal of the old ones, Miss Genevieve Sullivan was, on November 11, 1904, elected chairman of the Committee of Books.

During the past year the members have always found the room of the Union a pleasant place for resting, reading, or studying, and have never been disappointed by the failure of the tea-urn to appear at the appointed hour. Wednesday afternoons have brought many opportunities for social enjoyment, which is bringing the members of the Union into closer friendship.

But, as will be seen from the reports of the chairmen of the various committees, the Union has worked not only along social lines; it has engaged in religious and philanthropic activities as well. In a religious way, the Union has co-operated as far as possible with the Young Woman's Christian League, whose general secretary is an *ex-officio* member of the council of the Union. At the quadrangle fête, May 28, 1904, the Union conducted a booth under the management of Miss Epstein, Miss Lyon, and Miss Jaynes.

The Union had expressed a desire to co-operate with the Christian Union and is now included in the Christian Union, its president and secretary being *ex-officio* members of the board of the latter organization.

REPORT OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE

The report of the House Committee was presented by the chairman, Miss Gertrude Dudley:

At the time the Union was organized the constitution defined the House Committee as a committee consisting of the chairman of the various subcommittees, and the chairman of the House Committee was supposed to have general oversight of all the work. As the work has developed, the subchairmen have taken more and more interest in making out a satisfactory policy for their various committees. Their reports give the detail work. To these subchairmen, and the untiring energy of the president and chairmen of the Membership Committee, is due the success of this organization. Only the general work will be mentioned in this report.

By order of the Council last January the treasurer paid to the chairman of the House Committee one hundred dollars to be used for the room. Thirty-five dollars were immediately spent for annual subscriptions to magazines.

During the year the balance has purchased the cabinet, waste-basket, small chair, bath linen, and the book-racks, a small balance being returned to the treasurer.

Aside from the daily use of the room by the students, we have been able to extend hospitality to various clubs and organizations. The Settlement League held one of its regular meetings here. The University Dames have their bi-monthly gathering in this room. Last winter the room was in weekly use Friday and Saturday evenings by small clubs and social organizations. Perhaps the most unique use of the room is the Sunday morning crèche. Thanks to the energy of the chairman of the Membership Committee and to the hearty co-operation of Miss Allen, the crèche did a thriving business during the Sunday mornings of October and early November.

An important work for the Union in its early days was to provide a suitable and attractive place for students to take luncheon. For a time it was a problem to serve luncheon to the satisfaction of the students, at the same time having due consideration for the Finance Committee; but the Union was developing a plan which was satisfactory to both. In November the University decided to have all the food problems under one management, and the Union Council accepted \$11.75 from the University Commons for our equipment. This responsibility being removed, we can now stand ready for the new field of activity offered for 1905.

THE ENTERTAINMENT COMMITTEE

The Entertainment Committee reported through the chairman, Miss Alice Seton Thompson, as follows:

THE MUSIC COMMITTEE

The report of the Music Committee was made by the chairman, Miss L. G. Larrabee:

The Music Committee of the Woman's Union arranged for several "sings," but as the attendance was not large, it was deemed advisable to discontinue them. During the Winter Quarter

the committee procured the services of different girls to give several piano numbers at the weekly evening lecture at the O'Toole School. On one Wednesday in the Winter Quarter the Faculty ladies gave us a very enjoyable and interesting musical afternoon. The committee also provided music for singing and dancing at the different banquets and entertainments given by the Union. In the Spring Quarter the committee had about twenty copies of five or six college songs printed, and these have been used on several occasions. Also fifteen copies of the new Chicago songbook were purchased for the Union room.

THE COMMITTEE ON HOSPITALITY

The report of the Committee on Hospitality was presented by the chairman, Mrs. H. A. Bigelow.

The work of the Hospitality Committee in the past Quarter has been much the same as that of last year. The endeavor has been made to have, on Wednesday afternoons, the wife of a member of the Faculty preside at the tea-table, with two members to assist her. This has seemed to bring to students and to Faculty members alike that personal association which was lacking in the past and which was felt to be one of the "needs."

The plan of appointing a hostess for every afternoon has been much discussed, and two members have been ready to pour tea every Tuesday and Thursday. It has been somewhat difficult to arrange for Mondays and Fridays, the one seeming to be a day when members are too busy to drop in for a cup of tea; the other, a time when we all seem to wish to be free from every care, even so pleasant a one as drinking or pouring tea.

