The Com<sup>rs</sup> Tho' S. Redd returned his report  
herin which is noted - & order viz -  
The Commissioner having made a report in regard  
to the slaves ordered to be sold, It is ordered  
that the sale by the Com<sup>rs</sup> to Geo R Todd be quashed  
and It is ordered that Geo R Todd surrender to  
Tho' S Redd Com<sup>rs</sup> the slaves Harvey & Penn and  
It is ordered that the Clerk of this Court on the  
application of the said Commissioner issue writs  
directed to the Sheriff of any County that the  
Commissioner may request. Commanding the Sheriff to  
seize said slaves in whomsoever hands the same  
may be and deliver them to the Commissioner  
And the Commissioner on the recapture of the slaves  
is ordered to sell them & the other slaves in the decree  
mentioned at public auction & at the Court house door  
in Lexington at any time after two weeks advertisement  
of the time & place & terms of sale in a newspaper  
published in Lexington & on the Terms mentioned  
in the decree

Pursuant to the decree herein after having the slaves decreed to be sold valued & consulting with the counsel of both Complainant & Deft: they having agreed that said valuation was about right I told G C Humphreys who applied to purchase them for the widow, he might take them <sup>at</sup> private sale at valuation but before the bond was executed G B Beck Esq Counsel for Geo R C Todd informed me that G<sup>d</sup> Todd was dissatisfied and would give more for them I then wrote to Humphreys advising him of that fact, but learned he was ill & confined to his bed some days afterwards I saw Mrs Todd who offered to execute the bond when I informed her that the Complainant was not satisfied and would give more. I understood her to say she would not and some few days ago Geo R C Todd came to me and said he was prepared to buy and would give more for the negroes. I told him what had been done and he replied as I understood him that the other parties were willing to give them up. I am very distinct in my recollection that he told me he had seen Mrs Todd & she so informed him & I think he also said the name of Humphreys. I declined doing any thing until I could see the other parties or their attys and Geo R C Todd pleaded the necessity of his immediate return

of Geo Ladd made to me - I let him have

me Mrs Ladd or he had ever agreed  
that they should be given up - I immediately  
wrote to Geo R C Ladd and requested  
him to come up and bring the negroes  
and cancel his note & that I would then  
put them at public sale to the highest  
bidder and let the best bid take them  
Geo R C Ladd has the negroes Pen &  
Harvey in possession & the woman and  
child are in possession of Mrs Ladd  
In my letter requesting the surrender of the  
negroes Geo R Ladd gave a peremptory  
refusal

William S. Mc Chesney states that on about the 5<sup>th</sup> day of this month he went in company with Dr Geo R. C. Todd to the residence of Mrs Elizabeth L Todd in Franklin County for the purpose of seeing ~~them~~ of the slaves of Robt. S. Todd de<sup>d</sup> as were by a late decree of the Hayette Circuit Court to be sold by Tho<sup>s</sup> S. Reed Comr -

The said slaves had been appraised by J. R. Sloan & Walter Rodes under an order of said Court as this affiant had understood & the Court as affiant had also understood had authorized the said Comr to sell them at private sale ~~at~~ the appraised price if that price could be obtained ~~for~~ for them & if not then they were to be sold publicly -

Affiant saw Mrs Todd & informed her of the object of his visit - He was permitted to see a negro woman & <sup>one of her</sup> children ~~them~~ at Mrs Todd's - the residue of the negroes, Peni & Harvey, being at the residence of Mr Humphreys -

In a conversation then had with Mrs Todd she said the negroes were appraised at too high a price - she also said she had informed Mr Reed the Comr that she had understood that Dr George R. C. Todd had complained that the appraisement was too low & that he might sell them to George or to any one else if he or any one else would give a higher price than the<sup>d</sup> valuation -

Mrs Todd said that Penn & Harvey were appraised at too high a price - that Penn was delicate & subject to a bleeding at the nose & that the face of Harvey was badly scarred

Affiant & Dr Todd did not see Penn & Harvey, but came on to Lexington & on the next day Dr Todd

purchased Pean & Harvey of Mr Redd the Court - giving five dollars above the appraised price on each -

Dr. Todd paid \$500 in hand to the Court & executed his bond for the payment of the residue with Dr Geo R. Desha & this affiant as security & thereupon the Court gave to Dr Todd an order to Mr Humphreys who had charge of the negroes to deliver them to Dr Todd -

Affiant went with Dr Todd to the residence of Mrs Humphreys - handed the order to his wife, he being absent, and received the negroes -

The sale being thus concluded and final as affiant supposed, he this affiant with the consent of Dr Todd sold & delivered the negro Harvey to Greenup Remington of Louisiana for some cash & the balance in cash notes -

The negro Harvey had a wife & children belonging to Mr Bell about ten miles from Georgetown & between that & Frankfort - as Harvey was anxious to be near his wife, Dr Todd prevailed on Mr Webb of Harrison County to purchase her & her children which he did & which would not have been done as affiant believes but for the facts aforesaid

Affiant further states that said negroes were at the time badly clothed & destitute of bed-clothing - at all events such was their condition when delivered to Dr Todd - Dr Todd after his purchase supplied them with such clothing as was necessary including Blankets to an amount exceeding \$20.00 - His expenses on the trip including that of removing the negroes to his Home in Harrison County were about \$10. in addition - making the whole extra cost at least



The Petition of Greenup Remington who says that for a fair price and without notice of any adverse claim he purchased and paid for the negro Harry who is as he has been informed one of the negroes in controversy in the above named suit, and which negro your Petitioner claims as his own property. He further states that Charles Webb residing in this neighbourhood, has purchased the wife and children of said negro and brought them from Woodford County or its vicinity to this neighbourhood to live

Your Petitioner states that on inquiry he has been informed and believes that the decree directing a sale of the negroes was rendered by the consent of the counsel for all the parties interested in this suit, and that the purchase of the negroes was made in strict conformity with the provisions of the decree for the sale, and he asks to be made a party to the suit that he may have an opportunity to assert and prove his title to the negro Harry,
