

## THE CONSTITUTION OF ARTS COLLEGE (Women).

I. The Arts College (women) has been organized for the purpose of promoting friendship and social intercourse among women of the University who have a common interest in the classics.

III 1. The right to vote and hold office shall be limited to the active members of the College.

2. Any active member shall be eligible for the office of President, Secretary, or Counsellor, who has been one Quarter in residence and is eligible for public appearance.

IV. The officers of the College shall be a President, a Counsellor, and a Secretary.

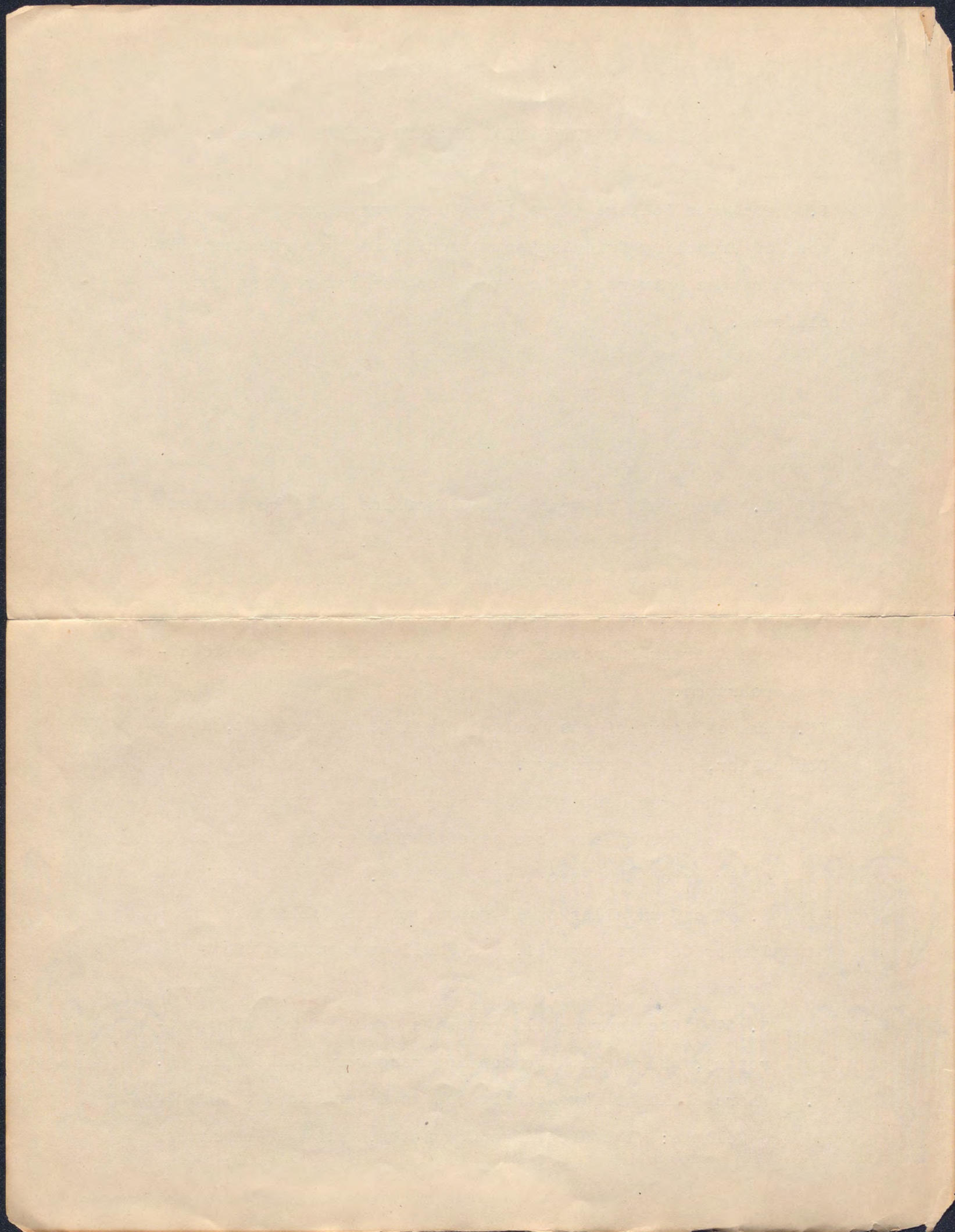
1. The President shall preside over the meetings of the College in the absence of the Dean, and shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee.

2. The Counsellor shall represent the College in the Junior College Council, and shall be a member of the Executive Committee.

3. The Secretary shall have the usual duties of a secretary, and shall also act as Treasurer of the College.

V. There shall be five committees to attend to the business of the College: the Executive Committee, and the Committees







on the Room, Program, Miscellaneous, and Temporary Matters.