THE PHILANTHROPIC COMMITTEE

The work of the Philanthropic Committee was reported by Miss Henrietta K. Becker, as follows:

1. *Settlement work.*—The Settlement Association—a joint committee of those interested in settlement work from the Women's Union, the Christian League, the Young Men's Christian Association, and the men's and women's halls—was formed January 26, 1904; chairman, Louisa Warren; secretary, Lucy Watkins. Under the auspices of this association, workers were furnished for Settlement visiting, and instructors for library work, and for census-taking to assist in carrying out the compulsory school law.

2. *Committee for visiting the sick.*—Chairman, Miss Anne Martin. It is most desirable that all University women assist in this work by sending to the chairman the address of anyone ill or in distress. Through the efforts of this committee sympathy and aid are extended to all women who are in need of them, as far as they can be reached.

3. *Art committee.*—Its object is the stimulation of the æsthetic interests in the Union. About twenty-five members were enrolled, and visits to galleries and studios, and addresses by artists and art critics, were arranged. Mrs. Bigelow was made a delegate to the Municipal Art League of Chicago in place of Miss Becker, who resigned.

4. *Committee on Consumers' League.*—An exhibit of Consumers' League products was given in the Union room on October 26 to disseminate knowledge and stimulate interest concerning the aims of this organization for the protection of working women.

To the Instructors, Students, and Friends of the University of Chicago:

Your attention is called to the accompanying action of the Board of the Christian Union taken April 23, 1904, in the reorganization of the Christian Union. This action has been reviewed by the University Council and the University Senate and has been formally approved by the Board of Trustees.

Amendment of University Regulations, Art. III, sec. 8, paragraph 1:

1. The Christian Union is a semi-official organization of members of the University, whether instructors or students, and of other persons associated with the life and work of the University, on the basis of those elements of religious faith and purpose which are held in common.

2. Such persons become members by signing the membership roll of the Christian Union.

3. The officers of the Christian Union are a President, chosen from the Faculty; a Vice-President, from the student body; and a Secretary-Treasurer; these officers are to be chosen by the Board of the Christian Union.

4. The members of the Faculty belonging to the Union, and the members of each division of the University belonging to the Christian Union, and the members of the Union defined in sec. 8, paragraph 1, namely, "other persons associated with the life and work of the University," to be known as "friends of the University," constitute chapters each of which elects a committee of five persons for the supervision of the work in their respective chapters. These committees are authorized to fill temporary vacancies during the year for which they are appointed.

The chairman of these committees, together with eight persons nominated by the Board of Trustees, the President and Secretary of the Board of the University Settlement, the President and Secretary of each religious society of the University recognized by the Board of the Christian Union, and the Chaplain of the University, constitute the Board of the Christian Union.

5. The officers of the Christian Union are elected annually at the March meeting of the Board of the Christian Union, and take office in April.

6. A two-thirds vote in any regular meeting after a week's notice of a change proposed in the regulations may alter or amend the regulations of the Union. Fifteen members constitute a quorum.

The Chapter Committees provided for in paragraph 4 have been appointed by the President of the University to act until the Chapters have organized and are prepared to elect committees.

