

Measles -

There has probably been no period during the ~~history~~ existence of the United States, more free from Epidemic Diseases than the years ~~1861, 62, 63, 64 & 65~~, which ^{has} passed in the awful conflict now happily closed.

Our Sea board, during this time, was almost exempt from Yellow fever, The ^{Epidemic} Calera, Clung to its eastern home until the deadly strife of arms, had ceased its work of death. The Epidemics of our Western rivers, though by no means quiescent, assume a milder form than usual. These facts should not be forgotten when we compare ^{our} the ~~losses~~ ^{losses} to date, with the losses from disease in other Armies & other periods -

So true that our Hygienic and a ~~therapeutic~~ agents have been more successful than the same agents in other hands, it will be necessary to compare our losses from disease with the losses in Armies, that have not been scourged by ~~the~~ fearful Epidemics and Endemics, -

It is a surprising fact, and one that it would be difficult
to convince one of, except by experience, that Measles
has probably been ^{one of} the most ^{if not the most} fruitful cause of death
and permanent disability that our Army has encountered
during the late war. I am convinced that this
statement can be made with greater emphasis of
the rebel Army. ~~Transfer~~ reason which I will
give. One would not expect that a disease which
in civil life, hardly requires the care of the Physician
and that usually causes a smaller percentage of
deaths, in proportion to the number of cases, than
almost any other disease, that ever results fatally.

It is not from the number of deaths, that
result as a direct result of Measles, that we

its Sequella, Chronic Bronchitis, Ozena, and
Pneumonia is much larger than the number

The 149th Regiment Ill^l Cal. was organized at Camp Butler
on the 11th day of February 1865; Six of the Companies
were enlisted in St Clair County and one Company
each from the Counties of Morgan, Sangamon, Taylor
and Vermillion. The St Clair County Companies
were ^{chiefly} ~~in a large part~~ composed of Germans. The
other Companies of Americans (with a few of ~~the~~
~~the~~ ~~Nationals~~ Germans, Irish and English —

The men were enlisted and placed in Camp
between the 20th day of January and the time the
Regiment was organized. As I did not join the
Regt until it entered the field, I am unable
to say anything regarding the hygienic condition of
the men while at Camp Butler from personal
observation, but if I can believe the reputation
of the soldiers who were there during the time
the Regiment was being organized, the health of
the men must have been secondly considered
with those who had charge of the Camp.

Three days after the organization of the Regiment
it left Camp Butler under order to report at
Nashville Tenn. While passing through Ill^l ~~the~~
the men rode in hot Cars a part of which had stoves,

and a further had no means of furnishing ~~the~~ fire

During the fall of 1861, a large number of cases of Measles occurred in the neighborhood in which I was practicing at the time. At least one half the cases were never in the care of a physician, but the patients were left to the care of their mothers. There could not have been less than two hundred cases, (without I think a death, I fear for that time) entered the Army. From what little knowledge I have picked up from reading ^{the} periodicals and books on medicine and surgery, and a few hints scattered here and there, I had the impression that I would meet a disease substantially like Measles, or resembling it so closely that it would be difficult or impossible to make an accurate diagnosis. In a short time a case occurred with every symptom of Measles.

At the beginning there was nothing to cause alarm for the safety of my patients. The eruption, normal in color, and sufficiently diffused over the surface to satisfy the most anxious, believed in the doctor, that if the disease came out there was no danger. In a short time my anxiety was aroused by the evidence of embolism respiration, resulting rapidly in a death. Color of the Proboscis and other symptoms of blood poisoning from the heart of oxygen.

In a few days my patient died. Before this fatal
result, other cases occurred, I mentioned the matter
to the Medical Director of the Service, a gentleman

two hundred cases of measles, and that seventy
five would result fatally. Such a statement
from such high Authority, was certainly worthy of