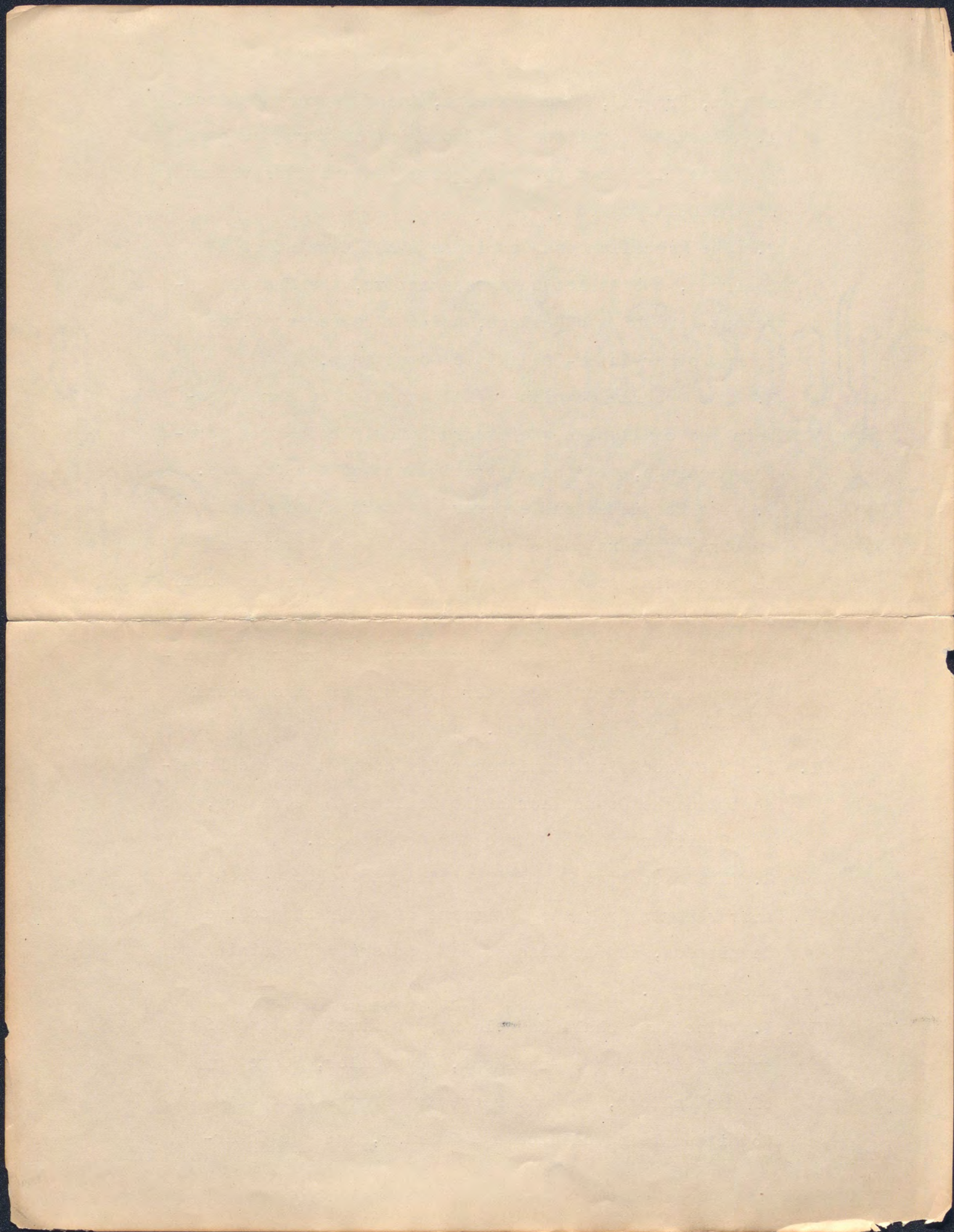
1. The Room Committee shall consist of three members and shall look out for the decoration and improvement of the College Room.
2. The Miscellaneous Committee shall consist of a Chairman, the Athletic Representative, the Chapel Representative of the College, and the representatives to any other Inter-Collegiate Committees.
3. The Program Committee shall consist of three members who shall plan the programs for the Tuesday morning meetings, and the entertainments of the College.
4. The Committee on Temporary Matters shall consist of three members and shall attend to any matters of temporary interest for which a special committee would otherwise have to be appointed. In the absence of other duties this Committee shall relieve the Program Committee of the care of the entertainment for the social gatherings of the College.

VI. 1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the President and the Counsellor of the College, a Secretary, and the Chairmen of the four other Committees.

2. The Executive Committee shall meet once a week to hear reports from the Chairmen of their respective Committees, and to discuss all matters appertaining to the College.

VII. 1. Elections shall be held at the first meeting of every Quarter, the President, Counsellor, Secretary of the College, and the secretary of the Executive Committee being elected one Quarter, and the Chair-







men of the four Committees, (Room, Program, Miscellaneous, and Temporary Matters) the next Quarter. This arrangement is to secure the presence of experienced persons on the Executive Committee.

2. Three nominations shall be made for every office and of the three the nominee receiving the highest number of votes shall be considered elected.

3. In case of the vacancy of an office through the resignation of any officer or chairman of a committee, or through any other cause, a new officer or chairman shall be elected to fill the vacancy, at a special election held at the first meeting of the College after the vacancy occurs.

4. The members of the Room, Temporary, and Program Committees shall be appointed by their respective chairmen. The members of the Miscellaneous Committee shall be elected by the college members of this Committee.

5. All officers, chairmen and members of committees shall hold office for two Quarters.

VIII. The regular dues of the College shall be 25¢ per Quarter, payable to the Treasurer.

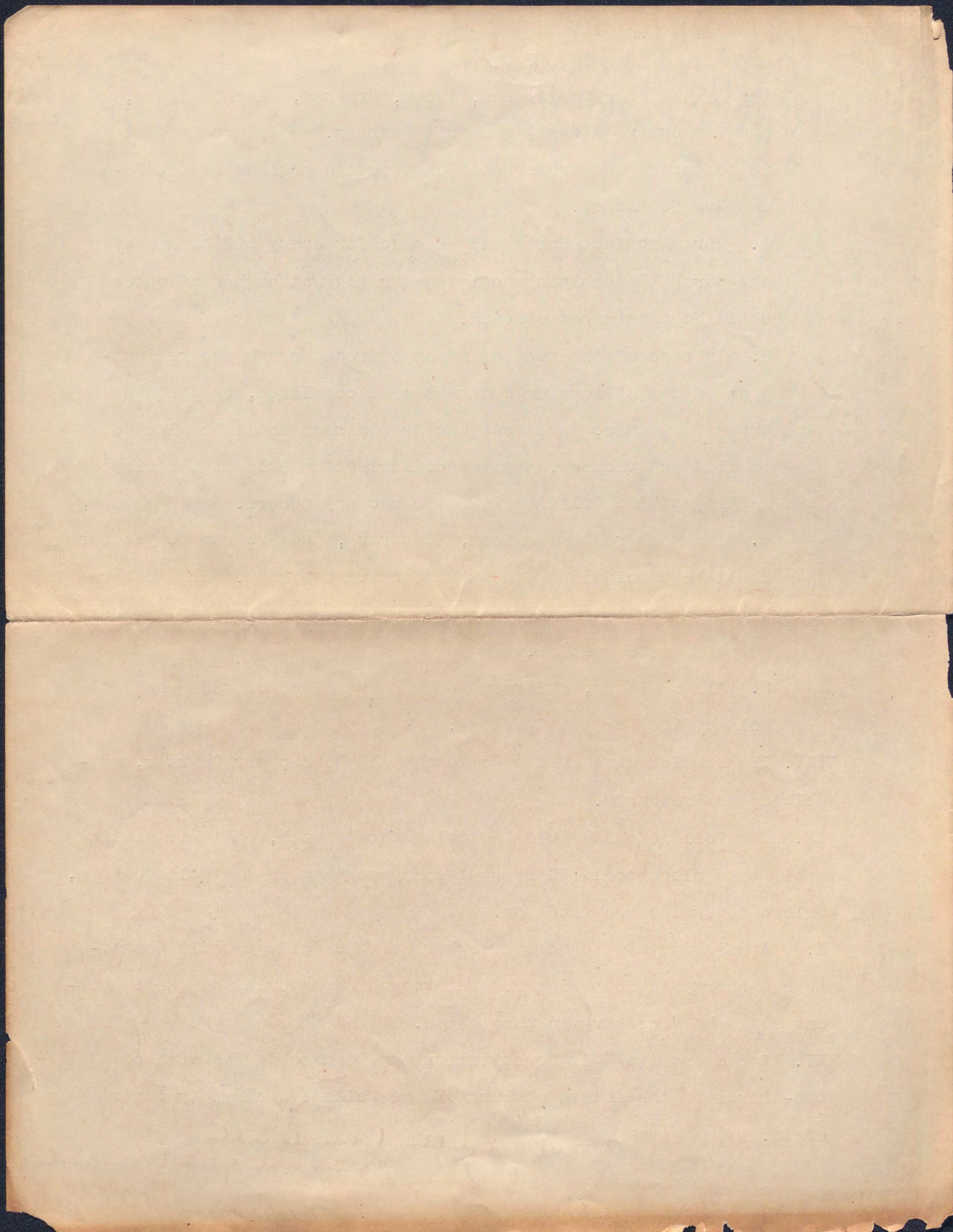
IX. The College shall hold a meeting once a week, and this meeting shall take place at 10:30 every Tuesday morning in the College Room, unless otherwise provided for.