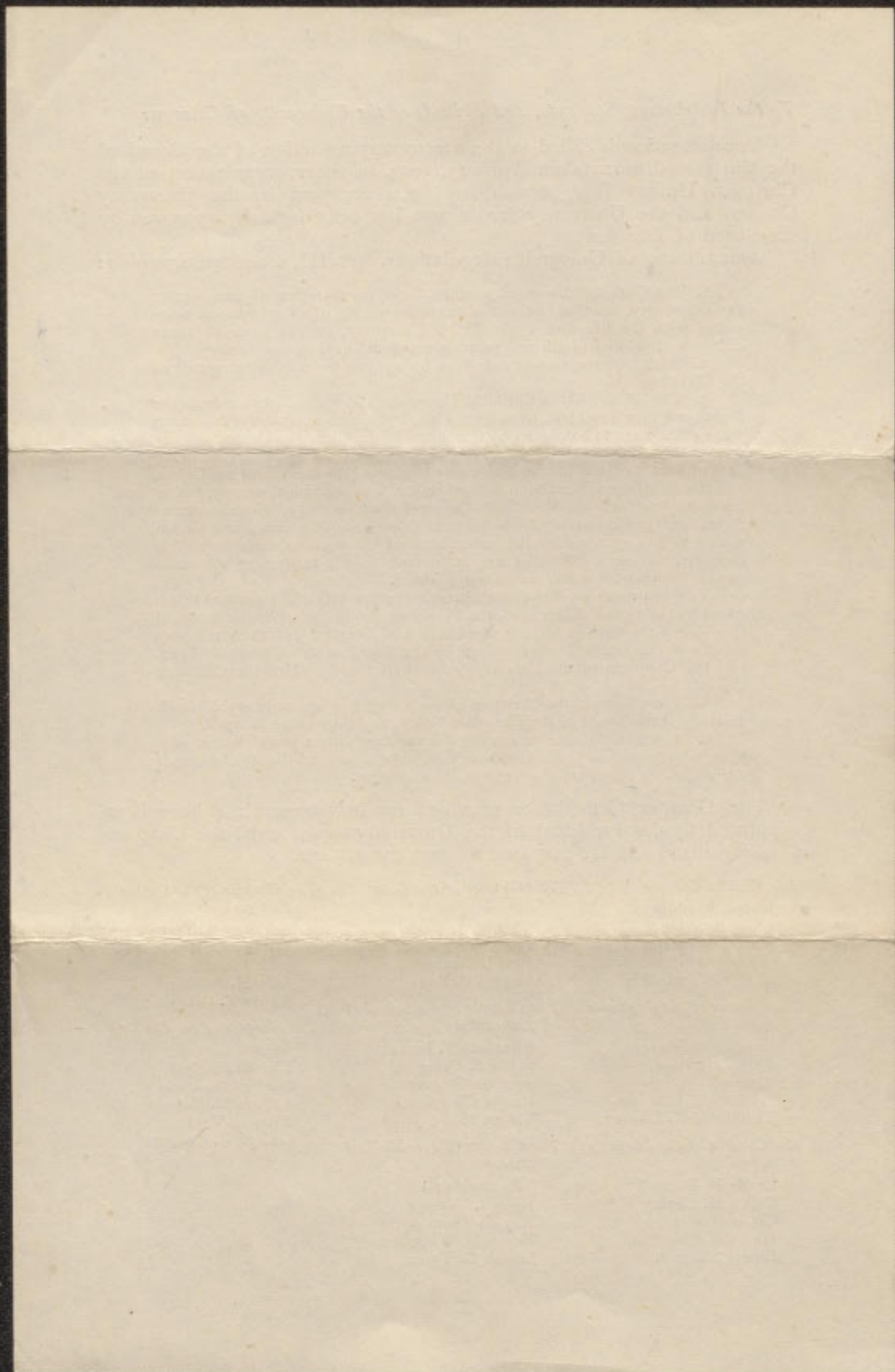

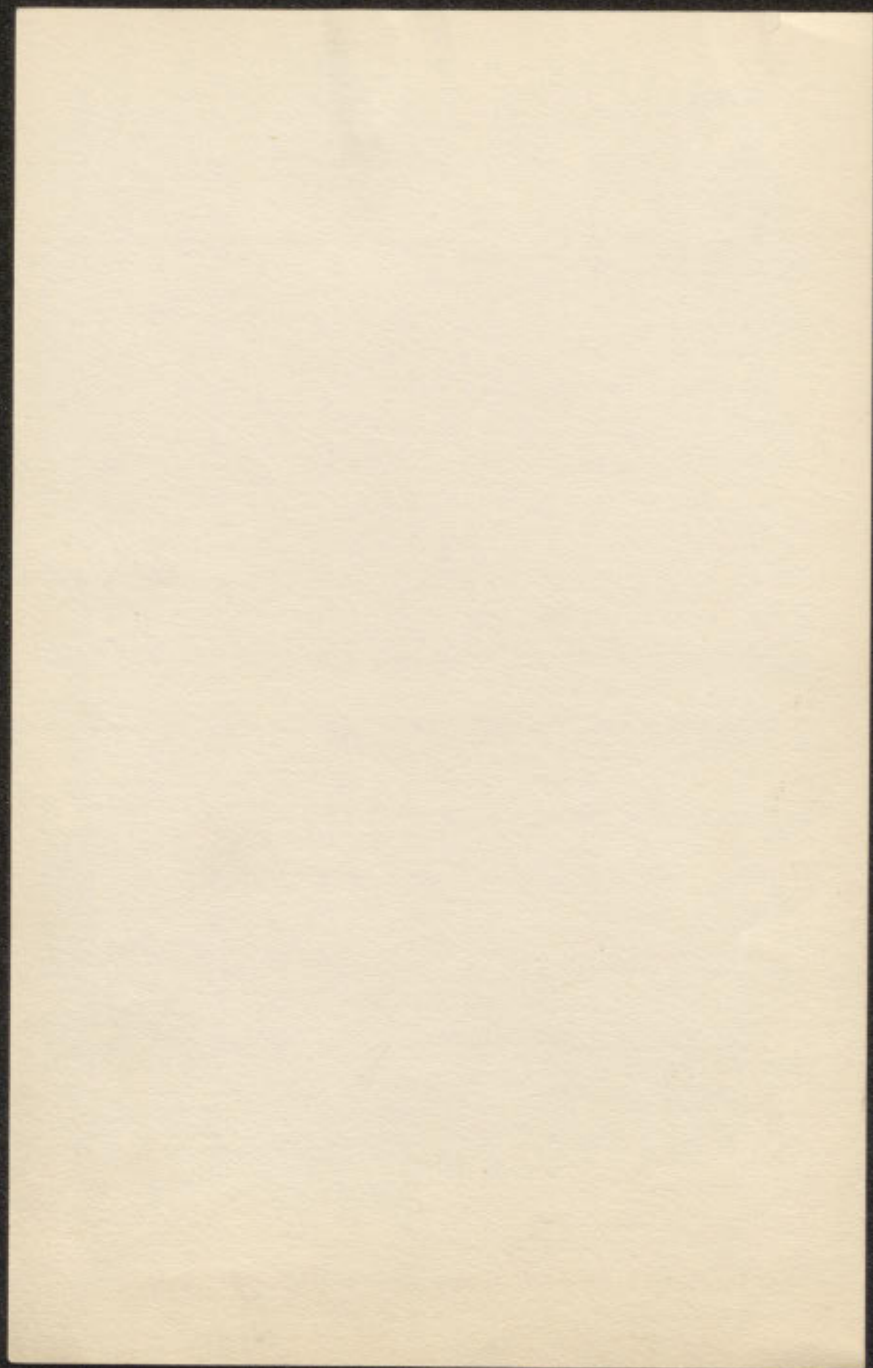

Constitution of the Woman's Union

Name The name of this organization shall be The Woman's Union of the University of Chicago.

Object The object of this organization shall be to unite the women of the University for the promotion of their common interests.

Membership The members shall be of two classes, regular and honorary.

The privileges of regular membership shall be open to the following classes:

1. Women students registered in any department of the University.
2. Women members of the faculty, women officers, and women in the employ of the University.
3. Women members of the families of trustees, faculty, and officers of the University.
4. Wives of registered students.
5. Alumnae of the University.

Honorary membership may be conferred by unanimous vote of the Union upon recommendation of the Membership Committee. Honorary members shall have all the privileges of regular membership, and shall be exempt from the payment of fees.

Officers The business of the Union shall be conducted by a Council, consisting of a president, a vice-president, a secretary, a treasurer, and a house committee of seven members. The Council shall be elected by the Union at its annual meeting, and shall fill any vacancies occurring in its membership. The president, treasurer, and chairman of the House Committee shall be considered the executive officers of the Union, with power to approve all bills, and

to direct the affairs of the Union in the interim of the meetings of the Council. The members of the House Committee, other than the chairman, shall serve as chairmen of committees on membership, finance, entertainment, philanthropy, hospitality, and lunch room. These committees shall be chosen by the Council on nomination by their respective chairmen.

1. The duties of the president shall be to preside at all meetings of the Union and of the Council.

2. In the absence of the president, the vice-president shall perform her duties.

3. The duties of the secretary shall be to keep the records of the meetings of the Union and of the Council, to send out notices, and to carry on such correspondence as shall be entrusted to her.

4. The duties of the treasurer shall be to receive and to disburse all moneys belonging to the Union, to collect the dues, to keep a record of the accounts, and to make a quarterly report to the Council and an annual report to the Union.