X. A majority of the active members of the College shall constitute a quorum to do business. The vote of a majority of those present shall be necessary to pass a law.

XI. Amendments to this Constitution may be made if the vote of two-thirds of the active members of the College declare in favor of it.

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Whereas, heretofore, there has been more or less complication and uncertainty in the matter of electing councilors and chairmen of the various Junior Colleges, be it resolved that the Junior College Council recommend the adoption by the colleges of the following regulations, and the adherence to them in all future elections.

Chairman- The chairman shall be elected from the college as a whole; shall preside at all meetings of his college; shall preside at meetings of the executive committee; and shall have general charge of the executive committee; and shall have general charge of the executive affairs of his college. He shall serve for two quarters provided he is a resident member of his college and is eligible for public appearance.

Councilor - The councilor shall be elected from the college as a whole; shall represent his college on the Junior College Council; shall act as a member of the executive committee of his college. He shall serve for two quarters provided he is a resident member of his college and is eligible for public appearance.

Executive Committee - There shall be the desired number of men, chosen from the whole college, to serve as an executive committee. The chairman of the college shall act as chairman of this committee, and the councilor shall act as a member. All members of this committee shall serve for one quarter, except chairman and councilor.

Eligibility - Any member of the college shall be eligible for the executive committee. In case of ~~at~~ the chairman and the councilor, conformity to the rules for public appearance, and a two quarters' residence in the college shall constitute eligibility.

Substitutes - In case the chairman is ineligible, not in residence, or is graduated into the Senior College, the councilor shall fill out his unexpired term as chairman of the college. In case the councilor becomes ineligible, or is not in residence, or is graduated into ~~to~~ the Senior College the chairman shall fill out his unexpired term on the council. In case both chairman and councilor are unable to act, the college as a whole shall elect one member of the executive committee to fill out the unexpired terms of both chairman and councilor.

# Constitution.























Autumn Quarter  
1906

The first meeting of the College of Arts (Women) was held in Lexington Hall Wednesday October eleventh.

The meeting was presided over by Dean Breckenridge, who opened it by speaking briefly of the new experiment of separate small colleges acting as constituent parts of the Junior College, and of the first matter of importance to be considered in the meeting, - namely the election of an executive board.

In order to become acquainted in some slight measure, the roll was called, in response to which each member present was requested to rise.

It was then moved and seconded that nine nominations be made for members of the executive committee; an amendment was made to this motion, however to the effect that the first five receiving the highest number of votes should constitute the committee.

The amendment was accepted and with this change the motion



was carried.

The voting was done by ballot and two tellers were appointed to take charge of the votes cast, and report the result at the next meeting.

Dean Bruckinridge then submitted the following act and moved that it be copied and sent to Dr. Harper:-

"To the President:-

The Junior College of Arts (Women) has held its first meeting and has organized by electing its executive committee. For its first official act after organization it wishes to express to you its desire and intention to cooperate heartily in making a success of the experiment of separate small colleges as constituent parts of the Junior College of the University of Chicago"

This motion was seconded and passed, and the act was handed over to the secretary pro. tem to be copied and mailed to Dr. Harper.

The meeting was closed with an invitation from the Dean

to a tea at Green Hall the following Friday at four o'clock.

The second meeting of the Junior College of Arts (Women) was held in Lexington Hall room 2, Tuesday, October seventeenth at ten thirty A.M. The meeting was called to order by Dean Breckinridge and, as the first matter of business, the minutes of the previous meeting were read. A suggestion was made that the names of the two tellers be inserted in the record of the election of the executive committee and with this correction the minutes were accepted.

Miss Jessup was then called on to give the report of the tellers stating with full particulars the result of the election. It was moved and seconded that this report be accepted as read and embodied as a whole in the secretary's records. This motion was carried and the report was handed over to the secretary pro tem.

Miss Culver as secretary of the executive committee, gave a complete and satisfactory account of the first meeting of that body and the arrangements made for plans of organization to be presented and discussed by its

members at the next meeting of the committee.

Then followed the report of Miss Roberts, chairman of the committee who in that office represented the college at the meeting of the Junior College Council. Miss Roberts reported the election of the officers of the council.

Miss Culver was again called on to give the report of the second business meeting of the executive committee. In this she set forth the different plans of organization presented by the respective members of the committee, and moved that these plans as recommended by the committee be placed before the college for discussion in turn. The first article taken under consideration provided that the Dean act as the presiding head of the college with the title of president and that a vice president be elected to preside in her absence and at such times as she wished to enter into the discussion from the floor. Provision was also made that in case of the absence of



this officer the chairman of the executive committee act in her place.

An interesting discussion ensued which was interrupted by the necessity of adjournment owing to the end of the allotted time for the meeting.

The Junior College of Arts (Women) met in Lexington Hall, Tuesday morning, Oct. 24 at 10.30 in the room appropriated for its exclusive use. The meeting was called to order by Dean Breckinridge. The regular introductory matter of the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting first received attention. The minutes were approved and accepted as read and the discussion begun in the former meeting was taken up at the point at which it was interrupted. The pros and cons of the question of the powers of Dean were considered the discussion being open to all. Dean Breckinridge called Miss Heap to the chair and from the floor set forth her own ideas on the subject clearly and interestingly. She advised that the powers of the Dean be at once defined and limited if that seemed necessary. She defended the right of the Dean to the privilege of entering into any discussion with the other members of the college; and in answer to the objection that if



invested with the two fold powers of member and presiding officer, others would be led to blindly follow her instructions, she expressed the opinion that the members of the college would feel perfectly free to correct and criticize any statement on her part or any measure she might propose to defend. This opinion seemed to meet the approval of those present. It was suggested that a consular office be created to which the Dean should be elected. but this did not receive the support of the college. A motion was then made that the first article recommended by the executive committee be accepted.

An amendment was made to this motion to the effect that the presiding officer retain her title of Dean and the officer elected to act in her absence or at such times as she should desire assistance be termed President. This amendment was accepted and the motion thus corrected was carried. Again the limited time made adjournment necessary and a special meeting was called by the Dean for

Thursday morning at 10.30, in order to elect the first president of the college.

It was decided that while the college was discussing and arguing questions of constitutional interest, a temporary program committee be elected to arrange for some form of entertainment at our regular meetings.

Accordingly the motion was made and seconded that a temporary chairman be elected to choose two cooperative workers to assist her. This motion was carried and Miss Peabody, and Miss Carlock were nominated for the office. Voting was done by ballot, those who made the nominations acting as tellers by the appointment of Dean Breckinridge. The election decided in favor of Miss Peabody who was assigned to choose her helpers and plan a program for the next regular meeting.



## Special Meeting

On Thursday morning, October 26<sup>th</sup>, a special meeting was held by the college for the purpose of electing a president. Upon the opening of the meeting by Dean Breckinridge, the plan and method of election were laid before the college for discussion. It was moved and seconded that three nominations be made from the floor and the election then proceed by ballot. This motion was carried and the nominations made were as follows:

Miss Driscoll

Miss Strauchon

Miss Preston

A request was made before voting that the three nominees be called upon to rise that they might be seen. In accordance with this request, the three young ladies were asked to stand on review before the assembled college. They stood the test well and when Miss Sturgess and Miss Kellogg had been appointed tellers by nomination they resumed their seats and the voting took place.

While the tellers were counting the ballots Miss Peabody was

called on to speak of the work of her committee. She reported her choice of Miss Sturgess and Miss Guenacre as cooperative workers and the program arranged for the next meeting. This is to consist of talks by two members of the respective subjects, "The Duties of the Women to the College" and "The Duties of the College to the Women". She closed by urging each member to accept cheerfully the task assigned her by the committee, and to do to the best of her ability what was asked of her.

The tellers then rendered the following report:

Miss Driscoll 10

Miss Strauchon 5

Miss Preston 15

As no one received a majority it was moved by Miss Peabody who had supported one of the other nominations that Miss Preston's election be made unanimous by a standing vote. This motion was seconded by Miss Strauchon and carried by an unanimous vote of the college.

Then the meeting was adjourned.



The regular meeting of the College was held Tuesday morning Oct. 31, at ten thirty in its usual meeting place in Lexington Hall. In the absence of Dean Breckinridge the meeting was called to order promptly by the President, who called for the reports of the two meetings held in the past week. After these had been approved the President presented the question whether or not the next meeting should be devoted wholly to the consideration of the constitution recommended by the executive committee.

The motion was carried that the next meeting be made a business meeting.

Miss Roberts then laid before the College the request from the Junior College Council that each college submit through its representative a recommended plan of electing an executive committee at the beginning of the quarter. Miss Roberts further explained that in this connection at the last meeting of the council the question of freshman suffrage was a matter of consideration and the opinion



had been expressed that it might prove wiser to debar freshmen from holding office during the first quarter, allowing them the privilege of voting. After some discussion it was moved that the plan of election which was adopted by the college at the beginning of the quarter, be submitted to the council with the amendment that freshmen be debarred from holding office during their quarter. This motion was carried; but an amendment was then moved to the effect that two freshmen be included in the nominations. A rising vote was taken on this measure, the result being that eleven voted for it and 30 against. Therefore, the original plan of the college as first amended was voted to be sent to the Council.

The question having been thus settled, the President proceeded to the program.

Two interesting talks were given by Miss Preston and Miss Cahlock on the subjects of "The Duties of the Women to the



College" and "The Duties of the College to the Women". The speakers urged the promotion of friendship and good fellowship among the members of the college and the necessity of the individual realizing the responsibility resting upon her, and showing her loyalty to the college and her interest in its welfare by entering actively and enthusiastically into its work both in the regular meetings and the social gatherings. After the talks the meeting adjourned.



The regular meeting of the college was held Tuesday morning Nov. 7 at ten thirty. Dean Brackinridge called the meeting to order and, as the first notice of the morning, announced a social gathering of the college to be held in the parlor of Green Hall Friday afternoon November 10<sup>th</sup>. The minutes of the previous meeting were then read and approved and again the consideration of the constitution was taken up. The first question was what article should be first considered. In order to decide this the secretary of the executive committee was asked to read the constitution as it had been drawn up by that body. After this a motion was made and carried that the article on membership should be discussed. The recommended measure of the Executive committee provided that the present members of the college constitute its active members.



that alumnae be considered as honorary members, and seniors as associate members, having all the rights and privileges of active members except the right to hold office and vote. After a few remarks it was moved and carried that this measure be adopted. It was therefore decided to include the senior members in the social gathering of the following Friday. The next matter of discussion was the office of the secretary. A suggestion was made that one secretary act both for the college and the Executive Committee. There was some discussion as to the advisability of this plan, and it was finally moved that there be a separate secretary for each of these offices.

An amendment was proposed to this motion to the effect that the college secretary should have the two fold duties of secretary and treasurer.

The motion as thus amended was carried and the meeting adjourned.

The regular meeting of the College Nov. 14, 1905 was held in Lexington Hall. The meeting was called to order by Dean Breckinridge, and the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Owing to unforeseen circumstances it was impossible to conduct the program which had been arranged by the program committee and the meeting was therefore given over to business. Miss Roberts reported the topics discussed and the business transacted in the last two meetings of the Junior College Council. Miss Roberts reported <sup>the</sup> organization of an athletic league had been considered for the purpose of promoting class spirit. Acting upon the instruction of the Council Miss Roberts appointed Miss Heap and Miss Culver to represent the college in this league.