The membership fee shall be fifty cents a quarter, or one dollar a year.

The annual meeting of the Union shall be held during the third week of the winter quarter.

Special meetings of the Union may be called by the secretary at the request of the president, the chairman of the House Committee, or three members of the Union.

At any annual or special meeting of the Union twenty-five members shall constitute a quorum.

Amendments to this constitution may be adopted at any meeting of the Union, the proposed amendment having been included in the notice calling the meeting for its consideration.

Constitution of the Woman's Union As amended Oct-16-1907

Name The name of this organization shall be Woman's Union of the University of Chicago
Object The object of this organization shall be to unite the women of the University for the promotion of their common interests.

Membership The members shall be of two classes, regular and honorary.
 The privileges of regular membership shall be given to the following persons:

- 1) Women students represented in every department of the University
- 2) Women members of the faculty, women officers, and women in the employ of the University
- 3) Women members of the families of trustees, faculty, and officers of the University
- 4) Wives of represented students
- 5) Alumnae of the University

Honorary membership may be conferred by unanimous vote of the Union upon recommendation of the Membership Committee. Honorary members shall have all the privileges of regular membership and shall be exempt from the payment of fee.

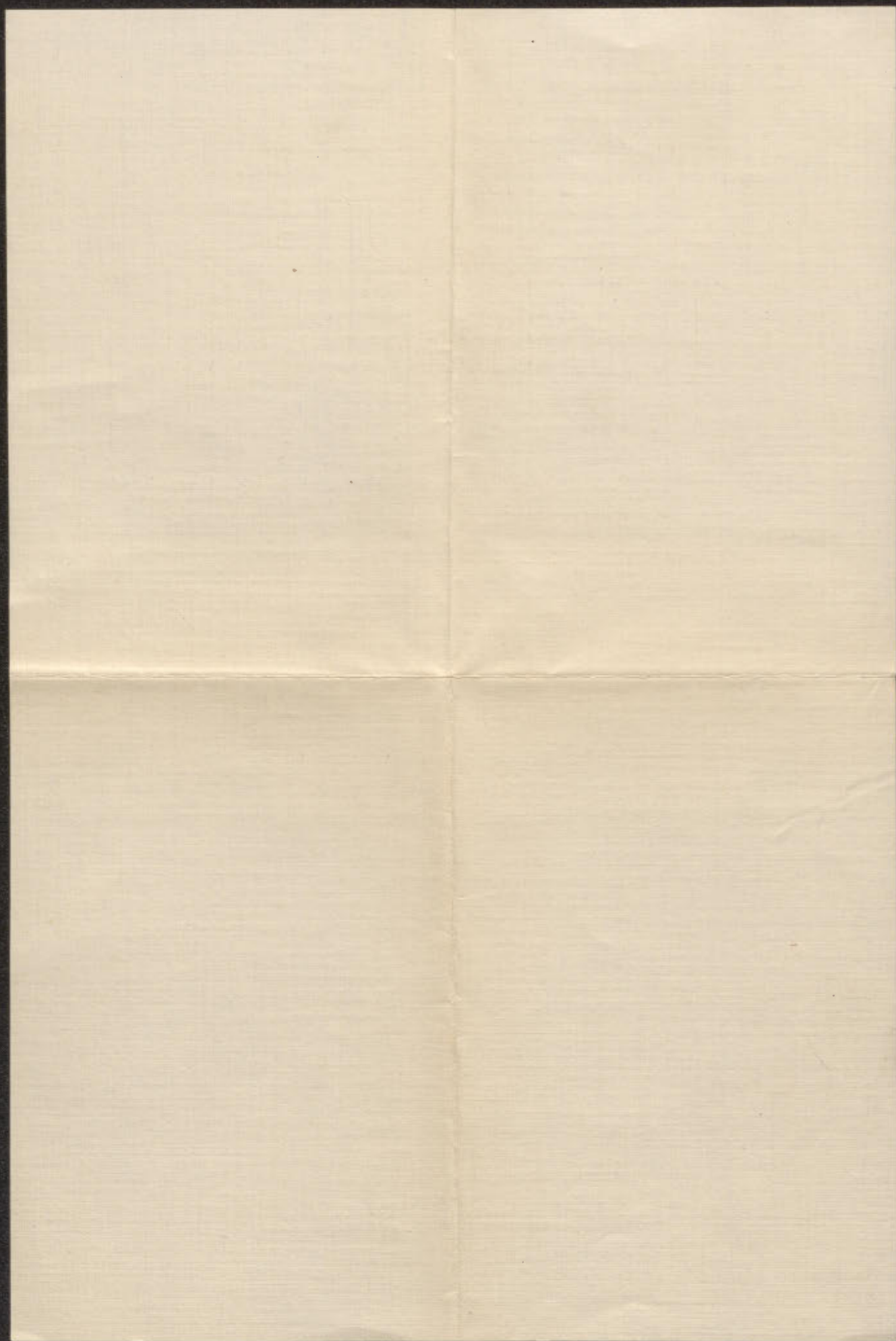

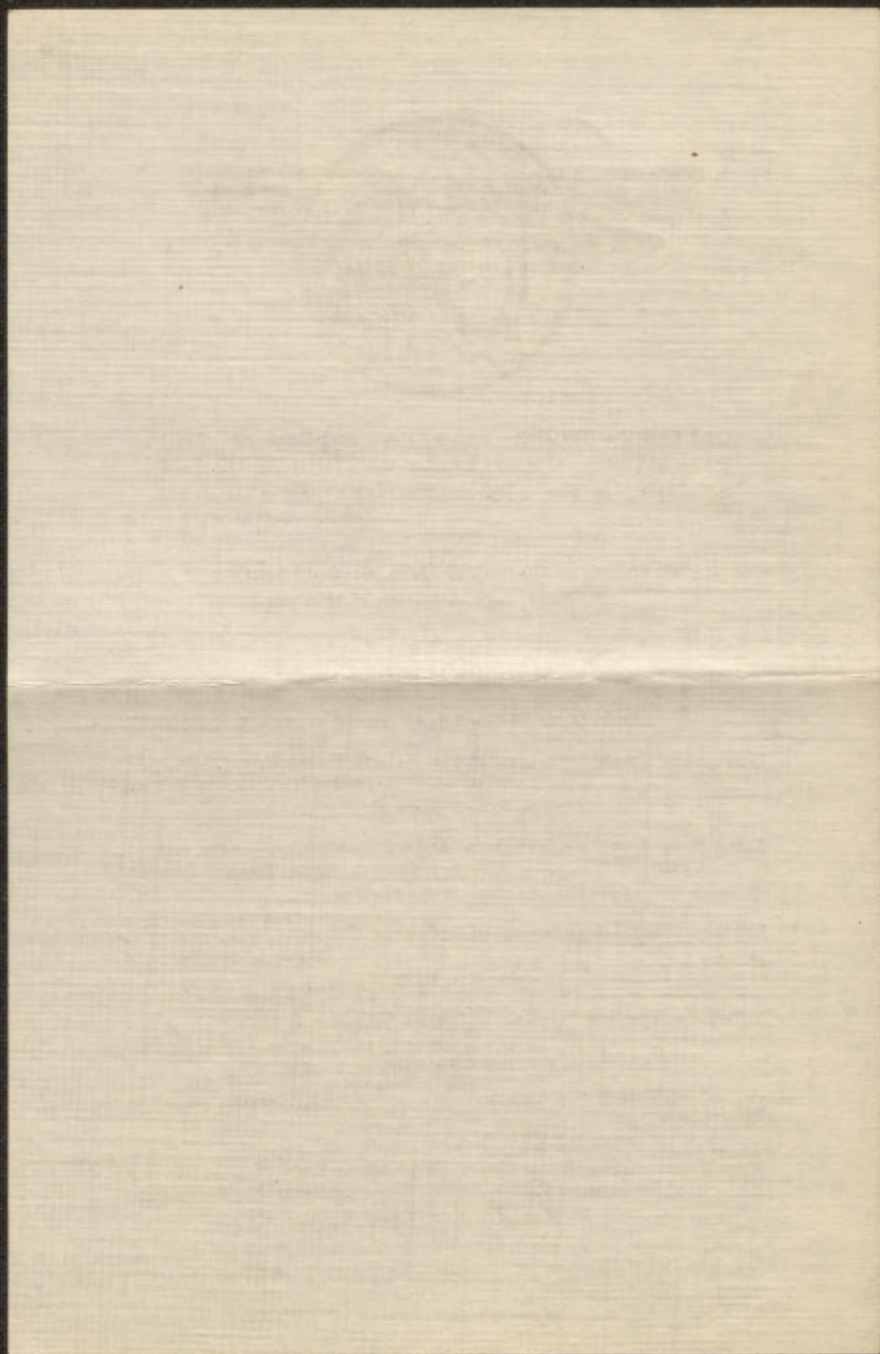

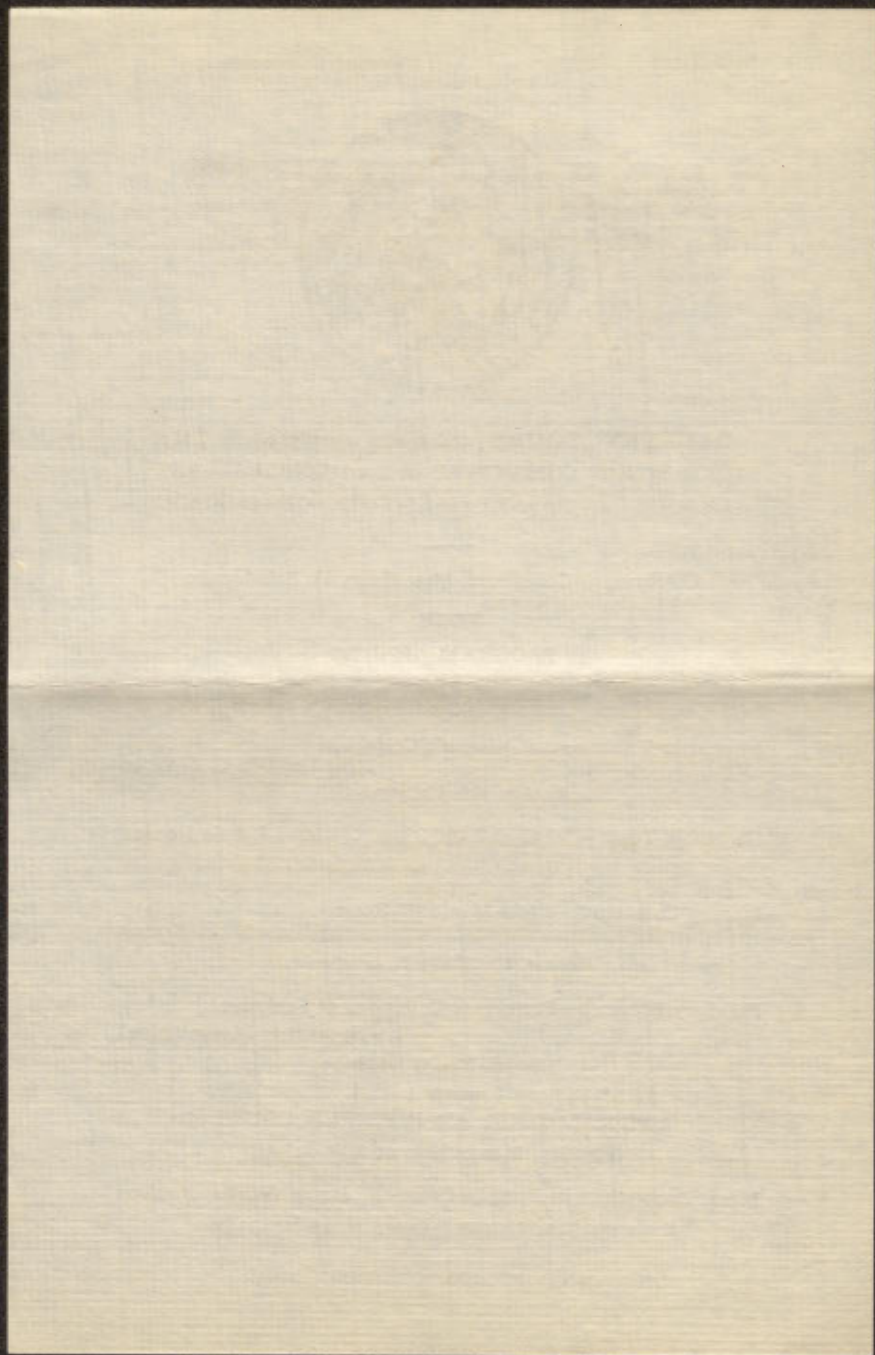