In taking up the discussion of the constitution a motion was made that the secretary write and inform the associate



members of the college of the act which entitled them to this membership. The motion was seconded and carried.

The next article considered provided for standing committee on room and program, the chairman to be elected by the college, to suggest cooperative workers to be voted on by the college at large. The adoption of this article as it stood was moved and carried.

With regard to the term of office it was decided that all officers should be elected every three months except the chairman of the program committee who should act for a year.

In order that the members of the college might gain intimacy with the faculty, the next article of the constitution provided that the various faculty members hold stated office hours at Lexington Hall during which periods they should be at the disposal of the students. The adoption of this measure also was

moved and seconded and Dean Breckinridge volunteered to attend to the arrangements necessary for the accomplishment of this plan.

At the close of the constitutional discussion a suggestion was made that at chapel the college of arts occupy the first five rows of seats on the right hand side of the hall and thus sit in a body instead of being scattered about in different seats.

The meeting stood adjourned  
Nov 21, 1905

The meeting was called to order at the regular time. An announcement of the office hours of the members of the faculty was made. It was moved, seconded and carried that a challenge to a basket ball game be sent out to one of the other colleges, and this matter was intrusted to Miss Culver the athletic representative.

The program consisted of a short Greek play which was presented in a most amusing



and interesting manner by five of the members. At the close Mr. Bonner gave a short instructive talk about Greek life and costumes.

Nov. 28, 1905.

The college held its regular meeting in Haskell museum where it had the pleasure of listening to a very interesting lecture by Mr. Sainz on Turcan civilization, with illustrated views.

Dec. 5, 1905.

The college in accordance with the kind invitation of the College of Literature, joined them in Mandel Hall at the regular hour of meeting to hear a charming and most interesting talk by Benorita who is a student in the International Institute in Spain the only protestant educational institution for women in that country.

Wednesday Dec. 6, 1905.

A special meeting was called by the executive committee for the purpose of presenting to the college the newly prepared constitution. Before taking up this discussion, however, it was moved and seconded that the College of Arts (men) and the College of Science (Women) be asked to join us in hearing Mr. Sainz's next lecture on Tuesday morning Dec. 12. This motion was carried and the secretary was instructed to write to the colleges, extending this invitation to them. She was also instructed to write to the college of literature an acknowledgement of their invitation to hear the talk of the Spanish student on the previous Tuesday.

The articles of the constitution were then read and discussed in turn. It was moved and seconded that the acceptance of the first article regarding attendance be postponed for the present, and this motion was carried.



The second article concerning the time of election was then discussed. A motion was made and seconded that this article be rejected, but this motion was not carried. Another was put before the house that it be accepted. This motion was carried.

The acceptance of the third article on the election of officers was likewise moved and carried.

The fourth and fifth articles defined the duties of the president and the secretary and treasurer respectively. The articles were also moved accepted and the motion was carried.

The 6<sup>th</sup> article concerned the choosing of an athletic representative by the chairman of the executive committee at the beginning of each fall quarter.

There was some discussion as to the advisability of adopting this article, and it was finally moved that it be rejected as part of the constitution and left to the vote of the college in the future. This motion was carried.

The subject of the selection

of a college color was brought up for consideration but on account of lack of time it was postponed until the next meeting and the meeting was moved adjourned.

Friday Dec. 8, - 1905.

A special meeting of the college was called by the vote of the college. The meeting was called to order by the Dean who, before taking up the regular business presented to the college the question of responding to the appeal of the Spanish Student for the International Institute. The Dean inquired as to the pleasure of the college in this matter and suggested that it might act in cooperation with the other Junior Colleges (Women). It was decided to leave the matter to the executive committee. An announcement was also made of three lectures by Mr. Laves which have been procured for the winter quarter and the motion was made and carried that these also should be shared with the College of Arts (Men).



Miss Culver then reported that a basket ball game had been arranged for with the College of Philosophy for some day in the next week the day to be definitely stated later. The team of the College of Arts is as follows

Miss Culver  
Miss Sturges  
Miss Short  
Miss Schobinger  
Miss Fox  
Miss Heap.

The next matter to be discussed was the carnival proposed to be held in the gym. in January. After Miss Heap had spoken it was moved, seconded and carried that we take a booth and for this purpose choose a managing committee. The following nominations were made: -

Miss Morgan Miss Busenbenz  
The voting was done by ballot the result being nine votes for Miss Morgan and eleven for Miss Busenbenz. The chairman was then instructed to choose five cooperative workers.

After some discussion as to a

college color it was moved and seconded that we adopt white which is symbolic of the classics and the arts degree. This motion was almost unanimously carried. The adoption of an emblem was then considered and it was moved and carried that designs be made by any members who so desire and deposited in the suggestion box.

The meeting was then adjourned  
Tuesday Dec. 12.

A meeting was held for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing quarter.

The nominations for president were as follows: -

Miss Preston  
Miss Culver  
Miss Driscoll

Votes cast, Miss Preston 12  
Miss Culver 5, Miss Driscoll 7.  
As no majority was obtained a second ballot was cast, the result this time being

Miss Preston	17
Miss Culver	4

This gave Miss Preston the presidency again.



The nominations for secretary were, Miss Courtenay  
Miss Sturgess  
Miss Scholinger

The result of the votes cast was the reelection of Miss Courtenay with 13 votes, Miss Sturgess receiving ten and Miss Scholinger 2.

A motion was made empowering the executive committee to take some action with regard to the eight members who left the college and graduated into the Senior College.

An amendment was made to the effect that they be allowed to choose two other members to act with them. Thus stated the motion passed.

Tuesday Dec. 19, 1905.

The meeting was called to order by Dean Buckinridge. She suggested that the final adoption of the constitution be postponed until the Spring quarter and this suggestion was accepted by tacit agreement. It was then moved, after hearing Miss Roberts' report of the proceedings of the Junior College Council that the rules be suspended and the Executive committee be elected for two quarters as the chairman is active on the council for that term of office. This motion was recorded and unanimously carried.

Dean Breckinridge then discussed the condition prevalent in the University of dishonest practices such as stealing and cheating in the examinations. After hearing her opinion of this matter a motion was made and carried that the executive committee be asked to consider this matter and report on any possible remedy for it or any action it might be advisable for the college to take.

Miss Roberts then reported on the design of an emblem suggested by the athletic committee to the college council.

It was moved and carried that this matter be referred to the executive committee and to Miss Culver who is the athletic representative.

A suggestion was made by the Dean that there be a joint discussion held with some other college regarding the

matter of woman's suffrage in the new Chicago charter to be granted within the next few years. After some little discussion it was decided that the invitation be sent to the College of Science (Women) and that the discussion be a general and informal one, carried on under leaders of both colleges to open and close the discussion. It was further agreed that the visiting college be given the privilege of choosing the side it considered desirable. The last meeting of the Junior College of Arts (Women) for 1905 was then adjourned with the best wishes on the part of all for its Dean Miss Breckinridge who is not to be in residence during the winter quarter.

Winter Quarter 1906

January second

The college held its first meeting of the new year and of the new quarter in its usual place of meeting at ten thirty Tuesday morning. Mr. Buchanan called the meeting to order and the first matter brought before the house was the reading of Miss Breckinridge's note of thanks for the flowers which the college had taken pleasure in sending her at the end of the previous quarter.

After this followed the nomination for the election of a permanent chairman of the program committee an office which had, up to this time, been filled only temporarily but very satisfactorily by Miss Peabody. The nominations for the office were as follows:-

The voting was done by ballot - the result being as follows:  
Miss Peabody 12, Miss Driscoll 14  
Miss Greenacre 6.

As this gave nobody a majority there was another vote cast which resulted in the election of Miss Driscoll with 18 votes Miss Peabody 13, and Miss Greenacre 1.

Nominations were then made for chairman of the room committee.

The nominations made were as follows:-

Miss Teap's name was withdrawn on request and Miss Fox was nominated in her place.

The total number of votes cast was 32 the votes being thus divided:-

Miss Short 18.

Miss Fox 9.

Miss McPartlin 5.

Miss Short was therefore elected.

Mr. Buchanan then called Miss Preston to the chair, and from the floor made a motion to the effect that the eight officers and three other members of the college



who might be chosen or elected, should take charge of the college meetings in turn. There was an animated and interesting discussion of this motion, but when the half hour closed no one was ready to second it, and so it was withdrawn and the meeting adjourned.

Jan. 9, 1906

On Tuesday morning, Jan. 9, Mr. Laves began a series of three lectures on the Relation of Astronomy to History, explaining the importance of this science in fixing historical dates. The College met with the College of Arts (Men) in Haskell Museum, in the lecture hall.

Jan. 16, 1906

The College met again with the College of Arts (Men) in Haskell lecture hall, to hear the second of Mr. Laves's lectures.

Jan. 23, 1906

The College again held its meeting with the College of Arts (Men) in Haskell lecture hall. Mr. Laves delivered the last of his series of three lectures on the Relation of Astronomy to History.

Jan. 30, 1906

On Jan. 30 the College held its regular meeting in the college room in Lexington Hall. Mr. Buchanan began a series of talks on the subject of Comparative Storyology which contained a wealth of amusing stories.

Feb. 6, 1906

On Feb. 6, the college held a regular business meeting in room 2, Lexington Hall. Mr. Buchanan called the meeting to order.

The business considered consisted of certain matters which had been left undecided from the previous quarter. The first of these was concerning cheating which was reported to be practised in the University. An animated



discussion of this subject ensued, in which many took part, either reporting, expressing their opinions or suggesting possible remedies. Miss Strauchon read the resolutions passed in Green Hall but the end of the allotted time prevented any definite action being taken.

Feb. 13, 1906

On Feb. 13 another business meeting was held in Lexington Hall to take up unfinished business and any other matters that the executive committee might bring before the college. The first thing was the possible cooperation with the other Colleges (Women) in sending some aid to the International Institute in Spain, a matter which had been suggested by Miss Breckinridge in the previous quarter. After some discussion it was finally decided that an entirely voluntary offering be made by the individual members. It was determined that twenty five cents would be an appropriate sum.

The executive committee then reported that they had discussed the action to be taken with regard to those graduating from the college, and thought that it ought to be entrusted to a separate committee.

Miss Greenacre was nominated for chairman of this committee with the privilege of selecting her co-workers, and was unanimously elected.

Miss Strauchon, on behalf of the executive committee made the following motion: - that the second Tuesday in every month be reserved for a business meeting. This motion was recorded and carried.

Miss Strauchon also made a motion to the effect that a request be sent to the college for funds to furnish the college room. This motion was recorded and carried.

It was suggested that a detailed account of the necessary articles of furniture be included in the request and the secretary of the executive committee was assigned the duty of seeing that the request



be sent in; and the meeting was adjourned.

Feb. 20, 1906

The regular college meeting for Tuesday morning, Feb. 20, was suspended in view of the fact that the following day exercises were to be held in commemoration of Washington's birthday.

Feb. 27, 1906

On Feb. 27, 1906 the college met in the college room to hear the second of Mr. Buchanan's interesting talks on Horiology.

March 6, 1906

The regular meeting of the College was held in its accustomed place of meeting in Lexington Hall. Mr. Buchanan delivered the third and last of his series of talks.

In the remaining time Miss Driscoll put before the college a proposition from the College of Arts (men) that a joint dramatic club should be established. But lack of time prevented a further discussion of the matter.

### Special meeting

On Wednesday, March 14, 1906 a special meeting was called for the purposes of electing officers for the ensuing quarter. Early in the meeting, before the nominations were in progress, a motion was made and carried that no one should hold office for more than two consecutive quarters.

The nominations for the office of president were then made as follows,

Miss Sylla

Miss Johnston

Miss Sturgess

Votes were cast by ballot with the following result.

Miss Sylla 10

Miss Johnston 6

Miss Sturgess 9

Since no one received a majority it was necessary to cast another ballot for Miss Sylla and Miss Sturgess, the former being elected with fourteen; the latter receiving twelve.

The nominations for secretary and treasurer were  
Miss Culver, Miss Roe, Miss Kellogg



The result of the vote was,  
 Miss Culver 4  
 Miss Roe 6.

Miss Kellogg 14, which gave the office to Miss Kellogg.

While the tellers were occupied with making out these reports, the executive committee moved that a regular fee of fifty cents be imposed on each member each quarter, to cover the expense of any social function that might be arranged for by the entertainment committee.

This ~~motion~~ was unanimously carried.

As two members of the executive committee graduated into the Senior college, it was necessary to elect two to take their places for the remaining quarter of their term of office. These two members were elected from the following five nominations.

By this election it was decided that Miss Preston and Miss

The College met with the College of Science (Women) in Blaine Hall. Miss Baber gave the first of her series of illustrated talks on India, taking up the geography of the country.

### Special meeting.

She <sup>gave the</sup> proposed plan of the Club to combine with that of Philosophy and Literature under the name of The Junior College Dramatic Club and asked the opinion of the college. It was suggested that this would be a very good question to take up early in the Autumn Quarter.

A special meeting was called for Monday at 10.30 to discuss constitutional matters.

After Miss Courtenay had extended a cordial invitation to attend an informal reception



to be held in the Union room on Friday in honor of Miss Driscoll Miss Busenbery and Miss Culver who receive their title of Associate the meeting adjourned.

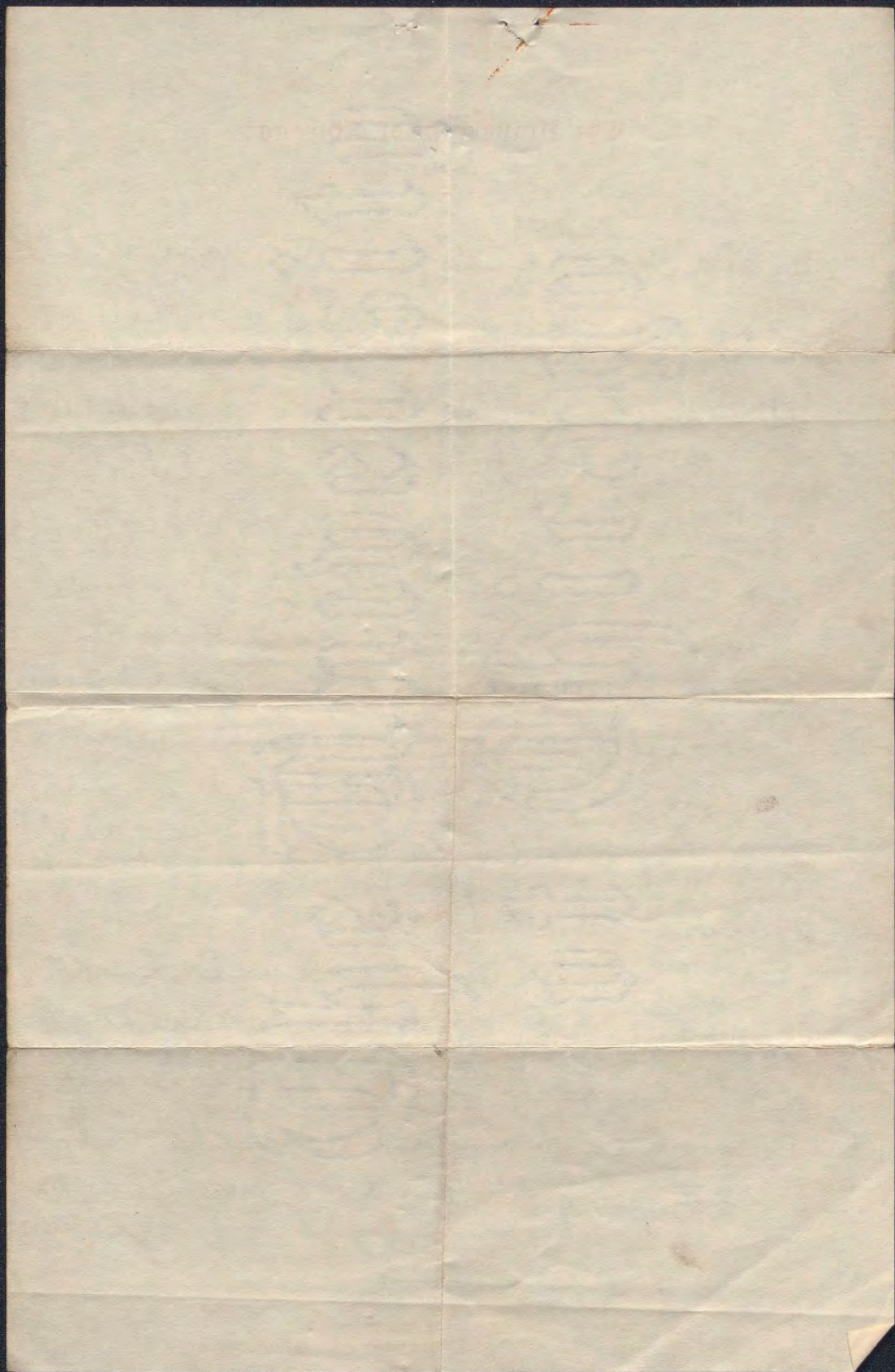

This motion was seconded, after a brief discussion was carried. Time was set for those interested in such a club to meet and organize on



the following Wednesday at 1:00 o'clock.

Miss Schobinger announced that there was no committee in charge of the dance to be given Dec. 14. Miss Lazelle was then appointed chairman and given the privilege of selecting her own committee.

The subject of the formation of a dramatic club was then brought up for discussion.

Miss Breckenridge made the supposition that a Greek play or dance be given and that Mrs. Moore be paid to train for the performance. This met with a hearty response but no definite action was taken.

The meeting then adjourned.

College of Arts held its last meeting of the Autumn Quarter Monday December 10<sup>th</sup>, 1906.

The meeting was called to order by Dean Breckenridge who before beginning on the business of the hour made two announcements:

1<sup>st</sup>) That several persons having promised to go to the luncheon failed to do so, thereby causing a disturbance in the financial side of the affair, and that it is the duty of such persons to rectify the existing conditions. 2<sup>nd</sup>) That during the winter quarter Miss Ballou would be the one to whom the members of the college should go in case it is necessary to consult anyone.

The election of officers, i.e. for President, Secretary and two members of the executive committee was then entered upon. The election of president was taken up first.

This motion was seconded and after a brief discussion in which Miss Sturgess suggested that the Italian booth be accepted, the motion was carried.

Miss Lazelle then made an announcement of the dance to be held on Fri. Dec. 14 in Green Hall and she also urged members of the College to pay their dues as

soon as possible.

The question of having a picture of the entire College taken to be inserted in the "Cap and Gown" was brought before the meeting but after a brief discussion of the matter it was decided to postpone the decision until the Winter Quarter.

Miss Courtenay then moved that the College extend a vote of thanks to the retiring officers. This was carried unanimously. The meeting then adjourned.

The meeting then adjourned.

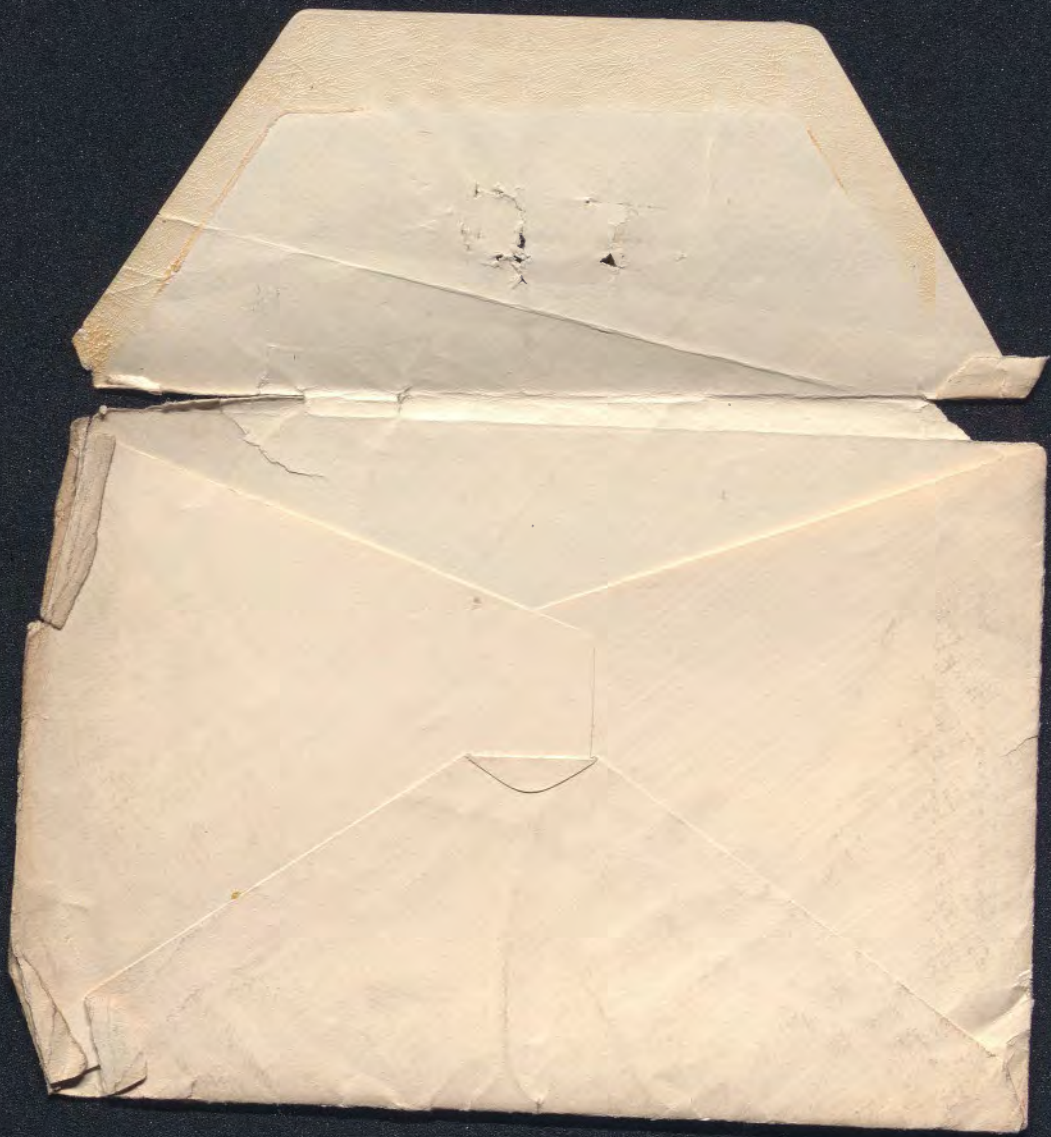

March 30<sup>th</sup> 1909.

April 5<sup>th</sup> 1909.

of her experiences while studying in the ancient Vatican Library in Rome. Miss Breckenridge then volunteered to see about getting the second and third floors of the Reynolds Club for the afternoon of May 21<sup>st</sup>. The conditions of the premises were then told to the college by the treasurer, and a suggestion made for all to pay their dues immediately. It was then moved and carried that the meeting be adjourned.

May 4<sup>th</sup> '09.

The meeting was called to order by the President. Miss ~~Frank~~ - councillor read some of the complaints which had come before the council, and, it was decided, on account of the absence of Miss Breckenridge that the debate which was to have taken place at this time, be postponed until next week.

May 11<sup>th</sup> 1909.

Miss Breckenridge called the meeting to order and announced that the date for the party to be given May 21<sup>st</sup> would have to be changed, as the Reynolds Club was already spoken for. A motion was made that the entertainment be given May 28<sup>th</sup>. The girls were then urged to pay their dues before next Tuesday, and it was decided that if \$20.00 had not been collected before that time the idea should be given up.

Miss Cleary then began the debate as to whether or not there should be a change in the present system of voting in Arts College - she having the affirmative. Miss Drayton will reply in the negative next Tuesday. The meeting was then adjourned.

May 18<sup>th</sup> 1909.

The meeting was called to order by the President, after which Mr MacIntosh talked about Japanese art and showed the college a collection of vases, which he had acquired while travelling in the Orient. After this, the meeting was adjourned.



May 25<sup>th</sup> 1909.

Miss Breckenridge called the meeting to order, and announced that the debate, which Miss Cleary had started two weeks preceding, should be continued. Miss Swaville, had the affirmative in the question "Shall Arts College have their present state of election, or have a nominating committee?" After finishing her argument, Miss Swaville, the President, adjourned the meeting to ~~later~~.

June 1<sup>st</sup> 1909.

The meeting was called to order by Miss Breckenridge, after which she spoke to the girls on the honor system and told them how to win best in the struggle of life, before them. There being no announcements, the meeting was adjourned.

June 8<sup>th</sup> 1909.

The College of Arts (women) met in Lexington as usual. Miss Breckenridge announced that at a meeting of the council, the faculty had decided to discontinue the college meetings. However there will be means of such college as now who will endeavour to keep watch



of the members in his college. There being a surplus of \$3.46 left over from the dues of the Spring Quarter, a motion was made and carried, to contribute it to the University Settlement. The meeting then adjourned.
